A MESSAGE FROM FR. MICHAEL

"Our greatest weakness lies in giving up. The most certain way to succeed is always to try just one more time." This is the quote that is displayed on the 'hope flowers' created by the students of St Dominic's. I have been thinking a lot about hope during this time of pandemic - wondering what is being revealed and uncovered. Daily figures of those infected and those that have died can chip away at our hope. I often think of our frontline workers that see the true face of these figures. They know all too well what the knock-on effect will be and yet they still need to keep going – to find hope and courage to persevere. We too often feel uncertain, unequipped and unfamiliar in these times. Yet this week in the weekend's readings, we are challenged to remember God's words. In the first reading we are implored to listen and listen again. In the responsorial psalm we are reminded of God's loving kindness that feeds us and answers our needs. The second reading opens with "Nothing can come between us and the love of Christ..." and the Gospel tells the story of the feeding of the crowd with five loves and two fishes. In this story, we are redirected to remember God's love materialized in our life, the way he sees our hunger and feeds us regardless our situation or outlook.

On Wednesday, Bishop Terry Curtin came to St Catherine of Siena Church to bless the new St Catherine of Siena Statue. Bishop Curtin spoke eloquently and simply of St Catherine of Siena and her life. His Homily showed his great fondness for St Catherine and his admiration of all she was able to achieve in her 33 years. His telling of the quiet acts of grace and charity St Catherine performed during her life was wonderfully united to this time of COVID-19. We also were able to be part of Maria Forde's launch of her new song "St Catherine of Siena" which weaves many of St Catherine's writings into song. The video of the full blessing and 'virtual unveiling' that explains this unique work of art can be found on our Facebook page and YouTube channel. Finally Bishop Curtin spoke of St Catherine as a role model. Her strength, tenacity and caring were highlighted. May we always remember our connection to God and each other in the way St Catherine did...or in the way Bishop Curtin expressed it... "glorifying the Lord by our life".

First reading

A reading from the first book of the Kings

Thus says the Lord:

Oh, come to the water all you who are thirsty; though you have no money, come! Buy corn without money, and eat, and, at no cost, wine and milk. Why spend money on what is not bread, your wages on what fails to satisfy? Listen, listen to me and you will have good things to eat and rich food to enjoy. Pay attention, come to me; listen, and your soul will live. With you I will make an everlasting covenant out of the favours promised to David.

Responsorial Psalm

(R.) The hand of the Lord feeds us: he answers all our needs.

- The Lord is kind and full of compassion, slow to anger, abounding in love. How good is the Lord to all, compassionate to all his creatures. (R.)
- 2. The eyes of all creatures look to you and you give them their food in due time. You open wide your hand, grant the desires of all who live. (R.)

Second reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Nothing can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of him who loved us.

For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When Jesus received the news of John the Baptist's death he withdrew by boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But the people heard of this and, leaving the towns, went after him on foot. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them and healed their sick.

When evening came, the disciples went to him and said, 'This is a lonely place, and the time has slipped

by; so send the people away, and they can go to the villages to buy themselves some food.' Jesus replied, 'There is no need for them to go: give them something to eat yourselves.' But they answered, 'All we have with us is five loaves and two fish.' 'Bring them here to me,' he said. He gave orders that the people were to sit down on the grass; then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven and said the blessing. And breaking the loaves he handed them to his disciples who gave them to the crowds. They all ate as much as they wanted, and they collected the scraps remaining, twelve baskets full. Those who ate numbered about five thousand men, to say nothing of women and children.
