

Gospel Mt 10:26-33

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Do not fear those who can kill the body.

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men. I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven,'

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Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Our Gospel reads: '... not one [sparrow] falls to the ground without your Father knowing.'

But that is a bad translation. The Greek simply says 'not one [sparrow] will fall to the ground without your Father.' Full stop! Our Heavenly Father accompanies a dying sparrow as it dies! That is the measure of the Creator's love for all creatures. God wants to - does - enter into the moment of death, our moment of death.

Now, that would be consoling if I were facing what Jesus was foreseeing for his disciples in the first century.


One of the first Christian groups to hear this Gospel was that set around the Tigris River running through Baghdad in modern day Iraq. Now they face terrible persecution from fanatical Muslims. We can barely imagine hearing today's Gospel amongst the remnant, left in Baghdad today, How does 'Do not be afraid' really sound to them?

So, we could pause for a moment to pray for those for whom today's Gospel is a challenge beyond our imagining.

Second Reading Rom 5:12-15

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

God's gift to us is nothing like our sin against him.

Sin entered the world through one man. and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses. even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift.

Bookings to attend a weekend Mass can be made as follows:-

Online Bookings: For parishioners with internet access

Mass attendance is via TryBooking.com. Go to 'Buy Tickets' (free), 'Search Events' (or 'Find Event') and type in **Mass St Peter's Church Keilor East** and find the correct date and Mass time you wish to attend. Add your details and confirm booking. If all 50 spots are filled, you will be prevented from booking in at that particular Mass time. Bookings for Masses at 6.00pm, 8.30am and 10.30am on the weekend of $27^{th}/28^{th}$ June, will open at 9am on Tuesday, 16^{th} June and close at 5.00pm on Friday 19^{th} June, unless filled earlier.

Phone Bookings: For parishioners unable to book online

Please call the Parish Office to register your name on 9337 4141 from Tuesday 23rd June. We will let you know if there is availability for the weekend Mass you wish to attend, and book you in if requested.

Now that restrictions are easing, I look forward to welcoming back more parishioners to our wonderful Church. Remember though, you are not obliged to attend during this time and if you feel unwell, please stay home. As always, the health and wellbeing of our parishioners and our community remain our number one priority.

COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS EASED

From 22nd June restrictions on gatherings at places of worship will be further eased. Space density requirements remain – one person per four square metres & physical distancing of 1.5 metres.

- There have been no changes to numbers for Weddings and Baptisms (20).
- There have been no changes to Funerals (50) in addition to the Priest and funeral staff.
