
GOSPEL Mk 6: 1-6

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

A prophet is despised only in his own country.

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, 'Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?' And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.

A PROPHET AMONG THEM

In the first reading Ezekiel relates his call from God to be a prophet to the people of Israel. This is a major challenge for him considering their rebellion against God plus their insolence and obstinance. God asks Ezekiel to tell them, whether they listen or not, that there is a prophet among them.

The context of being a prophet is echoed in the Gospel as Jesus is rejected in his own town, Nazareth. From the beginning of Mark's Gospel, we know who Jesus is, but we have already seen his rejection by the leaders of Israel (3:6). Now, after he has left the place where he healed the haemorrhaging woman and restored Jairus' daughter to life (last Sunday's Gospel), he comes to his own town, and his disciples follow him there. On his arrival on the sabbath he teaches in the synagogue as might be expected. His listeners' astonishment turns to disbelief. Jesus words to them convey his threefold rejection: 'Prophets are not without honour, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house.' Such unbelief leaves Jesus unable to use his power though he did heal a few of the sick. Jesus' amazement at their disbelief is in sharp contrast to the faith shown by the woman in the crowd who touched him, and recalls his question to his disciples in the storm, 'Have you no faith?' The journey of his teaching goes on now towards the critical question in 8:29, 'who do you say that I am?' Can we see and hear the prophets among us?

three times for it to leave me, but he has said, 'My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weakness.' So I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am quite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ's sake. For it is when I am weak that I am strong.

Kilmore celebrates 175 years (Part 1)

It was on the 20th April 1849, Fr Charles Clarke arrived in Kilmore to head up the Kilmore mission – a vast area stretching to the Murray River.

The mission was one of six organised by Bishop James Goold. The others were Melbourne, Geelong, Port Fairy, Portland and Gippsland.

In 1849 Kilmore with a population approaching 2000 - a census in 1851 counted 2064 – making it the most populus settlement north of Melbourne and a logical base for a parish particularly when more than half of the Kilmore district settlers were Irish Catholics.

At the time Victoria's population was about 72,000. And Bishop Goold on his arrival in Melbourne in 1838 found that he had only six priests and Fr Clarke's subsequent arrival was a blessing for Catholics keen to reconnect with the church and the sacraments.

Little is known of the 49-year-old ex-Irish Fr Clarke. It appears he was ordained a Passionist priest in France and came to Melbourne via New Zealand a few months before his Kilmore appointment.

His first mass on 22 April 1849 was in Skehan's barn (cnr Willowmavin Rd and Northern Highway) and he initially resided in the Dunrobin Castle Hotel (site of Kilmore's Bendigo Bank).

The responsibilities of the respective pastors in 1850 were to build churches and organise Catholic schooling, much of which was supported by state funding.

Fr Clarke bought land on Brewery Hill for a future church, but Bishop Goold wanted the church and school on the current site which came courtesy of a government grant. The subsequent disagreements led to Fr Clarke's resignation in 1854. He moved to Melbourne where he died several months later.

The Kilmore records indicated that Fr Clarke conducted nearly 300 baptisms mostly in Kilmore but also extending to Echuca, Heathcote, Yea, Mansfield and Wood's Point.

Fr Clarke's replacement was Fr Timothy O'Rourke

Fr O'Rourke was educated at Maynooth, Ireland and ordained in mid-1849 before leaving for New Zealand to undertake missionary work.

In poor health, he came to Melbourne for a holiday in January 1854 and at the request of Bishop Goold agreed to act temporarily in the vacancy caused by Fr Clarke's departure. He remained and carried on with an energy far beyond his strength and accomplished much in a few short years which is testimony to the zeal of a great priest. Fr O'Rourke's first task was to assume responsibility for the building of the school-church on Bishop Goold's preferred site. This building had two large rooms with extra small rooms for a master and a school-mistress.

About 1855, Fr O'Rourke's also organised the construction of a small, solid bluestone church known as St Bridget's on 'the survey' at Willowmavin.

The church which was first 'permanent' church in the mission was blessed by Bishop Goold on November 1857.

Fr O'Rourke also begun construction of the St Patrick's church in 1856, with the foundation stone laid by Bishop Goold in 1857. His other major responsibility was in maintaining and expanding the catholic school system for which the Victorian Government would assist with building grants and teacher wages.
