

Gospel Mk 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

Anyone who is not against us is for us. If your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off.

John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us.

'If anyone gives you a cup of water to drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.

'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.'

The question of legitimacy of ministry is not a new one. There is a certain amount of tension between the institutional and the charismatic aspects of the church. To say that one is Spirit-driven and the other is not is to misunderstand Jesus' promise to remain with the church until the end of time. God normally calls ministers through the structures of the community. The authorities of the church are usually the ones who make the ultimate decisions about the needs of the church, how these needs are to be met, and who is to meet them. That is one of the responsibilities of their office.

However, God calls in other ways as well. A solid biblical tradition maintains that the Spirit is not confined to human structure or custom. We see this in the judges, the prophets, and even the early kings. The Pentecost story describes the coming of the Spirit upon all people – sons and daughters, young and old, slaves and free. When God calls it is up to us to recognise that call and to test its spirit. Perhaps the primary criterion we have for judging is the biblical measure: By their fruits you shall know them.

Today we also see that those who benefit from exploitation of the vulnerable will reap the fruits of their sin. This warning stems from the belief in the justice of God. Just as we believe that God will not allow the righteous to go unrewarded, so we are confident that neither will the wicked escape punishment.

Are you jealous on my account? Who decrees that all people may prophesy?

The Lord came down in the Cloud. He spoke with Moses, but took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders. When the spirit came on them they prophesied, but not again.

Two men had stayed back in the camp; one was called Eldad and the other Medad. The spirit came down on them; though they had not gone to the Tent, their names were enrolled among the rest. VICTORIAN ROADMAP

As you would be aware, last Sunday the Premier, Dan Andrews, announced a proposed Victorian Roadmap outlining 'aspirational' markers that will enable a slow and staggered re-opening. The length of time before any real change will be implemented is disappointing but at least Religious Worship has been included in the planning. Details of some of the allowances around 'fully attendees and vaccinated' 'unknown vaccinated' attendees is very unclear, and the Archdiocese have requested clarification from the Government on this.

Taking into account the density quotient of 1 person per 4 sqm, from October 26, we should be able to operate outdoors with a 50 cap of fully vaccinated; 20 cap unknown vaccination status.

Then from 5th November, we should be able to operate with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 sqm indoors with a 150 cap fully vaccinated; 20 cap unknown vaccination status. For Funerals, from 26 October, 50 attendees fully vaccinated allowed indoors; Unknown vaccination status: 20 people per facility (and those necessary to conduct funeral). This increases to 150 fully vaccinated from 5th November, Unknown vaccination status: 20. Further information will be provided in coming weeks.

MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES SUNDAY

The 107th World Day of Migrants and Refugees 2021 will be celebrated on September 26th -Migrants and Refugees Sunday. In his Message, Towards an Ever Wider "We" for this year's World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis turned to his encyclical Fratelli Tutti to express once again his concerns and hopes during this time of the COVID19 pandemic: "Once this health crisis passes, our worst response would be to plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egotistic self-preservation. God willing, after all this, we will think no longer in terms of 'them' and 'those', but only 'us". For this reason, the Pope said he has devoted his Message to the theme, Towards An Ever Wider "We", in order to "indicate a clear horizon for our common journey in this world."

"Our 'we", says Pope Francis, "both in the wider world and within the Church, is crumbling and cracking due to myopic and aggressive forms of nationalism and radical individualism," and, "the highest price is being paid by those who most easily become viewed as others: foreigners, migrants, the marginalized, those living on the existential peripheries."

Holy, beloved Father, your Son Jesus taught us that there is great rejoicing in heaven whenever someone lost is found, whenever someone excluded, rejected or discarded is gathered into our "we", which thus becomes ever wider.

We ask you to grant the followers of Jesus, and all people of goodwill, the grace to do your will on earth.

Bless each act of welcome and outreach that draws those in exile

into the "we" of community and of the Church,

so that our earth may truly become what you yourself

created it to be: the common home of all our brothers and sisters.
