FATHER MICHAEL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends

Canonizations

This weekend, Pope Francis will canonize six new saints. One was pope, two were religious women, two were secular priests who founded religious congregations of women, one was a nineteen year old man.

Pope St Paul VI (Bishop of Rome 1963-1978) was a modest, somewhat shy man, of immense courage. During the reign of the fascist regime in Italy, Fr Montini was chaplain to the Catholic Student Movement in Italy. He was stoned by the brown shirt thugs while taking part in a walk of witness with the Catholic students in Rome. Later he was appointed as bishop of Milan and from there he was elected as Bishop of Rome. His first papal teaching was an encyclical letter on dialogue. It was a novel word for us anglosaxon seminarians in Rome. It has since become a commonplace in our vocabulary.

As Pope Paul VI understood the word, it meant respect and patience in listening to another's point of view or beliefs. For the Catholic who engaged in dialogue, the notion included full conviction of one's own belief, always expressed with politeness and charity. Dialogue became an instrument of evangelization on the world stage, in national forums, in education and in the


One striking example was the adoption in Australia in 1977 of a more respectful discipline regarding mixed marriages. Previously, two disrespectful stratagems were practised. With scant regard for the person's convictions, many priests proposed to the non-Catholic that he or she should receive baptism into the Catholic church. More in keeping with Church law was the practice of requiring a promise to be made by the non -Catholic that he or she would permit the baptism of the couple's children in the Catholic faith.

In 1977, the law changed to place the responsibility on the Catholic party to the marriage that he or she would promise to do all in their power to have their children baptised and brought up in the Catholic faith.

There is always the challenge to be a dialoguing Church locally as much as on the universal stage.

St Maria Caterina

Kasper experienced serious deprivation and poverty. Being the daughter born of her father's second wife, she had no inheritance rights after the death of her

formed a religious congregation.



San Salvador. He was murdered whilst celebrating Holy Mass. He was outspoken against violence and injustice

during a civil war between guerilla forces and the dictatorial government. Archbishop Romero was killed because of hatred of the Faith and his defense of human rights.

St Nunzio Sulpizio was born in the

mountainous region of Abruzzo north of Rome in 1817. He was only six years of age when he became an orphan. At nine years of age he became apprenticed to



an uncle in Naples who stopped his education and dealt him unfeeling discipline. The boy began to pray before the Blessed Sacrament and the rosary. An uncontrolled infection resulted in his wound becoming gangrenous and eventually cancer was found in his leg, leading to his premature death at age 19.

He will be canonized for his trust in Providence and his consistent practice of an upright way of life. When Pope Paul VI declared him a Blessed of the Church in 1963, he drew attention to his youthful integrity.

In Nunzio, the Pope said, young people see someone whose youth was not the age of inevitable falls, of harmful

selfishness. ... He will tell you that no other age than yours is as suitable for great ideals, for generous heroism. He will teach you young people how you can regenerate the world in which God has called you to live. Society needs strong and fearless (Christian) souls.'

This young saint would have been an influential participant in the Synod for Youth, Faith and Vocational discernment that is meeting now in Rome.

The Church gives us these new saints as inspiring examples who show that a good Christian life is possible while our society is experiencing rapid changes.

Life Matters

Pope Francis spoke this week about the Fifth Commandment, 'thou shalt not kill'. This clear phrase constitutes "the fundamental value in human relations. ... There is a contradiction in suppressing human life in the womb in the name of safeguarding other rights. How can it be therapeutic, civilized or simply human to act to suppress innocent life in its beginnings?"

Francis went on to discuss the practice of denying life to a pregnancy that has a disability. "This vulnerable life points to the way to know the joy of loving. ... Rather than criteria linked to money, power or success, the sole authentic measure of a life is love, human love and the love with which God loves each human life." 2

The Pope's words come on the tenth anniversary of the passing by our Victorian parliament in 2008 of an extremely permissive law on abortion.

You may see a moving billboard in the Mulgrave area that states, "Palliative care loves. Euthanasia kills." This initiative is a response to the gazetting of the regulations governing the application of the so-called Voluntary assisted dying' law that will come into effect in June 2019, that is, in less than 40 weeks.

In the hope of providing authentically human care for our fellow human beings, Catholics continue the dialogue with the supporters in our society of abortion and euthanasia.
