FIRST READING:

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

He gave you food which you and your ancestors did not know.



Moses said to the people: 'Remember how the Lord your God led you for forty years in the wilderness, to humble you, to test you and know your inmost heart – whether you would keep his commandments or not. He humbled you, he made you feel hunger, he fed you with manna which neither you nor your fathers had known, to make you understand that man does not live on bread alone but that man lives on everything that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

'Do not then forget the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery: who guided you through this vast and dreadful wilderness, a land of fiery serpents, scorpions, thirst; who in this waterless place brought you water from the hardest rock; who in this wilderness fed you with manna that your fathers had not known.'

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SECOND READING:

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians Though we are many, we form a single body because we share this one loaf.

The blessing-cup that we bless is a communion with the blood of Christ, and the bread that we break is a communion with the body of Christ. The fact that there is only one loaf means that, though there are many of us, we form a single body because we all have a share in this one loaf.

GOSPEL:

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John My flesh is real food and my blood is real drink

Jesus said to the Jews:

'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied:

'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood. you will not have life in you. Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life. and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven: not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead,

but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever."



FR ALAN'S REFLECTION

BEING REAL

This feast day of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) gives us the opportunity to reflect upon the meaning of Jesus' message and its implications for us in our lives.

In today's Gospel we hear the Words of Jesus 'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven.' He then goes on to speak about giving his flesh to eat. All of this was totally unacceptable to the crowd he was talking to. This was because of their Old Testament understanding that eating the flesh of animals with blood was prohibited. As far as they were concerned blood represented life and belongs to God.

When the crowd reacted, Jesus was given every opportunity to explain his words. He could have gone on to say something like, "Oh I was only speaking symbolically or metaphorically." Instead he intensifies his language. He says, 'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you will not have life in you.' Here Jesus is emphasising that his message is very important. He is making it very clear that he is not speaking symbolically or metaphorically.

The crowd do not like the reality of his language. This passage forms the biblical ground of our Catholic faith. We hear the Words of Jesus at the Last Supper as he distributes the bread and wine he says, '...This is my Body, ...This is my Blood.' Because of who he is, Jesus has the power to transform reality at the most fundamental level. The substance of the bread and wine is changed into the Body and Blood of Christ. Other examples of Jesus being able to transform reality can be seen through his healing ministry where he cured people of their illnesses and he forgave sins.

As the Bread and Wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, so we too are called to transform our lives. We are called to be a real presence to others. There are several ways we can do this.

- i. To be truthful not only in the words we use but in the message we convey. It is possible to say something that is factually true and still tell a lie by leaving out information that the other person has a right to know.
- ii. That the public image we present to others and our private lives are congruent with one another. What do we do when no one is looking?
- iii. Being kind to all. It is easy to be kind to someone when they have the capacity to do something for us. Are we also kind to those who are unable to do anything for us in return? Are we just as polite to the person who serves behind the counter at a grocery store as we are to those who have authority over us?

- iv. Ensuring that my attitudes and behaviour are always oriented towards what is good for the community. In other words, receiving the Body of Christ reminds of our responsibility to act as the Body of Christ for the common good.
- v. Making a firm resolution to get rid of those things in our lives which are not life giving. At the heart of this we are called to reflect on the occasions which give rise to these things and resolve not to put ourselves in those situations in the first place.

If we were to continue this Chapter of John's Gospel, we would hear how many of Jesus' followers left him at that point. The implication of Jesus' message was too confronting. Despite this, Jesus does not flinch. He simply asked those who remained if they wanted to go away as well. He was not going to compromise his principles of being real under any circumstances. This Feast reminds us that we are called to do the same.

Readings: 1 Kings 21:1-6; Matt 5:38-42 TEACHING ABOUT RETALIATION

This reading ties in with the Beatitudes from last week where the heart of Jesus' teaching is all about the importance of detachment. Today we are being called to detach ourselves from being easily offended. Have I ever been able to act out these suggestions of Jesus? How was it for me? Do I even want to behave in such a way? The teaching that Jesus offers is not about being a doormat for others. Rather it is the pathway to freedom. This Gospel calls us to live beyond the limit of the law. Living in the freedom that Jesus offers us means living with imagination and generosity. This enables us to live beyond the restrictions that life presents.



Tuesday 16th June 2020

Readings: 1 Kings 21:17-29; Matt 5:43-48

LOVE OF ENEMIES



When somebody does or says something to hurt us the most natural reaction in the world is to want to pay them back. Therefore, Jesus' command to love our enemies and to pray for those who persecute us is the most difficult commands to follow.

I think it is helpful to understand that forgiveness is not about condoning what has taken place. It is not about having to like our enemies. We may have every right to feel angry about what was said or done to us. Forgiveness is a gift we give ourselves. Failing to forgive is a heavy burden to carry. It robs of our energies. It can affect relationships with those we love.

Forgiveness can take a lot of courage and strength to implement. However, in doing so we become children of our Father in heaven.

VOLUNTEERS TO NURSING HOMES & TO HOME OF PARISHIONERS— FLU INJECTION

On the May 1st 2020 it became compulsory for anyone entering an aged care facility to have been vaccinated against flu.

I would like to extend this requirement to all volunteers who visit Nursing Homes and homes of parishioners in the Parish.

While many of you may have the flu vaccine routinely, some of you may not.

If you require the vaccination as a result of volunteering in these ministries, could you please have the vaccination when you feel comfortable venturing out to a doctor's surgery.

Also the parish will require evidence that you have been vaccinated, the equivalent of a medical certificate. Doctor surgeries should have a pro forma for this. I am unsure of when we will be able to return to physical visits.

Wednesday 17th June 2020 Readings: 2 Kings 2: 1,6-14; Matt 6:1-6, 16-18 ALMSGIVING, PRAYER, FASTING

Mother Teresa was once asked the following question: 'What needs to change?' She answered, 'You and I.' Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving is not about doing spiritual gymnastics. They are time tested practices which help us in the process of conversion.

Prayer helps us to realize that we cannot do this by ourselves. We need God. Fasting reminds us that there is nothing in the world that can satisfy our hunger or quench our thirst. Only God can give us the serenity and joy that we long for. Practicing going without strengthens us in our fight against the temptation to do wrong. Almsgiving opens our hearts towards others. Our communities are changed for the better through acts of generosity.

All three practices take the focus off ourselves and direct us to look outwards towards God and others. Through our determination to exercise these practices daily and with God's grace, we will change.



Thursday 18th June 2020 Readings: Ecclesiasticus 48:1-15; Matt 6:7-15 THE LORD'S PRAYER



In today's Gospel Jesus warns His disciples against formalistic prayer that is, making prayer something mechanical and devoid of meaning. In teaching them the Our Father he makes the point that the words we use must be accompanied by sincerity and openness.

From the Lord's Prayer we learn at least two things that: Firstly, that prayer is about quality not quantity. The problem with quantity is that it seems to presume that it either impresses God or that God needs to be persuaded. It is not God who needs to change. It is us. Secondly, prayer teaches us to pray in common. It reminds us that our relationship with God is personal and not private and that we need the community in our lives to help us grow in faith.

The beauty of this prayer is that the word "my" is not said once. This means that this prayer is focused outwards towards God and others.



Friday 19th June 2020 The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Readings: Deuteronomy 7:6-11; 1 John 4:7-16;

Matt 11:25-30

THE HUMANITY OF JESUS



In this Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus we are reverencing Jesus' humanity. Jesu came did not pretend to have a body. He came to live amongst us for real. The second thing we are asking when we reverence the Sacred Heart of Jesus is for his emotion, his heart, for his desire and for his compassion.

This Feast was instituted in 1856 and it reminds us of what the human heart is capable of. The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus calls us to increase both our love for God and others. When we gaze upon the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we see a heart burning with love for us. When Jesus gazes upon our hearts what does he see?

An old prayer that is still useful for today is simply is 'Jesus meek and humble of heart, make my heart like unto God.' It is a helpful prayer to use when I feel angry or impatient or when I must see someone who I would rather not.


Saturday 20th June 2020 The Immaculate Heart of Mary Readings: 2 Chronicles 24:17-25; Luke 2:41-51 UNITED AS ONE

We can see the mind of the Church when it has this Feast Day of the Immaculate Heart of Mary the day after the Feast to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. We could say that that the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus began in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. She says yes to being the Mother of Jesus and then is overshadowed by the power of the Holy Spirit who then forms in her womb the body of the Son of God. The Heart of Mary is united with the Heart of Jesus. They are always united. They are always beating as one with love. They are united in doing the will of the Father. They are united in loving the human race. As Jesus' Heart was pierced on the cross so was Mary's as foretold years by the prophet Simeon when Jesus was presented in the Temple.

Therefore, Mary's heart is meant to be a model for the way we should love God. She is the only human person who can fully and really love God in the way that He should be loved since her heart is immaculate which means sinless. Mary's yes to God meant that we had a Saviour born into this world who showed us the pathway to salvation.

In today's Gospel we hear about the finding of Jesus in the Temple by Mary and Joseph after he went missing for three days. Mary says to Him: "My child, why have you done this to us?" (Lk 2:48). When Jesus answers her that He must be in his Father's house, Mary does not just remember things; she ponders over the events and experiences in her life. And as she ponders, the mystery of God is slowly revealed to her, the will of God is slowly made known to her.

Therefore, the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary invites us to have a contemplative heart. Let our daily mantra be, 'Let it be done to me according to your word.'

News about the Plenary Council.

- The launch of the Plenary Council encouraged 220,000 people to speak out on much needed change in our Church. While not everyone was in agreement, there was a considerable number calling for change in governance, male dominated clericalism, climate change, language in the liturgy to name just 4 areas.
- 26 Melbourne parishes (including St Joseph's) came together and sent a joint statement to all the bishops and the executive of Catholic religious Australia.
- The same group of parishes has established a website called
 "senseofthefaithful.org.au" to facilitate discussions between parishes all over Australia.

The current delay of the Plenary Council process for 12 months is both a blessing and a curse. It gives us more time to consider the written material that will be the basis of the Council discussions; however, there is some skepticism the delay will slow the momentum for change.
