Today's readings are about Jesus as the giver of life. The gospel consists of two related stories, with one inside the other, a typical feature of Mark's gospel known as 'inclusion'. Jesus is approached by an official of the synagogue, called Jairus. His daughter is seriously ill and he wants Jesus to come and lay his hands on her "to maker her better and save her life". So Jesus sets out for Jairus' house and is followed by a huge crowd of jostling people. It is at this point that the second story begins. An unfortunate woman who has suffered a haemorrhage for 12 years is in the crowd. Mark says she had spent all her resources on treatment from doctors. There was no improvement; in fact, she was feeling worse than ever.

Both of these stories, with one, as it were, enfolded in the other reveal Jesus as the source of life and healing. As the First Reading says today, "God takes no pleasure in the extinction of the living." And it goes on to say, "To be – for this he created all; the world's created things have health in them ... and Hades holds no power on earth; for virtue is undying. "We have been made, the book of Wisdom tells us, to be in the image of God's own nature. "God made us imperishable, he made us in the image of his own nature." This is the goal of our lives: to know, to love and to share his life forever. Yet all of us, in some way or another, are constantly in need of God's healing. Healing, health, wholeness, and holiness are, in English, all linked words. We pray for healing which will give us health in every aspect of our lives, and not just in our bodies. The realisation of full health is to become a whole person, where every part of me – spiritual, intellectual, social, psychological and physiological – functions as it ought and in perfect harmony within itself, with people around, and with the environment.

And part of that wholeness is indicated by Paul in the Second Reading. He reminds the Corinthians how Jesus, rich though he was (not with money but in things of the spirit), became poor for our sake, "to make you rich out of his poverty". Naked and destitute on the cross he poured out his love on us. He even gave his life that we might have life. And because of that he, too, lives forever. And we have been immeasurably enriched. Paul gives that as a model for the way that the Corinthians should share whatever they can spare for their poorer brothers in other churches. Interestingly, he says that in sharing with others we are not expected to give away what we genuinely need ourselves but only from our surplus. And, when I share my surplus today with someone in greater need, I myself can hope to be treated in the same way in my own hour of need.

Part of our healing is in the wholeness of our communities, a wholeness which is based on truth, love, compassion and a deep sense of justice for all. And this, too, is holiness, because God is an integral part of the wholeness. He is recognised as the Creator, the Conserver and the Final Goal of all that I am and can be, of all that we are and can be.

Let us pray today to Jesus as Lord of life and ask him to help us reach that level of health, wholeness and holiness to which he is calling us.

My dear brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ

First of all, I thank you for your warm welcome to the parish.

A short note about me. I am appointed as your Parish Priest from 9th June 2021 for six years. I was born on 2nd August 1964 at Thrissur district in Kerala State, India. In 52 AD St. Thomas the Apostle came to this state and converted the people into Christianity. So it is a strong catholic faith community in this state. I was the first child of my parents Varghese and Josephine. I had 4 siblings and the second one died at the age of two. Now we are four children and I have three nieces and 3 nephews. I lost my father on 24th August 2014. I did my schooling in the Carmelite fathers' school. The whole family is very strong in their faith. My childhood was very much attached to the church. So the childhood itself I had a desire to become a priest. After secondary, I joined the seminary.
