FATHER MICHAEL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends

I have edited and abbreviated a pre-election statement of Catholic Social Principles issued by the Catholic bishops of Australia.

Christian faith is not a private matter. As citizens who are Catholic, we have the opportunity to participate in the electoral process, for the benefit of the whole community.

The ongoing revelations of child sexual abuse have undermined the credibility of the Catholic Church, and particularly the credibility of bishops. We have no monopoly on truth, but we offer these reflections in a spirit of solidarity, as people who are called to care for the most vulnerable in our community.

No political party fully aligns with Catholic teaching, but we can point to clear and enduring principles which can help us make the kind of responsible judgements that allow us to be both faithfully Catholic and authentically Australian.

At the service of peace

Despite difficult and sometimes hostile debates, Australia is blessed to have peaceful electoral contests, free of the physical violence known in other countries.

Pope Francis has reminded us that "good politics is at the service of peace".

We all have a role in promoting peace – which means speaking to our fellow Australians with love not hate, with respect not contempt, with understanding not indifference.

We all need to be more open, interested and engaged in order to combat the crude tribalism that is infecting Australia and other nations at this time.

Prayer is an essential part of the process of discerning how to vote, reminding us there is

a greater truth and allowing that truth to enter us more deeply.

Our democracy needs the active participation of all its citizens – Catholic or not, religious or not. It's our responsibility as citizens to advocate for the good of the whole community.

The Common Good

Some find the idea of the common good bemusing, but it's critically important because it obliges us to look beyond our own needs and our own desires to consider the interests of the broader community.

Governments play a crucial role in addressing any structural problems affecting people, in providing key services to all Australians and in ensuring there is an adequate safety net for low-income and vulnerable families and individuals.

One of the key principles of Catholic social teaching is that the greater the needs of people, the greater the responsibility we have to respond to their needs.

We appreciate the strong bipartisan support for both the National Apology to Victims and Survivors of Institutional Child Sexual Abuse and the National Redress Scheme, and to the National Disability Insurance Scheme and look to further cooperation on the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability.

Employment

The dignity of employment is the key aim, but that's not always possible for people facing myriad challenges. Charities, including Catholic agencies, make an enormous contribution by providing community support for people facing hard times.

For more than a century, the Catholic Church has advocated for the value of work, a just living wage and dignifying employment conditions, while endorsing the good of economic prosperity. Government policy plays a crucial role in promoting the right economic balance between advancing the dignity of workers and encouraging entrepreneurial creativity. We acknowledge the challenge of helping regional, rural and remote Australians to access adequate health care.

Catholic schools

The Catholic Church is Australia's secondlargest provider of schooling, and our schools are vital parts of their local communities, particularly where they are the only school available. The Church campaigns strongly for funding because we want to give our students, particularly disadvantaged students, the best education and support we can.

Indigenous Australians

We ask for a renewed urgency to the commitment to closing the gap between Indigenous Australians and the rest of the population. This is a running sore at the heart of the nation. Through our agencies, the Church plays a critical role in working with Indigenous peoples in health, education and welfare. But Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples continue to suffer grave disadvantage and should not have to keep waiting for justice. Now is the time to act.

Immigration

Migration has helped shape the Catholic Church, and transform Australia, into a vibrant, prosperous democracy. Millions of our sisters and brothers are forced to flee their homeland for fear of persecution or through displacement because of war or famine.

We are called to respect the dignity of strangers and to welcome them. Regardless of how they arrive in Australia, all asylumseekers should have their claims processed in Australia.

Respect for life itself

To recognise human dignity is to value the lives of all people, including those at the beginning and the end of life. Euthanasia and assisted suicide put some of the most vulnerable people in our community at risk by endorsing – and legislating – the judgement that some people's lives are no longer of value. Governments must provide better funding and resourcing for palliative care, and also provide for sustainable aged care services.

Margaret Plantagenet, daughter of George Plantagenet, first Duke of Clarence was born in 1472, on the eve of the Assumption of Our Lady. Birth into the old royal family meant that



from its beginning her life was inevitably entangled in the greatest and most complex family feud in English history, the Wars of the Roses.

She was a martyr who died courageously because she was the target of "odium fidei", hatred of the faith, and that was the judgement of Pope Leo XIII in 1886 when he beatified Margaret Pole, the Countess of Salisbury. Inspired by her Australian descendant, the Earl of Loudoun, we pray in this Mass that she will be raised to the altars of Holy Church as Saint Margaret Pole. May she pray for us as we gather to promote her just cause.'
