A New Season - A New Start Welcome Back & Welcome Home

As if the Covid19 virus knows our Church timetable - we start again, with the first Sunday of Advent - this new season of the church's calendar year leads us all to the possibility of new birth in Jesus Christ. In the Southern Hemisphere we also start the warm summer season too!

As a nation, with limited numbers of the Coronavirus present in our society, we also begin a new way of living in society - Covid Normal - until the availability of a vaccine for our population is rolled out, several months from now! This vaccine, once in our community, will be our only hope to a normal way of daily life that we took for granted 12 months ago, before this Covid19 virus spread so rapidly throughout our world.

What you need to know:

80 people can now attend Sunday and weekday Masses at Monty & Eltham.

Our Church area inside allows for the appropriate spacing requirements from the Health Authorities, Government & Archdiocese of Melbourne.



Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals also follow this 80 people threshold while inside our churches of St. Francis Xavier and Our Lady Help of Christians because of our given footprint (density quotient of 1 person per 4sq.m.). If this social spacing changes in the next few months to half that, as in Queensland & New South Wales - we will be able to double our numbers!

What you need to do:

- Please: **Sign In** on the sheets provided.
- Please: continue to wear a **mask/face covering** while inside our churches.
- Please: use hand sanitizer.
- Please: socially distance from each other **1.5 metres apart**.

Please: **leave every second pew vacant** - so that no one sits directly behind or in front of you during any service. Obviously, families can sit together, but must socially distance from another family or person unknown to them - out of respect for their health and yours too.

This is all wonderful news for our strong Catholic Communities of SFX and OLHC, but it is certainly NEW and definitely not the Normal way - but for now it is an acceptable way forward to pray and be together!



1st SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2020

Restrictions are easing and life is opening up again. Some of us are already finding there's too much to do as we prepare for Christmas. Yet for many of us, we are relieved that the long days of home isolation are over and we can see people again. We are so glad to have more to do as we prepare for Christmas.

Right now we come to this season of Advent, sometimes called 'the season of waiting', as we prepare for the Christmas Feast. Waiting has certainly been very much a feature of this 2020 year. We have waited for the restrictions to ease, for the chance to gather as families again, for being able to welcome someone into our homes, for shops to open and businesses to resume trade, for a chance to holiday again. We are waiting for a vaccine.

We spend so much time waiting. We wait in queues at supermarkets. We wait for a bus, a tram or a train. We wait for a phone call. We wait in a doctor's or a dentist's surgery.

We wake up in the early hours of the morning and wait for the dawn to come and the alarm to ring. Children wait for their birthday and count down the sleeps. We wait to see if we have an interview for a job and then we wait to hear if we were successful. Parents await the birth of their child. An old person in a nursing home waits for a visit from family or a friend. How difficult this has been in Covid19 times, when for the last 7 or 8 months, no-one could visit.

Waiting is part of life, and we ask ourselves how well do we wait? Do we become impatient and frustrated or can we make these waiting times into spaces of listening and presence? Maybe even those moments of waiting in a queue can become a chance to be still and awake to the gift of life.

Poet and philosopher Michael Leunig wrote a poem entitled: 'We must make do with scraps'. Here are a few of his lines:

"Little scraps of peace and quiet. A few crumbs of fun, a tiny flake of beauty, one teaspoon of enthusiasm. Off cuts of each other. A skerrick of community. A snippet of eye contact. A wisp of good humour. A sample of compassion.

Left-overs, oddments, remnants of the glorious situation. A fragment of God. Not much really. Sorry. Time's up."

Can we in our waiting time catch a skerrick of community, a wisp of good humour, a tiny flake of beauty, a fragment of God? Maybe these times are 'leftovers and oddments, not much really', as Michael Leunig says. Yet perhaps they are more important than we can ever imagine.

For these times can also be sacred moments where we sense the presence of God among us, ever inviting us into the mystery of living. We are to be present to the now.

In a way, our Gospel for this first Sunday of Advent takes up this invitation. We listen to Jesus saying to his disciples, 'Be on your guard, stay awake because you never know when the time will come'. Jesus then tells the story of a man travelling abroad, leaving his servants in charge, and asking them to stay awake in carrying out their responsibilities, always prepared for his return.

As the disciples of Jesus today, are we awake to the opportunities and responsibilities of being his servants in our world today? In our waiting times, even though they may be oddments and fragments, can we sense an invitation to recognise the presence of Christ?

As we prepare for another Christmas, we await again the presence of Jesus Christ, born among us again and again. This same Jesus Christ, calls on us to be awake and ready to welcome him into our lives. And even and especially our waiting times can be opportunities to recognise him in our midst.

Advent Reflections: Waiting in hope

In the first of her meditations for the journey towards Christmas, Sr Teresa White considers the poignant signature tune of this time of year

God's promises are accomplished within the boundaries of time. The promise of a Saviour was made in the Garden of Eden, but it was fulfilled slowly, and many centuries were to pass before the coming of Jesus.

The scripture readings of Advent invite us to recall our faith history, to assume posture of the expectant people of Israel, waiting in joyful hope for the coming of the Messiah. Seeing what is happening in our world today, we realise, like our ancestors in the faith, that we have a very real need of a Saviour. So words like waiting, yearning, hoping, longing, listening, praying, and staying awake are Advent words, Advent concepts. Through them, we enter into the wistful atmosphere of the Advent season.

Three times in chapter 13 of Mark's Gospel (which is read on the First Sunday of Advent), Jesus tells us, "Stay awake!" When we're waiting, we're "awake", we're on the alert for something or someone:



news, a bus or a train, a dear friend, a family member, a letter, an email, a phone call, a Skype or text message, a sign or a sound, some information that is important to us. While we wait, if we have eyes to see and ears to hear, we will experience God's presence in what is happening around us.

Waiting can give us the opportunity to see and hear and feel things we're often too busy to notice. And while we wait, we may see other waiting people, pensioners, parents, disabled people, teenagers,

young children, and notice the look in their eyes, the joy, the pain, the hope, the despair; we may see beautiful things, ugly things; we may hear a kind word, a cruel word, a baby's cry, a shout of rage, a snatch of music... Such experiences are all part of the Advent journey.

"Waiting in hope" is the signature tune of Advent, and this year, perhaps more than ever because of the pandemic, we long to hear the melody of hope in our lives. Anna's waiting for a word from her doctor on the results of a biopsy, fearful that "it" has come Richard watches daily for a letter, expecting word from the university, wondering if he's been accepted... Ellen's invited her husband to sit down and talk, realising that their marriage is on the rocks, but he's left the house in a rage, and now she's asking herself if he'll ever come back... Ted's firm closed down six weeks ago, and he's anxious and exhausted, looking for a Marie, at the new job...

end of a long queue, all her belongings in two black bin bags, is afraid that by the time she gets to the door of the Salvation Army night shelter, all the beds will be taken... Alan wants a drink badly, it's been three months since his last one, and he can sense himself falling... This morning, Meg had an interview for a job she really wanted, and now she's waiting to hear the outcome... These are all Advent people. They're waiting in hope.

In his book, Dynamics of Faith, Paul Tillich says that often it is in moments of helplessness that we experience the transforming power of grace: "Grace strikes us when we are in great pain and restlessness... strikes us when, year after longed-for the perfection of life does not appear, when the old compulsions reign within us as they have for decades, when despair destroys all joy and courage."

When grace "strikes" us in this way, things may not be outwardly better than before, but we know in the depths of our being that God has touched us, and that our time of waiting in hope has not been in vain.

Sr Teresa White belongs to the Faithful Companions of Jesus. A former teacher, she spent many years in the ministry of spirituality at Katherine House, a retreat and conference centre run by her congregation in Salford.

Gospel: Mark 13:33-37

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come. It is like a man travelling abroad: he has gone from home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!'



Reflection

All three synoptic gospels include an account of Jesus speaking in Jerusalem about the end times before he enters upon the passion that leads to his death. The language of Jesus' discourse is full of foreboding: he warns of upheavals in heaven and on earth, of destruction and desolation, persecution and betrayal. All of these are features of the apocalyptic literature that seems to have been common enough in Jesus' day. Now it is all but impossible for us to disentangle where he (or the evangelist) is talking about the destruction of Jerusalem, about a final cosmic conflict, or about the coming of the Son of Man.

Three times we are warned to "stay awake!". It's the same admonition that Jesus repeats to Peter, James and John in the garden of Gethsemane, when he is facing his own "end time". His whole mission and his very life are under threat and he has to summon every ounce of energy to go on. Jesus wants us to be under no illusions as to what is at stake when the cost of discipleship confronts us. We need to be alert and ready to choose life.
