GOSPEL:

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew Whomsoever you find invite to the wedding.

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they



were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He dispatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out onto the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests. When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'

FR ALAN'S REFLECTION

PUTTING ON CHRIST

In the Rite of Baptism of Baptism for Children we have a prayer known as the Clothing with the White Garment. A garment is placed on the child accompanied by the following prayer: 'N. you have become a new creation and have clothed yourself in Christ. See in this white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity. With your family and friends to help you by word and example, bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven.'

Here at St Joseph's Malvern we place a white stole on the child during our baptism ceremonies. It is always interesting to observe how the child reacts. Some just accept it. Others take hold of it and immediately throw it off. Both reactions are noteworthy in the light of this Sunday's Gospel.

Today in our Gospel we hear about the man who was thrown out because he was not wearing a wedding garment. Perhaps we may wonder, why was the host so upset over this man's clothes? If he were a traveller how could he be expected to have a fine wedding garment? However, this parable is not about wearing clothes. It is about wearing Jesus Christ. The man who came without the proper clothes is the one who was Christian in name only. He was happy to accept the Lord's invitation but refused to exercise his responsibility in the Christian community. They refused to put on Christ throughout their lives. Unlike an infant at a baptism ceremony who does not know any better, the decision to throw the garment away was a conscious one.

Do we put on Christ in our lives? Are we prepared to put on Christ in our homes, our workplaces and in the social settings we find ourselves? Do we live out our baptismal call by showing good example to others? Or are we sometimes guilty of taking off Christ out of fear of being unpopular or being too preoccupied with other things? Are we happy to put on Christ when something good is going in our Christian community but then just as quickly take off Christ the moment we discover that being part of a Christian community is going to make

demands of us?

The call to put on Christ in our lives means that we always need to be prepared to give evidence to our Christian beliefs so that all may see the outward signs of our Christian dignity.

Monday 12th October 2020 Readings: Galatians 4:22-24, 26-27,31-5:1; Luke 11:29-32 Do not be a sign seeker

In today's Gospel we are warned against becoming sign seekers. Sign seekers are not seeking to grow in faith but rather are merely looking to have their curiosity satisfied. Sign seekers are demanding that God perform for them and God just will not do it. This is not witchcraft. The Queen of Sheba in the Old Testament was a foreigner and yet she came to hear the wisdom of Solomon to deepen her understanding of who God is.

Jesus told them the miracle that they were to look for was his resurrection from the dead, but they had to wait. It would happen in God's time. Jonah going inside the whale for three days before emerging again symbolized Jesus' resurrection from the dead. We are called by faith to enter into his mystery. It means dying to the old. It means rising from those things in our lives that should be put to death. The reason we should do it is the greatness and power of God which exceeds the wisdom of Solomon or the power of Jonah' preaching of repentance. If we are prepared to let go of the old then God will work that sign of resurrection in our lives.

Do we believe that there is something greater than what is immediately in front of us or are we sometimes guilty of looking for signs?

Tuesday 13th October 2020 Readings: Galatians 5:1-6; Luke 11:37-41 What matters most

Both readings today emphasise that what matters most is not external observances but rather how we live out our lives. In the First Reading St Paul tells his audience that it is not circumcision that matters most in the eyes of God but rather faith that makes its power felt through love. Likewise, in the Gospel Jesus tells the Pharisees that external cleanliness is no substitute for having a clean heart. When he did not observe the prescribed religious laws for washing Jesus' response was to emphasise the importance of interior cleanliness.

St Paul's words about faith that makes it power felt through love speaks about the importance of us giving evidence of our faith. There are 3 ways in which we can do this. Firstly, Charity in word. Do our words about others seek to lift them or bring them down? Secondly, charity in thought. We cannot help it if an uncharitable thought enters our head, but we can do something about whether it remains there or not. We are called to see the presence of Christ in everyone. Thirdly, charity in action. It is not enough to think or speak well of others. We are also called to do good for others. In some ways we are limited in how we can do this at present. However, this time can also represent new opportunities for doing this. All we need to do is to keep our hearts open and God will help us in this

Wednesday 14th October 2020 Readings: Galatians 5:18-25; Luke 11:42-46 What motivates us?

Jesus strongly rebukes the Pharisees and lawyers in today's Gospel because their religious practices did not spring from the love of God. Instead of pointing people in the direction of God they used religion to try and draw attention to themselves. The lawyers were guilty of dividing the Ten Commandments and precepts into thousands of tiny rules and regulations. This meant that people had to follow unnecessary and burdensome rules. The more important matters of religion such as love of God and neighbour were obscured in the process.

How do we give witness to our faith? What motivates us? Does our faith point others towards God or are we too sometimes guilty of using religion to draw attention to ourselves? Does our faith capture what is most essential, love of God and neighbour?

During his papacy, Pope Paul VI who once remarked: 'What the world needs now are witnesses. If you are a good teacher, it is because you are a good witness.



Thursday 15th October 2020 Feast of St Theresa of Avila Readings: Ephesians 1: 1-10; Luke 11:47-54 Congruency



Feodor Dostoevski, in his book, The Brothers Karamazov, says, 'Men reject their prophets and slay them but they love their martyrs and honor those whom they have slain.' These words are echoed by Jesus in today's Gospel where he accused the Pharisees of honouring those of whom their ancestors killed. Their hypocrisy was evident in the fact that they built memorials for the prophets but were still failing to take any notice of the message that they preached. Jesus had very little tolerance for those who claimed to follow God but there was little or no substance to those claims in practice.

Is there congruency between what we profess to believe and the way we live out our lives?

Friday 16th October 2020 Readings: Ephesians 1: 11-14; Luke 12:1-7 What kills

The first part of today's Gospel Jesus concluded his chastisement of the Pharisees with a warning to the rest of the community. They were warned not to let the leaven of the Pharisees hypocrisy to invade their lives. We should be less afraid of losing our physical lives than losing our spiritual lives. Hypocrisy kills the spirit if we allow it to invade our lives.

What helps us guard against this is knowing how much God cares for us. 'Every hair on our head has been counted.' God is interested in every aspect of our lives even those things we consider to be insignificant. Remembering this and deciding to trust God by placing our lives in his hands will ensure that our spirit remains alive.



Saturday 17th October 2020 Feast of St. Ignatius of Antioch Readings: Ephesians 1:15-23;

Luke 12: 8-12

The role of the Holy Spirit



In today's Gospel we learn about the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Firstly, the Holy Spirit will enable us to overcome feelings of fear when we draw on its power.

Secondly, the Holy Spirit leads us to repentance. The sin that will not be forgiven that Jesus speaks about takes place when we either refuse to repent or we despair of God's mercy. It is not about what God does to us but rather is about what we do to ourselves if we make those choices.

Thirdly, we are told not to worry about what to say for if we allow ourselves to be led by the Holy Spirit, the Holy Spirit will give us the words that we need to speak when the time is right.

The Holy Spirit does not preserve from the challenges of life, but it does give us the necessary strength to be able to deal with hose challenges when they come our way. The Holy Spirit is given to each one of us. Let us draw on its powers to combat any fears we might have, repent of any wrongdoing that may exist in our lives and help us to speak up when the time is right.






Two more practical steps to consider for this week are as follows:

t Calistus I was born a slave and worked for a Christian master named Carpophorus, His master put him in charge of a bank, but Calistus lost the money to bad debts and fearing punishment he fled Rome. After his capture, Calistus worked in a treadmill and then the mines of Sardinia, before being released with a number of other Christians to become a free men. Pope Zephyrinus put Calistus in charge of the Roman bursal grounds (known today as the 'Cemetery of St Calistus') and he became a deacon. In 217 AD, he was elected pope in a brief and controversial reign, which saw the readmission to communion for repentant murderers and adulterers. He also preached that differences in economic class should not be a barrier to marriage a teaching which put him in conflict with Roman civil law and sparked riots that led to his death.


