Reflection

The wisdom tradition from which the first reading is taken is rooted in the fact that life is a series of choices. The epistle and the gospel reading provide us with examples of the way Christians should choose. Finally, the psalm's description of the fleeting nature of life sets the context and tone of our decision-making. Discipleship demands that, in the face of all the choices available to us, we keep our priorities straight. In the gospel, Jesus insists that we must be single minded. We must cling to the one thing necessary, and that one thing is authentic discipleship. In choosing Jesus, we choose other things as well. We choose new relationships with the very people to whom we have already been committed. Those who were slaves, or lower class, or employees, or providers of service are now regarded as sisters and brothers in Christ. In choosing Jesus, we also choose the cross. We choose to live in a way that calls us to travel the high road: to forgive offences committed against us; to live simply so that others can simply live; to take responsibility for the moral character of society.

The fleeting nature of life as characterised in the psalm forces us to look at the meaning of life. When the day dawns for us to return to dust, what will we have gained from life? The realisation of our finiteness and the transitory nature of life should help us to set our priorities right and should give us the courage to remain faithful to them.

National Child Protection Week (4-10 September) is an annual event starting on the first Sunday of September. This year's theme 'Every child, in every community, needs a fair go' aims to spread the message that we need to work together to make sure that every child **grows up safe and supported**.

We know that many Catholic organisations have special events planned for Child Protection Week and have been busy in their preparations for this important week. Participating in community safeguarding awareness raising activities, such as Child Protection Week, is one way that Catholic entities can partner

with their local communities to promote greater safeguarding awareness (see NCSS Standard 3 - Partnering with families, carers and communities).

This year NAPCAN has developed a <u>Children's Activity Booklet</u> which contains activities to help foster conversations with children about being safe and well. There are also a range of posters and activity sheets available for free download - <u>Posters and Activity Sheets - NAPCAN.</u>

MESSAGE FROM THE CATHOLIC ARCHDIOCESE OF MELBOURNE



Love calls to us throughout our lives, leading us sometimes in directions we might never have expected. This Sunday is Father's Day, an opportunity to reflect on the ways the love we experience from our earliest days—the love shared within our families—can continue to enrich and shape our lives. These human experiences of love point us to an even greater love, though—to the One who *is* Love.








ENTRANCE ANTIPHON: You are just, O Lord, and your judgement is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love.

FIRST READING: Wis 9:13-18 A reading from the book of Wisdom What man can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable: for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom.

PSALM: 89:3-6. 12-14. 17. R. v. 1 In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

SECOND READING: Philemon 9-10. 12-17 A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him – I could say a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION: Alleluia, Alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia! GOSPEL: Lk 14:25-33

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'


