Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time / Year B (12th August 2018)

First reading: 1 Kg 19:4-8

GOSPEL

Jn 6:41-51

The Jews were complaining to each other about Jesus, because he had said, 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.' 'Surely this is Jesus son of Joseph' they said. 'We know his father and mother. How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' Jesus said in reply, 'Stop complaining to each other.

'No one can come to me unless he is drawn by the Father who sent me, and I will raise him up at the last day. It is written in the prophets: They will all be taught by God, and to hear the teaching of the Father, and learn from it, is to come to me. Not that anybody has seen the Father, except the one who comes from God: he has seen the Father. I tell you most solemnly, everybody who believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the desert and they are dead; but this is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that a man may eat it and not die. I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

Reflection on Gospel

<u>"TAUGHT BY GOD"</u>

The people who are in dispute with Jesus in today's Gospel are called "the Jews", even though everyone in the scene, including Jesus and his disciples, is a Jew. The phrase is the Fourth Gospel's way of referring to those who have become set adversaries of Jesus, resisting his claims. The usage reflects the historical situation of the community behind the Gospel. It should not be understood in an ethnic sense as referring to the Jewish people as such.

These people complain about Jesus' claim to be "the Bread come down from heaven". They know all too well his human origins ("his father and mother"). How can he hint at divine origin in this way?

In reply Jesus cites a text from Isaiah (54:13): "They will all be taught by God". The text suggests a mode of teaching involving a divine-human engagement of unparalleled closeness. The Father has sent the Son into the world and drawn people to him so that in hearing Jesus and believing in him, they are really being "taught by God".

It is as the One who imparts this teaching that Jesus describes himself as "the Bread of Life". The "bread" (manna) God gave to the Israelites in the desert sustained their biological life for a time. Jesus in his teaching is the "Bread come down from heaven" that gives sustenance for eternal life.

We should not miss at the end a hint of the cost that this gift will involve for Jesus: the giving up (in death) of his bodily life ("my flesh") for the life of the world.
