St Thérèse of Lisieux once wrote that what Jesus desires of his disciples is 'simply *surrender* and *gratitude*.' At the heart of Christian worship and spirituality is thanksgiving, receiving with gratitude the good and wonderful gifts God gives us.

This week we give thanks for the life and legacy of Valerie Sumner. Valerie Sumner was a founding member of the committee of the Knights of the Southern Cross Victoria Archbishop's Dinner. Though she passed away in July 2021, this week we pay her tribute: she was a woman whose life was lived generously in service, and known affectionately as the 'Fundraising Queen'.

We also give thanks for <u>the life of Mother Ellen Marie of Jesus OCDM</u>, Prioress of the Carmelite Monastery in Kew, who passed away recently.

Her life was a witness to the goodness of God and the generosity to which he calls all of us. <u>In his homily for her</u> requiem Mass, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli reflected on the wonderful work of this 'good and faithful steward in God's kingdom', and on some of the ways we are all invited into a contemplative life.

We also hear from another of Melbourne's newly ordained priests, <u>this time from Fr Andrew Kwiatkowski</u>, a young Polish-born man who shares about his experience of God's constant call, and about responding with a life of gratitude.

The second instalment of our series exploring some of <u>the modern challenges to discernment</u> includes some fascinating insights from Veronika Winkels, editor and writer for *Mathilde* magazine, and Fr Paul Rowse OP, who reflect on issues of anxiety, faith and maturity in the modern age, and how these influence how we might discern God's call on our lives.

Finally, St Christopher's Parish in Syndal were deeply grateful when they <u>were recently finally able to gather in</u> <u>thanksgiving for their 60th anniversary</u> after COVID lockdowns postponed the event. Archbishop Peter A Comensoli was present to bless their new facilities and encourage them in their commitment to forming intentional disciples.

Calls for Church reps to attend jobs summit



Francis Sullivan says representatives from the Catholic social services sector should be present at the summit and have traditionally been invited to consultations at this level.

"The jobs summit – as far as the media is concerned – seems to boil down to big business and the unions," Mr Sullivan said.

He said that the cost-of-living crisis could not be left

to markets alone to solve, and that Catholic social thought did not support a "one-trick pony" approach to economic matters.

It is understood the list of attendees is yet to be finalised, but that neither the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference nor key Catholic agencies like Catholic Social Services Australia have received invitations.

According to 2017 research from the Australian Catholic Council for Employment Relations, the Church employs approximately 220,000 Australians in a variety of sectors, including health, education and aged care.

In 2017, ACCER calculated the size of the Church's jobs footprint, finding it employed a workforce ninetenths of the size of the Commonwealth Government, bigger than the Woolworths Group, or the "Big Four" banks combined. <u>https://cathnews.com</u>



EMBODIED KNOWING: Knowing and Loving Our Bodies

After being diagnosed with Stage IV cancer, theologian and author Kate Bowler worked intensively to know and love her body and its ways of both serving and failing her. As part of her spiritual practice, she wrote this letter: Dear Body.

Sometimes, I hate you. You ache. You get tired sooner than I'd like to admit. You wake me in the night for no good reason. Your cells duplicate at unpredictable rates. New gray hairs and fine lines and silver stretch marks show up out of nowhere. You let me down just when I need you the most...

Sometimes, I want a break from living with you. I'd prefer to trade you in for a newer model. A model that isn't in constant pain that fits better in that pair of jeans, that has more energy. With you, I am limited - bound by skin and bone and thinning hair.

With you, I am fragile ...

But God knows what it's like to live in flesh... If God too lived in a body, then God knows the ache of growing pains and the feeling of goosebumps on a brisk day and the comfort of a warm embrace. He felt the gurgle of a hungry stomach and the annoying prick of a splinter after a day of hard work. He wept over the death of a friend. Ours is a God who sneezed and rubbed His eyes when He was sleepy. Ours is a God who know longing, heartbreak, excitement, frustration - the full range of what it means to be human... [and] live in a body.

So when my own body drags me down, when my muscles ache, when my worries keep me up at night, when my fear for the future leaves me motionless, when I feel lonely and exhausted and burdened, I do not worship a God who is far off.

This is a God who knows my humanity inside and out. God has counted every hair on my head (Matthew 10:30) and bottled up every tear I have shed (Psalm 56:8). Not simply because the Word formed us (Genesis 1:27), knit us together in our mothers' wombs (Psalm 139:13), was there from the very beginning... but because God wore our skin.

By embracing the wisdom of incarnation, Bowler learned to listen to her body's messages and be kind to herself:

Dear, dear body, I get it. Or at least I am starting to. You do not have an unlimited supply. You run out, and I need to listen. Maybe I really should go to bed a little earlier or let you off the hook for craving those extra salty chips. I need to sense when you are struggling, and gently acknowledge that you are actually changing. That time and love and grief and life have worn themselves into my skin. Day be day. This is the beautiful, terrible evidence that we have lived.

Catholic Religious Australia calls for action against violence

In a statement, CRA said it supported the call from the Australian Catholic Bishops for Church communities to confront this serious social injustice.

Earlier this month, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference released its Social Justice Statement, titled *Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse,* which condemns the scourge of domestic and family violence.

"The Church can play an important role in listening to and validating the experience of victims of domestic and family abuse," CRA president Br Peter Carroll said.

"Forgiveness does not mean staying in an abusive relationship. Church leaders need to speak about this challenging topic in appropriate ways, recognising that abuse is occurring in families within their communities."

This call is timely as the national conversation regarding coercive control in domestic abuse gains momentum. Recently, the federal and state attorneys-general agreed to create a national plan to respond effectively to coercive control, across all states and territories.

The New South Wales and Queensland governments have committed to introducing legislation to criminalise behaviour that amounts to coercive control.



CRA has made a submission to support the proposed NSW Crimes Legislation Amendment (Coercive Control) Bill 2022 to close gaps that exist in NSW criminal law. This includes a clear and accessible legal definition of domestic abuse and a stand-alone criminal offence of coercive control.

Anne Walker, CRA's national executive director, said "Leaders of Church communities have a responsibility to educate communities on what constitutes abusive behaviour and assist those who are suffering to find a way to safety.

"Safeguarding, in all its forms, must be the continual work of the Church." <u>https://cathnews.com</u>



EMBODIED KNOWING: A Source of Vital Information

Fr Richard reminds us of the importance of listening to our body's wisdom:

Though we begin our lives immersed in unitive, kinesthetic knowing, we learn quickly to see distinctions and divisions in the world. As a toddler, I learned: "I am not my mother. My mother is not me." The developing ego sees by differentiation and negation - who we are not. While such an ego structure is a natural, necessary part of growing up, it always gets in the way of the soul's holistic, nondual consciousness. My identity - intelligence, moral sense, wealth, and social class - is unfortunately gained in contrast, comparison, and competition to the person next to me.

My still centre, my True Self, does not need to oppose, differentiate, or compare itself. It just *is* and is content. This must be "the pearl of great price." To the extent that our soul is alive and connected, we are satisfied with the "enoughness" of who we are and the present moment. (In our consumeristic, competitive, and increasingly online world, I fear this is becoming harder and harder to experience.)

Living solely out of our ego splits us off from our body and our soul. Western Christianity and culture have largely surrendered to the dualistic split of body vs. soul. Christians even speak of "saving their soul" instead of also saving their body. We often repress emotions and physical sensations for the sake of efficiency and success. There are appropriate times to let our thinking mind lead instead of immediately following our body's instincts. But we must do so with awareness and appreciation for our body, rather than pushing feelings away and moving ahead with what we have to do in the next hour. Repressing feelings and sensations relegate them to our unconscious "shadow" self. They don't go away. They come out in unexpected and often painful ways.

We need to understand kinesthetic, bodily knowing. We must learn to recognize our physical responses - be they fear, arousal, pleasure, or pain - because they reveal additional and important information. It may take a few minutes of intentional focus to become aware of tension in our shoulders, churning in our gut, a pounding heart, or goosebumps. *Irish poet and philosopher John O'Donohue (1956–2008) says this well*:

Your mind can deceive you and put all kinds of barriers between you and your nature; but your body does not lie. Your body tells you, if you attend to it, how your life is and whether you are living from your soul or from the labyrinths of your negativity... The human body is the most complex, refined, and harmonious totality...

Your body is, in essence, a crowd of different members who work in harmony to make your belonging in the world possible... The soul is not simply within the body, hidden somewhere within its recesses. The truth is rather the converse. Your body is in the soul, and the soul suffuses you completely.

Gospel: Luke 14:1, 7-14

On a Sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host come, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man humbles himself will b e exalted.'

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'



Reflection:

Characteristically, Luke reports that Jesus had accepted an invitation to a meal, this time on the Sabbath and at the house of an influential Pharisee. Perhaps word had not spread as to uncomfortable a guest he could be. True to form, he turns the tables on his antagonists. Perceiving their penchant for social status, Jesus tells a whimsical story about the jeopardy of seeking the places of honour at table. He concludes with what appears to be a commonplace of wisdom about humility, in complete harmony with what we heard from Ben Sirach. It's also in keeping with the kind of thorough-going reversal that Luke stresses and Mary extols in her *Magnificat*.

Jesus' second piece of teaching is doubly more radical. It's one thing to be modest in one's social interaction with peers, it's altogether something else to embark on table-fellowship with riff-raff and those beyond the pale. But if that's hard to stomach there's more to come. It's to be done purely gratuitously. The economy of favours given and favours returned is not the economy of the kingdom of God. That's one of generous hospitality offered to those poor and humble enough to accept it.

The reading progresses from the factual introduction through the parable to the concluding instruction. There's every reason to expect that a good proclamation will sustain the assembly's attention. **Break Open the Word 2022**
