‘As the Father sent me,
so am I sending you,’
After saying this he breathed on them and said:

‘Receive the Holy Spirit.
For those whose sins you forgive,

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, ‘We have seen the Lord,’ he answered, ‘Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.’ Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. ‘Peace be with you,’ he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, ‘Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.’ Thomas replied, ‘My Lord and my God!’ Jesus said to him;

‘You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.’

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

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RADICAL TRANSFORMATION

As we bask in the light of resurrection, today we see two witnesses to the resurrection, and the transformation of lives.

The first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles, the second volume attributed to Luke, and it presents to us a changed way of living. Firstly, the whole group of believers are described as ‘of one heart and soul’ (v. 32). The apostles appear as testifying with great power to the resurrection and ‘great grace was upon them all’ (v. 33). The remarkable addition here is that they shared everything in common, sold property and distributed funds so no-one was in need (v. 34-35). This radical transformation of their way of life is not a defining feature of our communities today, even though adopted by many religious congregations throughout the Church’s history. While not diminishing the great charitable works operating today, this way of life remains a challenge to us in a world where rich become richer and poor increase in number and poverty.

In juxtaposition to the Acts account, the Gospel outlines the appearance of Jesus among the apostles and the repetition of ‘Peace be with you’ (vv.19, 21). In this gathering behind closed doors, Jesus tells the apostles that he is sending them out. He breathes the Holy Spirit upon them, commissioning them. Eight days later in the same room Jesus arrives saying once again ‘Peace be with you’ (v. 26) and here is the experience of the doubting Thomas, forever recorded for anyone who might doubt that the resurrection happened and is real.

How will our lives be transformed by the resurrection?

he has commanded us; this is what loving God is – keeping his commandments; and his commandments are not difficult, because anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world; this is the victory over the world – our faith. Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God; Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness – since the Spirit is the truth.

OUR LADY OF THE WAY SCHOOL 2024

Well already we are a quarter of the way through the year, and what an eventful term we have had at Our Lady of the Way. We have welcomed 104 Foundation Students as well as 30 plus new students into Year 1 to 6. This means that our total enrolment at the time of census (29th February) is 678 students, coming from 464 families.

Throughout the term we have celebrated our Opening School Mass, participated in a Family Maths Night, sent our Year 6 students off to Camp, prepared a number of students to celebrate their First Reconciliation, organised and implemented NAPLAN for our Year 3 and Year 5 Students, enjoyed our Wellbeing Day focussing on our Positive Behaviour for Learning framework, reflected on The Way of the Cross Liturgy and After the Cross Liturgy and of course got very colourful during our Parents and Friends organised Colour Run Fundraiser. All of this was intertwined with our normal day to day learning experiences for our children and added to the exciting time that is life at School for our children.

I have no doubt that these exciting times will continue into Term 2 and throughout the year. Term 2 sees our Year 5 students off to Camp and our Year 6 Children participating in inter school sports as well as a number of students preparing for and receiving their First Eucharist. Our Student Leaders will participate in the annual GRIP Leadership Conference just to mention a few things. There is always something happening and believe it or not the children even have time occasionally to do school work.

Finally, I would like to make mention of a special group of students in Year 6 at Our Lady of the Way this year. Even though every child that is part of our School Community is special in our eyes, there are 25 current Year 6 students are that little bit more special. These students began in Foundation in 2018 and will conclude at the end of 2024. This is the first year that any students have had their whole Primary Education experience at Our Lady of the Way. This marks a significant milestone in the short history of Our Lady of the Way Catholic Primary School. As a school community we have had the privilege of watching these students develop and grow into the wonderful young people they are today.


