Pope Francis: 'Day of Fasting for Peace' for Ukraine - Ash Wednesday

Another urgent call has been made by Pope Francis for the Church to pray and fast for the situation in Ukraine.

At his general audience on Wednesday 23 February, he said that despite the efforts of world leaders, 'increasingly alarming scenarios are opening up.'

To those in positions of political authority, Pope Francis pleaded to 'examine their consciences seriously before God, who is the God of peace and not of war, who is the Father of all, not just of some, who wants us to be brothers and not enemies.'

Ash Wednesday, 2 March 2022, Pope Francis has declared to be a Day of Fasting for Peace:

'I encourage believers in a special way to dedicate themselves intensely to prayer and fasting on that day. May the Queen of Peace preserve the world from the madness of war.'

A declaration of war

This comes just as Vladimir Putin announced a 'special military operation' in Eastern Ukraine that was aimed at 'the demilitarisation and denazification' of the region.

Reporters on the ground in Ukraine could hear artillery fire and explosions. A minister in the office of Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has said that a 'full-scale invasion' is beginning to unfold.

This action is being taken as a declaration of war. U.S. President has said that 'the world will hold Russia accountable' for its actions in Ukraine.

Prayer and fasting

As the situation becomes increasingly unstable, and as the news continues to flood the screens, let us take up Pope Francis' call. Let us offer our prayers and fasting up on Ash Wednesday for the innocent life in Ukraine that will suffer because of this war, and for political leaders around the world that they can solve this situation quickly and peacefully.

Ukraine - a short history:

Ukraine is a country in Eastern Europe. It is currently at war with Russia. It is the second-largest country by area in Europe after Russia, which it borders to the east and north-east. Ukraine also shares borders with Belarus to the north; Poland, Slovakia, and Hungary to the west; Romania and Moldova to the south; and has a coastline along the Sea of Azov and the Black Sea. It spans an area of 603,628 km² (233,062 sq mi), with a population of 42 Million and is the eighth-most populous country in Europe. The nation's capital and largest city is Kyiv.

The territory of modern Ukraine has been inhabited since 32,000 BC. During the Middle Ages, the area was a key centre of East Slavic culture, with the loose tribal federation Kievan Rus' forming the basis of Ukrainian identity. Following its fragmentation into several principalities in the 13th century and the devastation created by the Mongol invasion, the territorial unity collapsed and the area was contested, divided, and ruled by a variety of powers, including the Polish–Lithuanian Commonwealth, Austria-Hungary, the Ottoman Empire, and Tsardom of Russia. A Cossack Hetmanate emerged and prospered during the 17th and 18th centuries, but its territory was eventually split between Poland and the Russian Empire. In the aftermath of the Russian Revolution, a Ukrainian national movement for self-determination emerged, and the internationally recognized Ukrainian People's Republic was declared on 23 June 1917. The Ukrainian SSR was a founding member of the Soviet Union in 1922. The country regained its independence in 1991, following the dissolution of the Soviet Union.

Following its independence, Ukraine declared itself a neutral state; it formed a limited military partnership with Russia and other CIS countries while also establishing a partnership with NATO in 1994. In 2013, after the government of President Viktor Yanukovych had decided to suspend the Ukraine–European Union Association Agreement and seek closer economic ties with Russia, a several-months-long wave of demonstrations and protests known as the Euromaidan began, which later escalated into the Revolution of Dignity that led to the overthrow of Yanukovych and the establishment of a new government. These events formed the background for the annexation of Crimea by Russia in March 2014 and the War in Donbas, a protracted conflict with Russian-backed separatists, from April 2014 until the Russian invasion in February 2022. Ukraine applied for the economic component of the Deep and Comprehensive Free Trade Area with the European Union on 1 January 2016.

Ukraine is a developing country ranking 74th in the Human Development Index. It is the poorest country in Europe, suffering from a very high poverty rate as well as severe corruption.

However, because of its extensive fertile farmlands, Ukraine is one of the largest grain exporters in the world. Ukraine is a unitary republic under a semi-presidential system with separation of powers into legislative, executive, and judicial branches. The country is a member of the United Nations, the Council of Europe, the OSCE, the GUAM organization, the Association Trio, and the Lublin Triangle.

Under President Vladimir Putin - Russia wants Ukraine back under its fold.

Terrible times are ahead for this land and its people, for Europe and the World - we are now entering into a possible time of conflict.

THE WAR IS A BIG DISASTER': ZELENSKYY'S ADDRESS IN FULL

On Wednesday, as Russia prepared to attack Ukraine, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy made an emotional address to his nation.

This is what he said:



"Today I initiated a phone call with the president of the Russian Federation. The result was silence. Though the silence should be in Donbas. That's why I want to address today the people of Russia. I am addressing you not as a president, I am addressing you as a citizen of Ukraine.

More than 2,000km of the common border is dividing us. Along this border your troops are stationed, almost 200,000 soldiers, thousands of military vehicles. Your leaders approved them to make a step forward, to the territory of another country. And this step can be the beginning of a big war on the European continent.

We know for sure that we don't need the war.

Not a Cold War, not a hot war. Not a hybrid one. But if we'll be attacked by the [enemy] troops, if they try to take our country away from us, our freedom, our lives, the lives of our children, we will defend ourselves. Not attack, but defend ourselves. And when you will be attacking us, you will see our faces, not our backs, but our faces.

The war is a big disaster, and this disaster has a high price. With every meaning of this word. People lose money, reputation, quality of life, they lose freedom. But the main thing is that people lose their loved ones, they lose themselves.

They told you that Ukraine is posing a threat to Russia. It was not the case in the past, not in the present, it's not going to be in the future. You are demanding security guarantees from NATO, but we also demand security guarantees. Security for Ukraine from you, from Russia and other guarantees of the Budapest memorandum.

But our main goal is peace in Ukraine and the safety of our people, Ukrainians. For that, we are ready to have talks with anybody, including you, in any format, on any platform. The war will deprive [security] guarantees from everybody – nobody will have guarantees of security any more. Who will suffer the most from it? The people. Who doesn't want it the most? The people! Who can stop it? The people. But are there those people among you? I am sure.

I know that they [the Russian state] won't show my address on Russian TV, but Russian people have to see it. They need to know the truth, and the truth is that it is time to stop now, before it is too late. And if the Russian leaders don't want to sit with us behind the table for the sake of peace, maybe they will sit behind the table with you. Do Russians want the war? I would like to know the answer. But the answer depends only on you, citizens of the Russian Federation."

The conversations we have to have.

As we are about to begin our Lenten Journey it seems a good time to continue the ongoing conversation about Child Safety and how best to protect our children, young people and the vulnerable. Through this ongoing conversation we create a nurturing environment where children are respected, where their voices are heard, where they feel safe and are safe.

We have a need to empower children and young people in our parishes and to create a safer future for our children. The Royal Commission and recent studies have taught us that when children are engaged, valued, informed and able to participate positively in parish life, this contributes to a child having a sense of safety and an awareness of child safety. This approach in turn is a contributing factor in helping prevent abuse. Once the conversation is engaged in, we begin to make changes.

During some of the Sundays of Lent we are proposing to focus our attention on a few 2-3 minute video clips of an interview by Geraldine Doogue with Robert Fitzgerald, former Commissioner of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

These brief videos clips discuss numerous aspects of child safety, including:

- The need to begin the conversation of child safety with children and their families.
- The need for a conversation that naturally takes place within parishes. (An open conversation.)
- A reminder that Child abuse thrives on an environment of secrecy.
- The importance of Safeguards in establishing a child safe environment, and
- The impact of Abuse.

Gospel - Luke 6:39-45

Jesus told a parable to his disciples. 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, not gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the stor of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'



Reflection

As noted in the introduction to last Sunday's readings, Luke disperses some of Matthew's Sermon on the Mount through Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Today he does the opposite. For this third passage from the Sermon on the Plain Luke draws together material from diverse places in Matthew's gospel. It forms the final section prior to the sermon's conclusion which we only ever hear in Matthew's version.

Luke strings elements of Jesus' teaching together without attempting to unify them smoothly. The first two are very short. One is an easily pictured scene of a blind person leading another into a ditch, the other a saying about the relationship between disciples and masters. The next is longer. It plays in an exaggerated way with the idea of splinters and planks in the eye in order to expose the evil of hypocrisy. Finally a connection with the first reading and psalm is established via wisdom sayings about trees and plants, the fruit they may or may not bear, and how this image can be applied to human living.

Presumably all this wisdom was common currency in Jesus' day. There are no specific indications that Jesus had taken and reworked it, though exposing and condemning hypocrisy was clearly a particular concern of his. Each part of this reading provides its own food for thought and should be proclaimed accordingly. **Break Open the Word 2022**
