Homily

One of the loveliest Easter stories in the Gospel is the story of Jesus walking with his disciples on the road to Emmaus. The risen Jesus too is walking with us on our journey in life.

The disciples left everything to follow Jesus who they thought to be the Great Liberator for the Israelites. However, the death of Jesus has shattered their hope and dream. The disciples could not see the prospect of Jesus' rising from the dead. Therefore, it was out of despair, grief and frustration that two of the disciples decided to turn away from Jerusalem (the centre of faith) and to make the journey towards Emmaus in search for a new beginning. These two disciples have lost faith in Jesus as the promised messiah – the son of God. However, just as the disciples thought that they were walking 'alone' Jesus came and walked beside them. Jesus listened attentively to the disciples' story and tactfully guided them to reflect upon the events of his life and mission. Jesus walked with the disciples on their journey of despair and hopelessness in order to guide them back onto the road of hope and joy. Having encountered the risen Jesus the two disciples made a U-turn to Jerusalem and resumed their discipleship.

"Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him". This 'something' that prevented the disciples from recognising Jesus could be anything – grief, prejudices, and unrealistic expectations and so on. Sometimes, there may be things that hinder us from recognising Jesus walking beside us. Do we know what they are? Perhaps, in order to see Jesus' loving presence with us we must have openness and be ready to let go of the unrealistic expectations we have of Jesus. We do need to allow Jesus the liberty to come to us just as he wants to.

All of us must feel at times like leaving Jerusalem to look for an Emmaus with more 'greater' promise. How often have we like the two disciples want to turn away from the Church – the centre of our faith? No one will be stopping us from leaving the Church or turning away from Jesus. However, before we make the decision to walk away from Jesus or the church it is necessary that we have it clear in our mind the reasons that make us want to look for hope and meaning elsewhere. Personally, I do not think that it is justified for me to turn away from Jesus because some of the leaders in the Church are corrupt – I do not profess my faith in my bishop or even the Pope. I profess my faith in the One who died on the Cross for my salvation! Similarly, I do not leave the Catholic Church because of some scandals. The Catholic Church is not made up of the clergy alone. I am a member of the Catholic Church. However, I would consider renouncing Baptism if I no longer convinced that God exists and that Jesus established the Catholic Church.

Dear friends, sometimes we may feel that we are going through life alone. However, the reality is that Jesus is walking with us always. It is up to us as to whether or not we would want to welcome him as our faithful companion in life!

- 4- What is God saying to your family through this Sunday's Gospel? What is God saying to you?
- 5-Prayer of intercessions: you may like to pray for the needs of each member of your family...
- 6– You may like to bring this family reflection time to a close by saying together 1 x the Hail Mary for your family and 1 x the Our Father for the end to Covid 19.

Pastoral Care for STM Parish during the time of the Coronavirus pandemic

This plan will be revised upon further restrictions from the Government.

- 1. STM Church Closed until further notice
- 2. **Seasons** will continue to be published online, send out by email, or by post, copies of Seasons will be available on the church door for people to collect. Homily will be included with Seasons.
- 3. **Pastoral visitation**: Parishioners who would like a visit from Fr loe are to contact the parish office.
- 4. **Anointing of the Sick, and Communion for the housebound:** Fr Joe is now only permitted to administer the Anointing of the Sick to the seriously ill, and also, Fr Joe is only permitted to give the Eucharist as Viaticum to the dying
- 5. **Fr Joe is available at the parish office** from Tuesday to Sunday afternoon for spiritual guidance over the phone...
