

Hopes and Consultations

Here we are approaching Christmas and summer relaxation-time and yet Church discussions and consultations keep on coming. There are three on-going:

- Consultations re Missions Plan: There is some rest on this one. At our last meeting of the PFT 1 (Parish Future Team) 11/11/2021, we resolved to focus on developing the OLHC-Eltham/SFX-Montmorency tie, and to leave exploration of relations with other parishes etc. under the Archbishop's missions plan until we find our feet after Terry Kean's retirement and the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions. There will be no further meetings on these matters until February or March 2022.
- PC consultations: Leading up to the second Assembly, the Drafting Committee (the PC Assembly 2 members plus *periti* – nominated 'experts' like Frank Brennan) will work with the PC steering Committee to continue "communal discernment". In December-January they will work to draft "thematic documents which collate and capture the proposals from the first assembly. After Easter 2022, the drafted versions of the documents will be made available for the whole People of God" for comment and discussion (quotes are from Lana Turvey Collins writing in *Plenary Post, Edition 41*). After editing (presumably to reflect comments from the faithful) proposals will be entered into the agenda for the second Assembly. The short of all that is that we are not yet served with any deadlines for further participation in the PC process leading up to the Second Assembly July 4 -9. They will come after Easter. There will be only a short time after Easter for submissions before the agenda for the second Assembly is finalised. In this perspective, the time between now and Easter is the time to formulate short-lists of concrete issues that we have reason to hope the Second Assembly will deliberate on. These include mandating diocesan pastoral councils, and the appointment of women to key positions in ecclesial decisionmaking bodies. Keep tuned for further details in New Year editions of Monty & Eltham. For ideas about how we may participate in the making of the agenda for the July 2022 Assembly see Plenary Post Edition 41 Nov 2021.
- Synod of Bishops consultations: The good news here comes from Archbishop Coleridge, Chair of 3. the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference. He has addressed confusion about the overlap of the PC and Bishops Synod processes. He stresses that the PC and the Synod are 'interweaving' – "in other words, the local and the universal working together and enriching each other." The practical implication seems to be that consultations for both may proceed together and involve the same personnel. On timelines for Synod consultations, Trudy Dantis, who runs the Australian Council of Bishops National Centre for Pastoral Research and is the national coordinator for the Synod of Bishops process, has recently posted a revision: the deadline for local submissions on the Bishops' questions from December 12 2021 to February 27 2022. Those questions are to be found in Pope Francis' announcement of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops which can be found, together with other information about the synod and how to participate, at <u>www.catholic.org.au/synodalchurch</u>. Again, keep tuned!

Advent Meditation / Peace through integrity

In her commentary on the first reading for the Second Sunday of Advent, Leonie Caldecott continues her journey through the season of waiting, puzzled and anxious, for the coming of the Christ-child

"A voice cries in the wilderness: prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight." St John the Baptist is the prophet of the turning point, where the old covenant cedes to the new. The moment is foretold by another great prophet, Isaiah. More than simply predicting events, a prophet tells us what is really going on. If you think about it, the two things are inseparable. What is coming in the future has its roots in the present struggle: between our alienation from the God in whose image we are made, and our need to reintegrate with that which we have despoiled.

The first reading (Baruch 5:1-9) almost seems to frame this reconciliation as a kind of "And the forest bathing. forests and every fragrant tree will provide shade for Israel at the command of God: for God will guide Israel in joy



by the light of his glory with his mercy and integrity for escort."

Integrity. The word was already there last week, in the reading from Jeremiah, who spoke of the need for "honesty and integrity in the land". Not just the land, but the city too. "And this is the name the city will be called: The-Lord-our-integrity." This week the word appears again, several times, in the reading from Baruch. Jeremiah's disciple. Here, the

city is given a very particular title: "Peace through integrity, and honour through devotedness."

What does Jerusalem stand for here? It is the place of integration, the peaceful haven, the site of the Temple. For Christians, of course, it is one image of the Church: a complicated body of people perpetually caught between trepidation and devotion as they await the Parousia. And that's another word to conjure with: an ancient Greek expression to denote the official visit of a powerful figure. With the coming of Christ, the power element is turned on its head: as Pope Francis has put it, the Church is not a business transaction, but a love story. She speaks through the prophets, not the profits. She sings through those troubadours of the Bridegroom, who is coming to turn water into wine, and

wine into our very lifeblood. We already know this love story will entail the Cross; we also know that what is sown in tears will yield a rich harvest.

So the prophet exhorts us to put off our "clothes of sorrow and distress" and put on "the cloak of the integrity of God" instead. The almighty, it seems, wants to crown us with his own glory. The coming of this "Tremendous Lover", as Catherine Hueck Doherty calls him, would overwhelm us, if it weren't for the fact that he hides safest, within the most ordinary of places. A hillside waystation for the feeding of beasts. The muted ocean of a woman's womb. Within this most intimate of citadels, mercy and integrity are united.

Within these walls of flesh, the child stretches out minute fingers towards the dim light of the star-shot sky: fingers destined to touch and heal the wayward world.



Gospel - Luke 3:1-6

In the fifteenth year of Tiberius Caesar's reign, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judaea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of the lands of Ituraea and Trachonitis, Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene, during the pontificate of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah, in the wilderness. He went through the whole Jordan district proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the sayings of the prophet Isaiah:

A voice cries in the wilderness; Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley will be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, winding ways will be straightened and rough roads made smooth. And all mankind shall see the salvation of God.



Reflection

Advent is a season of patient waiting. While we wait for the story of Jesus' birth, Luke takes us some decades ahead to the preaching of John the Baptist. He prefaces this with an introduction that embeds his gospel in time and place. Having promised at the outset to write "an orderly account of the events that have been fulfilled among us" (1:3), he now claims historical credence for his narrative by naming contemporary imperial and religious authorities.

Into this world of ceaseless power-broking the word of God is spoken. Luke's mundane roll-call of office-holders is suddenly shot through with surprise. A lone voice in the wilderness of Judaea speaks out, signalling the start of what would become a global revolution. The marvel of this unexpected turn of events will be conveyed to the assembly if the reader names each of Luke's movers and shakers in turn with unrushed deliberation, before proclaiming the dramatic main clause with conviction. This leads into a spirited rendition of the Baptist's proclamation.

Ironically John's use of Isaiah's oracle (cited also by Baruch) conjures up images of the progress of a conquering tyrant, for whose return in triumph every obstacle must be removed. Jesus' path, by contrast, grew narrower, harder and ever more lonely until it became a way of the cross.

But for now we let our hearts thrill with the promise of salvation for all. As Simeon proclaimed on seeing the child Jesus, here was "a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel" (2:29-32).
