

ZEN IS FULFILLING HIS ROLE AS A CATHOLIC LEADER

Critics of the Vatican's policy of seeking dialogue with Communist China are right to regard the arrest of Cardinal Joseph Zen as a warning of worse to come. The Chinese government regards conformity with its policies as a civic duty and a test of loyalty, a test the 90-year-old cardinal clearly fails. But Zen, Bishop Emeritus of Hong Kong, is not acting outside his competence or authority as a senior Catholic leader. In upholding human rights he is upholding an integral part of the Church's teaching.

It may not suit the Vatican's negotiators with Beijing to say so, however, as a tacit downplaying of the4 political aspects of the Catholic Church's proper role in any society may have been the price that had to be paid to reach an agreement. The temptation is to accept the demand that the Church should remain in the sanctuary and not "interfere" - as its opponents would describe it - in matters of state.

Yet there are many aspects of life under the rule of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) which the Catholic Church has to regard as intolerable, including the suppression of the freedom of belief and worship of Muslins Uvghur and Buddhists. Here Cardinal Charles Bo, Archbishop of Yangon in China's neighbour, Myanmar, sets a shining example. But while Bo has had Vatican support, Zen has not. In its treatment of Zen, the central administration of the Church is at risk of seeming to act like a totalitarian regime itself.

Cardinal Zen's actual offence concerns his involvement in efforts to relieve the lot of those arrested in Hong Kong's pro-democracy street disturbances. The Humanitarian Relief Fund, which he supports, is under police investigation for alleged "collusion with foreign forces", contrary to Chinese law. The Chinese authorities are determined to bring Hong Kong into line with the Chinese mainland's routine suppression of dissent and denial of basic rights.

The Vatican's policy of engagement with Beijing aims to unify a Church in China which had been divided between bishops who have state approval and those that do not, the so-called "underground church". One of this policy's severest critics is Lord Patten, the last governor of Hong Kong, who feels the Vatican has misread the nature of the Beijing regime. ideology of the CCP, which has hardened under its present leader Xi Jinping, demands total subservience to the party in all matters. There is no for agencies - whether room journalistic, commercial, academic, religious, or anything else - that are independent of party control. In other words, there is no room for what the West calls "civil society". It is significant that in reaching agreement over the appointment of bishops with the Vatican, the CCP seems to have allowed a chink in the armour of this totalitarian hegemony. The Catholic Church in China now recognized by both the Vatican and the CCP has yet to flex any muscles by criticizing the Communist regime, as both Zen and Bo have done. Arresting Zen serves as a warning to it not to step out of line. But unless it has the freedom to do so, it can hardly be called Catholic.

CANON LAW WILL NOT BRING THE FAITHFUL BACK TO MASS

When the word "obligation" referring to the duty on Catholics under Canon Law to attend Mass on Sundays - occurs six times in a statement of the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, there appears to be a hidden message. At the onset of the Covid pandemic in 2020, the bishops ordered churches to close, though parishes were allowed to stream a solitary priest celebrating Mass. They issued a statement suspending the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until they said otherwise. Which they have now done, applicable from the feast of Pentecost on 5 June. The term comes from Canon 1247: "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass." The traditional version of this rule used to add "...on pain of mortal sin", and that seems to be implied by the bishops, though it is not stated.

Two things are odd about this. The first is its contrast to the rest of the language of the bishops' statement, which refers to an "invitation" to resume Sunday Mass-going and speaks of "a profound desire to participate in the Holy Mass". "We glory in being a Eucharistic people for whom attendance at Mass is essential," they write. This is not the dead language of legal obligation but the living language of joyous faith. These two ways of describing participation in the Mass do not complement or reinforce each other. Faith sometimes requires the support of a sense of duty, but the obligations that flow from love are not felt more

keenly when they are enforced by law. The Catholic faithful have been returning to Mass, and many Easter congregations were reportedly packed, even with some Covid restrictions still in place. Did they still need to be herded back to Mass? The image the bishops' statement gives of a typical lay person - a docile robot obeying instructions rather than an autonomous individual guided by an informed conscience - does not reflect most priests' understanding of the faith of their parishioners.

The second oddity is its lack of attention to the rest of Canon 1247, under the same rubric of "obligation": "Moreover," it goes on, "they are to abstain from those works and affairs which hinder the worship to be rendered to God, the joy proper to the Lord's day, or the suitable relaxation of mind and body." Under pain of mortal sin? This is not an aspect of the Church's teaching the bishops appear to have properly considered, despite many of them being canon lawyers Post-Covid, British society is heading rapidly towards the notion of a seven-day working week, even if larger retail outlets continue to have restricted opening hours. The special character of Sunday urgently needs defending, though perhaps quoting Canon Law is not the best way to go about it. For many workers, especially those pressed into doing two jobs to pay the mounting bills, this is a matter of social justice. A living wage should cover a day of rest. And that really is an obligation.

Opening Prayer

Heavenly Father, open our hearts to the silent presence of the spirit of your Son. Lead us into that mysterious silence where your love is revealed to all who call. Maranatha ... Come, Lord Jesus.

How to Meditate

Sit down. Sit still and upright. Close your eyes lightly. Sit relaxed but alert. Silently, interiorly begin to say a single word. We recommend the prayer-phrase, 'Maranatha'. Recite it as four syllables of equal length. Listen to it as you say it, gently but continuously. Do not think or imagine anything spiritual or otherwise. If thoughts and images come, these are distractions at the time of meditation, so keep returning to simply saying the word. Meditate each morning and evening for between twenty and thirty minutes.

Closing Prayer

May this group be a true spiritual home for the seeker, a friend for the lonely, a guide for the confused.

May those who pray here be strengthened by the Holy Spirit to serve all who come and to receive them as Christ himself. In the silence of this room may all the suffering, violence and confusion of the world encounter the power that will console, renew and uplift the human spirit.

May this silence be a power to open the hearts of men and women to the vision of God, and so to each other, in love and peace, justice and human dignity. May the beauty of the Divine Life fill this group and the hearts of all who pray here with joyful hope.

May all who come here weighed down by the problems of humanity, leave, giving thanks for the wonder of human life. We make this prayer through Christ our Lord.

Christian Meditation

From time to time I submit an article about Christian Meditation. I would take this opportunity to explain how I became involved in this form of prayer.

It was July 6th 1995. I know the date for it was the day I became grandmother to twin boys. I approached Father Barry Caldwell and told him I was hungry to deepen my faith. Shortly after, a priest from Pallotti College in Millgrove came to OLHC and spoke of Contemplation. A significant group of parishioners spent a weekend at Pallotti and for me it was a life-changer. I searched for a group who practised Christian Meditation and found St Margaret's in Pitt Street had recently started a group. I joined, and nearly twenty-seven years later I spend time every Saturday morning at 8am, following The World Community For Christian Meditation. The numbers fluctuate between five and ten meditators and four are parishioners of OLHC. It is an ecumenical organisation. We listen to a Laurence Freeman/John Main CD, for about 10 to 15 min and sit in silence for another twenty minutes. We are usually home by about 9am except for our coffee morning once a month.

If you, like I, sometimes think you want to enrich your spiritual journey I highly recommend you give it a go. Details about WCCM are found on the attached flyer (to the right).

Gospel: John 14:23-29

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him. Those who do not love me do not keep my words. And my word is not my own: it is the word of the one who sent me. I have said these things to you while still with you; but the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you off all I have said to you. Peace I bequeath to you, my own peace I give you, a peace the world cannot give, this is my gift to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid. You heard me say: I am going away, and shall return. If you loved me you would have been glad to know that I am going to the Father, for the Father is greater than I. I have told you this now before it happens, so that when it does happen you may believe.



Reflection:

Time and again in John's gospel, someone asks Jesus a seemingly straightforward question only to find that Jesus' reply heads off at a tangent into uncharted territory. Today's reading, from Jesus' farewell discourse, is a case in point. It is his response to Thaddaeus' question, "Lord, what is all this about? Do you intend to show yourself to us and not to the world?" What follows is an entrée into the intimacy shared by Father, Son and disciple, illuminated by the Holy Spirit. It is a disclosure of love and truth in simple words that are full of encouragement.

Jesus promises a peace "the world cannot give." It will dispel the disciples' fearful anxiety at the prospect of his departure. He tells them where he is going - "to the Father" - and that this will be all for their good. He goes on to say that "The Father is greater than I." How this relates to what Jesus had already told his disciples - "I and the Father are one" (10:30) - isn't immediately clear.

Just beyond the end of this reading, Jesus says "Come now, let us go." The fact that the discourse continues at length suggests that the evangelist has joined two accounts of the evening's conversation together without editing out this stage direction.

In sum, these words of Jesus inspire heartfelt hope. Son and ?Father, he promises, will make their home in us, the Paraclete will teach us everything, and we will know peace. This is a reading to be proclaimed thoughtfully and prayerfully..
