FATHER MICHAEL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends

I was appointed parish priest in Kinglake, Hurstbridge and Diamond Creek less than three years after the region had been devastated by the great 2009 bushfire. I immediately trained to join the Emergencies Ministries of the Victorian Council of Churches so that I would have access to the area in the event of further disasters. In this capacity, I went to Bourke Street this week to join four other chaplains through Wednesday's afternoon shift. I took care to ask the congregation at Mass that morning for the support of their prayers.

The first person who spoke with me was the brother of the gentleman from Tasmania who was injured. The last person was a waiter who had worked for Sisto Malaspina for 45 years in Pellegrini's Café. He had come to reflect to the place opposite the Target Centre where Sisto had died.

One man was angry with migrants from Middle Eastern countries in general, believing that all these persons should be deported. Anger had been experienced by the chaplains who had attended over the weekend and the return to work on Monday.

Many people spent long periods reading messages written up at the site, some alone, others chatting with a friend or coming up to ask to share their thoughts or feelings. Seeing the words 'chaplain' or 'personal support' on the vests we wore, many acknowledged our presence or took a moment to thank us just for being there. One of these was the Emergency Commissioner for Victoria, Andrew Crisp.

Catholics with our sacramental practice of our faith are not surprised that people respond to a signal that God is not absent to the shock and sorrow and continuing feeling of insecurity they have experienced.

Here is a translation of the introduction to a book by Alberto Maggi, "In those days", which addresses such times in our life.

"Jesus reproaches the obtuseness of his disciples with the words, "You have eyes but do not see, you have ears but do not hear." (Mk 8:18) Their gaze

them to distant horizons where new possibilities awaited them.

They had forgotten the message of the psalms and the prophets. "Pay attention to this you foolish and senseless people who have eyes and do not see" (Ez 5:21; cf. Ps 115:5). Clearly, the deficiency is in their failure to read and interpret the situation in which they found themselves.

Those who have eves that do not see recall the Israelites in their journey through the desert. These did not really want to leave the land of their enslavement in Egypt because it provided them with plentiful food, whereas the desert journey gave just a scant diet. Like them, our blindness makes of us victims and accomplices of a powerful system that distorts the ability to understand that the 'garlic and onions' of Egypt (Numbers 11:5) are not to be preferred to the promised 'milk and honey' of a land they have not yet seen (Ex 3:8). They revolt against Moses, their liberator! (Numbers 16:13)

Let's look at the realities of life with the eyes of the gospel. Let's be guided by the good news pronounced by Jesus, who is "the light of the world" (In 8:12; 9:5) He assures all who follow him that they do not walk in the darkness. Once one truly accepts his good news, we look at life with new eyes. As a consequence, we are able to confront the ups and downs of our life with greater determination, security and serenity.

The events and facts have not changed, but one enjoys the capability to look on them and live through them at a greater depth, not being overwhelmed by what is occurring. As a result, when evil seems to be everywhere, we are not inhabited by feelings of anger and hatred. Instead, unsuspected energies for good well up in us that transform our rage into compassion. "Do not let yourselves by overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Rm 12:21)

Our faith and our lived journey in faith are based on Jesus' reassurance: "Have courage: I have overcome the world." (In 16:33) Jesus said this only hours before his arrest, passion and death. How can he say that he has overcome the world as he faces what appears to be utter defeat? "He saved others, let him save himself." (Mt 27:42)

They couldn't see that Jesus was leading life, of the truth and the light that they will always be victorious over death, over lies, and over the darkness (In 1:5). This utter certainty that Jesus gives us a help to interpret and to discern the events that fill our days. We learn to trust in a Father who does not give a stone, but bread, to his children (Mt 7:9). Every life is precious in God's eyes and each person is a fruit of the Creator's design to choose us in love even before the creation of the world (Ep 1:4). Through us, his creatures, God wishes to make himself known in unheard of acts of creative love, tenderness and compassion.

God does not dwell on appearances but knows a person's heart (1 Sm 16:7; Ps 147:10-11). Once we read our history with God's eyes, we are helped to be co-workers with God whose creative action brings good out of evil. We live with the certainty that the Father turns everything to our good (Rm 8:28) and that even the most difficult of situations can be transformed into opportunities of growth.

This is why the gospels are always looking with an eye to the future, to what will become the present by God's gracious design. This prospect however is hidden from the eyes of those who look to the past. "Do not recall the things that are past ... Behold, I make a new thing: it is germinating, can you not see it?" (Is 43:18-19; Apoc 21:5)

The good news that Jesus brings, once it is accepted and becomes our compass, helps the believer to notice the "narrow gate" of the gospel, the one that leads to fullness of life (Mt7:13-14). Jesus does not mean that it is difficult to pass through this gate. He means that those who notice it are few, seduced as they are by the wide gate, much more obvious to the eye. It is the pathway to perdition because, being easy to enter, it retards our maturation and development as a person who accepts responsibility for oneself.

Once we welcome this message of Jesus into our life, we find ourselves in constant harmony with the wave of love that emanates from our heavenly Father. His love maintains the universe in being. It helps human beings to be correctly directed in life, freeing us from the many deceits that the powerful systems in the world propose. They appear in the guise of freedom to choose but they are really traps to bring us into submission.

Once Jesus's words are sown deep in our hearts, our lives are transformed. The believer develops sensitive antennae that alert us to the smell of false teachers (2 Pt 2:1), of rapacious wolves disguised as lambs (Mt 7:15). We immediately detect the deceit of their smooth words (Ps 55:22) which lead to destruction and to death.

As a prophet of God, each believer is appointed a lookout to warn of danger ("Son of man, I have placed you as a sentinel for the house of Israel [Ez 3:17; 33:7]).

We Catholics have been brought up to believe that "God is in heaven, on the earth, and in every place", but have we had sufficient help to discover this divine presence in our life? We deserve to experience, as well as believe, that God is our Father.

The welcome that we give to the good news that Jesus preached leads to this experience. We discover that we are enfolded in the presence of the divine, which accompanies, follows and even precedes our life journey. "I am with you all days" (Mt 28:20) was Jesus's parting gift to believers. With Jacob, one exclaims, "The Lord was in this place and I didn't know it!" (Gn 28:16).


