GOSPEL

Mk 6:1-6

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, 'Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?' And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.

Reflection on Gospel

THE FAMILIAR CAN GET IN THE WAY

Jesus returns to his hometown, Nazareth, and teaches in the synagogue. His former townsfolk are amazed at the authority and wisdom of his words. But they fail to believe that one so familiar to them could really be a prophet sent from God to instruct them. Small-town prejudice and narrow-mindedness blinker their perception.

St Mark comments: "And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them" (v. 5). "Deeds of power" in Mark's Gospel refer to setting people free from spiritual, psychological and physical afflictions which de-humanise them, alienating them from God and fellow-human beings. In the worldview of Jesus' time such conditions were attributed to possession by demons.

What is remarkable here is the way in which the Gospel frankly records Jesus' helplessness to do any such deeds of power for his townsfolk because of their lack of faith. Faith or the lack of it *conditioned* his power to help. Put more positively, it is faith that allows God's power to be effective in our world.

The greatest enemy to faith can simply be "familiarity": a refusal to believe that God could visit us in so familiar a form as the person next door. Progress in the spiritual life is almost always marked by an increasing ability to recognize God in the ordinary, the everyday. The Incarnation means not only that the Son of God became a human being but that he took human form in a town as ordinary and insignificant as Nazareth (see Nathaniel's comment in John 1:46).
