19th SUNDAY OF THE YEAR 2021

The Olympics in Tokyo are all but over. Have we enjoyed them, have we found tears in our eyes, have we rejoiced in the wonderful performances of the competitors?

Or do we have a view that the Games should have been cancelled. The risks and the costs were too great, and Covid 19 in Japan and around the world should surely have meant the cancellation of the Olympic Games this year?

Whatever our view something very profound has happened in our world. It has something to do with face masks and isolation to protect people from the virus. And yet there has been tremendous connection between people. I don't know about you but I have been so touched by the spontaneity and sportsmanship of the competitors. I will always remember Cate Campbell's delight in Emma McKeon's gold medal swim in the 100 metres, even though she had finished 7th in the event.

Let me quote a few lines from an article in last Saturday's Age, written by Malcolm Knox. He writes about the isolation and yet connection of the Games.

"This duality of isolation and connection is the paradox and in a sense the miracle of Tokyo 2020. Whilst these Olympics have been all about insulating people from each other, they have also bound people together... The people of the world are more in sync because they are all suffering from this pandemic."

He writes:

"Ups and downs have transported us out of our bubbles, out of where we are and transported us to the inner lives of others. As a result millions have been hit with a good dose of compassion that sport, spontaneous and unscripted has a unique capacity to produce."

It's been a fascinating two weeks of television for many of us, as we have watched the joy and the pain, the disappointment, the excitement and the camaraderie, the appreciation of the competitors in thanking their coaches, and their team. We have seen the love and delight of their families even though they are watching from afar. And let me also add word of thanks to the commentators and broadcasters who have been so positive in their comments, even when a competitor is not amongst the medals.

And the compassion of the world for Simone Biles, an absolute star in gymnastics and she just couldn't do what she has always done. She withdrew from most of her events, the pressure just too much and we all felt for her. And how courageous of her to take her place in the Beam event, with the eyes of the world on her and she did so well: a bronze medal.

Yes, the Olympics are over and we will gather in Paris in 3 years time, hopefully.

Many of us will be talking about the Tokyo Olympics for a long time. Perhaps the Games have been a tonic to brighten up our world.

Maybe there is a connection in all this with today's Readings. We look at that First Reading. Elijah exhausted and lying under a bush wishing he was dead. And an angel of the Lord came to him and touched him, telling him to eat and drink. Elijah did this, but back to the bush again he went in his misery. The angel of the Lord touched him a second time telling him to eat and drink for the journey ahead. Elijah ate and drank and felt the strength and the resolve to walk and reach his destination.

Maybe an angel of the Lord has touched our world with the wonderful gift of the young and at times not so young people of the Olympics. And maybe many of us feel a strength, a belief, a compassion, a hope that gives us heart in continuing the journey of life in these difficult times.

Warm greetings all, we are really into winter now although we do see the sun peek through occasionally.

Below is an update on some of our wonderful programs.

Community Pantry: Emely contacted us as she was very concerned about the number of families in need of food. Community Pantries are popping up in many places throughout the Philippines. The Good Shepherd Sisters have some in a range of areas. They have been operating for approximately 6 months. The idea is that the community members bring along whatever they have a little extra of and place it on the table then they can take food that they would like that they don't have.

Fr Gerry and the kind parishioners of St Kevin's Lower Templestowe gave seed funding for this and Emely purchased noodles, sardines and eggs which were very popular. The first Pantry was held in the Patupat community. Each person was registered, had to hand wash and wear a mask. 102 families took part in this initial day and everybody enjoyed the offerings. Emely will run Pantries in other KAID barangays.

Our KAID Barili community was extremely pleased to receive a donation of salt and brown sugar towards the Pantry from the rice vendor at Barili market who KAID purchases rice from very regularly. What a wonderful way for communities to work together and assist each other in these very difficult times. The Philippines is still in full pandemic mode with COVID.

<u>Livelihood programs</u>: Emely and our staff did some investigations into a mung bean/bean sprout growing project several months ago. There are certainly some health benefits from these so, following their project submission, the KAID committee gave funding for several members in a number of barangays to set up their project. This has been a good and ongoing project although the returns are small but important. It has enabled some community members to work together to achieve their goals. It has been assessed that this project is worth continuing. The piglet, goat and chicken livelihood programs are going along well and assisting a number of families. Sponsorship program: We are so happy that our sponsorship program is going well. Certainly there are many challenges as our students are not at school but at home doing modules which is proving quite difficult for students as many of the subjects they haven't studied. KAID staff and senior students continue to conduct classes on some weekends to assist children who may be struggling as part of our Child Development sessions. We are extremely grateful to all involved in this assistance program. We thank them so very much for their time and expertise that they have given to KAID.

Breanna travelled to the Philippines a couple of years ago as a final year Occupational Therapy student along with two fellow final year students, Jessica and Rana. They spent a month within our communities – spending time at schools and with many of our children to learn of the needs. They are all hoping to return when COVID allows.

<u>Friendship Schools:</u> What a wonderful program this is! Our caring school communities in Australia really are 'caring friends' to their student friends in their Friendship Schools in Cebu. What a difference they are making for their Filipino student friends. The provision of basic school items donated is a tremendous help. Photocopiers are vital for each Friendship school and recently one was delivered to Buhisan Elementary given by their Australian Friendship school, St Francis Xavier Primary, Montmorency. What a difference they make!

Parishioners and students of St Kevin's, Lower Templestowe, along with Fr Gerry McKernan, have been able to raise funds to construct a shelter for the students and parents at Luyo Elementary school, there was nothing to protect them when out of classrooms. They were also able to provide a water tank as the school is at the top of a hill and water wasn't pumped up so the water tank really made a great difference for students and teachers.

Books are sent for all ages which the children enjoy very much. Libraries have been established in all schools and our Day Care Centres which is exciting and very popular. Sometimes the older children will assist younger children struggling with reading, which is a great help.

In my Franciscan tradition, joy comes from an inner realisation of true experiential union with God (or Reality, Consciousness, and Life itself!). This realisation descends upon us at ever deeper levels as we walk our faith journey. Authentic joy, however, takes pace through our pain - not under it, to the right, left, or over it. There is much covering up, escaping, or denying our suffering in unhealthy religion. God calls us, instead, to the whole paschal mystery - passion, death, and resurrection. CAC teacher Barbara Holmes knows that such joy is for both the individual and the community, providing sustaining, life-giving power for marginalised people.

Our current circumstances require resilience and the steadfast belief that joy is a healing inner event and a spiritual practice... BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour) folks who remember the ways of the elders have seen it in action. Performance of joy while the wounds are still being inflicted is not a display of otherworldly strength. It is an act of faith that God will not give us more than we can bear...

Personal and communal joy require authenticity. We have to stop performing the blackness that whiteness created, the stereotypes and secret-keeping. We have to sing ourselves sane and dance ourselves free. Each act of public joy is one step closer to that risky leap toward transcendence...

Performing joy offers healing from our addictive engagement with domination systems. We are not required to fight for our reality; we can just live it... We are being invited to awaken to our true nature as spirit beings, energy sharers, and prophets of potential. The joy spoken of in Holy Scripture is accessible, but also has a certain "beyondness" to it: The world didn't give it and the world can't take it away. As we hear from Jesus in John 16:22: "So you have pain now; but I will see you again and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you."

Sikh human rights activist and write Valarie Kaur understands the healing power of joy, even amidst what she describes as the necessary "labours" of life:

Joy is possible even amid great labours - the labour of dying, the labour of birthing, and the labours between. We cannot force it. But when we create moments to breathe between labour pains, and surrender our senses to the present moment, notice the colours and light and feeling of being alive, here, together, joy comes more easily. It is a felt sense in our bodies. In the face of horrors visited upon our world daily, in the struggle to protect our loved ones, choosing to let in joy is a revolutionary act. Joy returns us to everything good and beautiful and worth fighting for. It gives us energy for the long labour... Joy is the gift of love: it makes the labour an end in itself. I believe labouring in joy is the meaning of life.



Gospel - Matthew 6:25-34

Jesus said to his disciples: I am telling you not to worry about your life and what you are to eat, nor about your body and what you are to wear. Surely life is more than food, and the body more than clothing! Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? Can any of you, however much you worry, add one single cubit to your span of life? And why worry about clothing? Think of the flowers growing in the fields; they never have to work or spin: yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his royal robes was clothed like one of these. Now if that is how God clothes the wild flowers growing in the field which are there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you have so little faith? So do not worry; do not say, "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? What are we to wear?" It is the gentiles who set their hears on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on God's saving justice, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow: tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.



Reflection

We might not be surprised that the gospel text for the feast of Mary MacKillop comes from the Sermon on the Mount. But the passage chosen, like Mary's life, poses a question we'd rather avoid. In what do we place our trust? Is it material things (money, food, clothing) or is it the God who unfailingly cares for all? Where does our heart lie? Is our heart set on what we possess or on the reign of God?

The passage as a whole is framed by two statements of Jesus. The first is: "You cannot be the slave both of God and of money." The second is: "Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on his righteousness, and all these other things will be given you as well." In between, Jesus offers engaging images and speaks in conversational terms.

Readers have a two-fold challenge on their hands with this text. The first is to hold the congregation's attention throughout a reading that may be all too familiar. The second is to deliver it with enough appeal to be able to bypass the entrenched defences of people for whom material cares are the stuff of daily living. Not an easy task!

The final verse should not be given much emphasis; it seems to be an independent saying that has become attached here by word association.

Break Open the Word 2021
