
THE CATHOLIC PARISH OF **MENTONE - PARKDALE**

SAINT PATRICK - SAINT JOHN VIANNEY





We all know how important names are. Parents spend long hours choosing a name for their child. Catholics traditionally name a child after one of the saints, thus providing the newly minted Christian with both a role model and a patron. [Not all children are happy with their Christian name. I know I wasn't!]

In the end, whatever name is chosen most of us accept it for life. It becomes a crucial part of our identity.

In the Bible, names have special importance. The Hebrews believed that knowing a person's name gave one control over that person. The name of God, 'Yahweh', from the Hebrew word which means "I am who I am", was so sacred that none merely a list of names. dared to say it.

In the first English versions of the Bible, wherever YAHWEH, the sacred name of God appeared, the 'THE LORD' in capital letters, or less frequently 'God' was substituted. (The Protestant King James Version of the Bible invented the word 'Jehovah'). The original version of the Jerusalem Bible [Catholic] dared to use the sacred name 'YAHWEH' throughout the text of the Old Testament. [There were once laws which prohibited the use of the Holy Name as blasphemy. These days, sadly, the name of God is misused frequently and universally in everyday conversation.]

In St. John's Gospel, when Jesus applied the divine name to himself - the ultimate blasphemy - the lewish leaders literally fell to the ground in horror. It triggered their intention to kill him.

Often in the Bible, when a person's status or role in life was changed, their name was changed as well - Abram became Abraham; lacob was renamed Israel; Simon became Peter; Saul became Paul. It is still a widespread custom for people to take an additional name at . Confirmation, or when joining a religious order. Writers and actors often exercise their profession using another name which they feel best expresses their new status.

In St. Matthew's Gospel, the author is careful to name the twelve apostles, representing the twelve tribes of Israel, called to be the first leaders of the Church. It is important that they are named in order to establish their credentials and to mark the change in their status and the beginning of their new mission.

The apostles' names, mostly, are well known to us. However, with the notable exception of men

like Peter, James and John, most of them disappeared from reliable history almost as soon as they were appointed.

But what a strange collection of men they were: fishermen, a tax collector, two brothers whom Jesus nicknamed 'Boangerges' 'sons of thunder' (a reflection perhaps of their temperament?). And more startling of all, Simon the Zealot, who had belonged to a party dedicated to the violent overthrow of the Roman occupying forces (a 'terrorist' in today's terms!). [I wonder how he coped with Matthew, who had just 'retired' from collecting taxes for the Roman government!]

Their importance, however, is such that we cannot be content simply to pass them over as

Just as God established Israel as a "kingdom of priests, a consecrated nation" (that is, a people who offer worship to God) so Jesus established the Twelve as the founders and leaders of the new Israel, the Catholic and apostolic Church, in communion with the successors of St Peter.

It was, despite their personal differences and idiosyncrasies, but in communion with one another and with the Lord, that their strength lay, not as separate individuals, working alone.

Even today – more so, perhaps - the assortment of men called by name to share the apostolic ministry - remains a somewhat diverse lot! And the same can be said of the assortment of men and women who through baptism are also called to be members of the "kingdom of priests", the 'consecrated nation" of the New Covenant.

The first apostles would likely have never got through a modern selection process for ordination, perhaps with the exception of – as one wag once pointed out, Judas Iscariot! And as outsiders look around our congregations today, sceptics and opponents might consider us as not the kind of people employment agencies would recommend for the immense task expected of a people who claim to do the work of God!

However, we are the kind of people God chooses.

Individually, we are frail: but in communion with the Church we belong to that priestly people formed in the power and strength of the Holy Spirit whose dwelling place the Church is, and in communion with the apostles and their equally diverse successors.

All of us, however, not just clergy, are called by name to be the priestly, consecrated people mentioned in sacred Scripture.

Jesus has chosen each of us, through baptism, to follow him and to work with him, and to assist the successors of the apostles in the task of bringing about the Kingdom of God. We are called because he loves us.

In loving us Christ opens the way for us to love and serve him and each other, within the communion and fellowship of his holy Church, in the service of all mankind.

Christ knows each of us by name, and calls each of us by name, for the person we are, and the person we might become. As his followers, we are marked indelibly as his by our individual baptismal/Christian names. Further, in a tradition going back to the first disciples in Antioch, we also identify ourselves by his name. We are Christians.

May God bless us all in the tasks we undertake in his Most Holy Name.

U.K. VISITOR

The leader [Ordinary] of the United Kingdom's Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham, the Right Rev Monsignor Keith Newton will be visiting St Patrick's, Mentone on Sunday September 1st. Monsignor Newton will preside and preach at the Ordinariate Mass at **9.30 am.** He is in Australia to attend the installation of Monsignor Carl Reid the new leader of the Australian Ordinariate of Our Lady of the Southern Cross, in St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney, by the Archbishop of Sydney, Anthony Fisher, on August 27th.

Monsignor Newton, was appointed leader of the U.K. Ordinariate by Pope Benedict XVI in 2011. Before his reception into the Catholic Church he was a bishop of the Church of England. There are now 100 former clergy of the Church of England who have been ordained Catholic priests through the Ordinariate.

September 1st. is the Solemnity of Our Lady of the Southern Cross, who is also the patron of the Catholic Diocese of Toowoomba, and several parishes and schools in Australia. RW
