REFLECTION

The man in this story is described (at the end) as a man of great wealth, so that when Jesus says 'There is one thing you lack', it would have got his attention. But he learnt to his shock that what he lacked was the big-heartedness which would enable him to give up the security and status and power which came with his possessions.

Jesus was not satisfied with the wealthy man's minimalist agenda of keeping the commandments. He is just as dissatisfied with us. We each know what is holding us back from being a wholehearted follower of Jesus Christ. At some stage in our lives, we have known, or know now, or will know, what it is we are hanging onto: the one thing we cannot, will not, give up, the one thing that is so much part of our personality we cannot imagine what it would be like to get rid of it.

There is only one thing that can give you, give me, the courage and trust that is needed. In this Gospel story, and the only time in Mark, it says: 'Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him.' This is not the glare of the critical eye but similar to the gaze of a parent on a newborn child, envisaging and encouraging a beautiful future for that child.

We could take a moment to pray, 'Lord, I know there is something I must give up to enable me to follow you more nearly. Give me the courage which can only come from knowing that you gaze steadily at me and love me.'

Plenary Council 2022

'The agenda of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia calls those attending the assemblies to "develop concrete proposals to create a more missionary, Christ-centred Church in Australia"' (ACBC 2021c), and prioritise time to 'listen to what the Spirit is saying' (Pelicaan 2018). 'The agenda poses 16 questions, grouped into six inter-related themes: Conversion; Prayer; Formation; Structures; Governance; and Institutions. It challenges the members of the Plenary Council to develop "concrete proposals" in response to the questions' (ACBC 2021c).

A journey of disruption: Part of our Plenary Council journey may mean the Holy Spirit disrupts old ways of seeing in order to open our eyes to the new, summoning us to be:

- a more missionary and evangelising Church
- more inclusive, participatory and synodal
- more prayerful and eucharistic
- a humble, healing and merciful Church
- a joyful, hope-filled and servant community
- a Church open to conversion, renewal and reform.

As the Most Reverend Mark Coleridge DSS, Archbishop of Brisbane, describes: '[t]he Plenary Council is a journey into the kind of vision that leads into action ... Our journey is a journey into vision. Jesus opens our eyes and leads us to a new way of seeing' (Archdiocese of Brisbane 2020, p. 1).

Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor: The recently launched Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) Social Justice Statement 2021–22 *Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor* (ACBC 2021b) encourages Catholic organisations to accept Pope Francis' invitation towards ecological sustainability. This year, the Social Justice Statement focuses on building the theological foundations of caring for our common home and our human family. It will also serve as a launch pad for the ACBC's seven-year journey towards the *Laudato Si' Goals*, creating a wholly sustainable Australian Church. The Plenary Council is a time of inner conversion, prayer and formation, as we listen deeply to the whisper of the Holy Spirit and to each other. May we too take the time to discern and to listen for the Holy Spirit – calling us to new horizons of hope. As we look towards 2022, the theme of next year's Catholic Education Week, 'The Way of the Gospel', challenges us to find the living Christ in our midst.



Gospel: Mark 10:17-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land – not without persecutions – now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'
