Gospel: Matthew 10:26-33

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'



Reflection:

Today's reading is the second of three excerpts from Jesus' missionary instructions to the apostles that we hear on succeeding Sundays. Unlike the specific directives that precede this passage but are passed over in the lectionary, Jesus' advice here is more general and proverbial. It also looks beyond the immediate circumstances of the apostles' mission to that of the Church in the post-resurrection era.

Punctuating the lesson like a refrain is Jesus' three-fold exhortation to the apostles not to be afraid. Even as he offers this encouragement, he alludes to the danger they may face from "those who kill the body". Freedom from fear is not based on the absence of opposition but on God's providential care.

All the same there are two disconcerting notes in what Jesus has to say. The first is his warning that they should fear the one "who can destroy both body and soul in hell". The second is the threat of being disowned before God if they disown Christ on earth. Some might find here a hint of the last judgement as it is envisaged in the parable of the sheep and the goats much later in the gospel. In sum, this collection of sayings is as bracing as it is comforting.

A revolution of the heart

It is 90 years since the Catholic Worker movement began, and more than 40 since its founder died. What is she still teaching us? Beginning this week, Dorothy Day's granddaughter will suggest a very personal novena of signposts and watchwords for those who are looking to follow her, each in their own way / **By Kate Hennessy**



once spent years reading Ι Dorothy's diaries, articles, letters and books, and poring over videos, recordings and thousands of photographs. I examined every clue I could gather - in my memories, my mother's memories, the memories of and friends, family strangers. Anyone I could track down, or who tracked me down. Through this process I discovered that I am no different to those for whom even one brief meeting with Dorothy decades ago changed their lives. Through these stories, I have come to believe there is little point in simply *admiring* Dorothy Day. If you're going to pay attention to her, your life will be turned on its head.

After her death in 1980, I sometimes would sit alone in Dorothy's room in Maryhouse, the Catholic Worker house of hospitality in the Lower East Side, New York, where she lived her last years and where she died. I sat in the armchair where she read The New York Times, the Catholic Worker galleys or the Psalms, a cup of coffee at hand. I wanted to be comforted by her lingering presence, but instead I felt like a swirl of dead and dry leaves blowing about in the wake of her footsteps. I was unable to make any sense of her within my own life, and so I spent years living as if she weren't my grandmother, where people didn't know of her, or didn't know of my relationship to her. But there comes a time when you must return home, even though you aren't sure you're ready, for you can't keep running away, especially from the saint in the family closet.

There is no academic, political, theological or philosophical stance for me to take here. I have no room. If Dorothy Day doesn't rip something open within you, crack wide your heart and leave you with what feels like an affliction, and yet also leaves you breathless with wonder and possibility, then it is all for nothing. All the admiration, accolades, studies, even the canonization process are all for nothing. And I say this not only for myself but for each of us who has been grabbed by her, even if we don't fully understand why. There is pain, difficulty and an odd exhilaration in allowing and acknowledging Dorothy into your life. It will lead you down a path you have little control over, if you are true to it. When Dorothy died people wondered if the Catholic Worker movement would survive her passing. The CW is celebrating its ninetieth anniversary this year - I think that question can be laid to rest. A better question to ask now is: What is she still teaching us? I have - daringly - identified nine major teachings, which I have referred as consolations. to lamentations or ruinations, but most commonly "provocations". These are not rules or step-by-step instructions. They are more akin to adding ingredients to a soup, or a weaving of inter-twining threads, and I may be doing a disservice by putting them in some kind of order.

I can't claim to know much about

each provocation, and I have many more questions than answers. Dorothy spoke of the mystery of our freedom - one of the greatest gifts God gave us, she said. She also said that we struggle against both freedom and responsibility, and we always will. There is no point in telling people what to do. It has to be a revolution from within, a revolution I do see the of the heart. provocations as an alternative to anger, lethargy, despair, helplessness, or, worst of all, indifference. They are a practice and a map to a path you must forge for yourself. As Bilbo said (and I'm comfortable quoting Tolkien because my grandmother and I read The Hobbit together the summer of 1973): "It's a dangerous business, Frodo, going out of your door. You step on to the Road, and if you don't keep your feet, there is no knowing where you might be swept off to.' But how do you take that first step? I think desire, however vague, and a deep sense of personal responsibility is the best way to begin.

One of the provocative choices Dorothy presents is: Do we declare we know exactly who she was? Or do we accept her challenge and just "do the work"? Dorothy infamously said, "Don't call me a saint. I don't want to be dismissed so easily." Many have worried like a dog with a bone at this, wondering what it says about her, but, of course, it isn't about her - it's about us. And this fits nicely with the first provocation - make yourself deeply uncomfortable.

ONE: MAKE YOURSELF DEEPLY UNCOMFORTABLE

Dorothy's life, her work and words can be utterly uncomfortable. Pick any element of the Catholic Worker programme and philosophy, and you might find yourself running for the hills. Opening houses of hospitality in which nothing is asked of those who are given refuge, "deserving" whether the or "undeserving" poor. Her stance on non-violence can provoke people into anger, and her insistence on voluntary poverty cuts at the very roots of our society and most of what we strive for.

She was an "obedient daughter of the

Church" and yet challenged and chastised the bishops when she saw need. She insisted on always responding to the here and now in practical terms, emphasizing personal responsibility and not resting in ideology. All the Catholic Worker beliefs are expressions of the deep trust in the Gospels, a deep trust in Christ against all reason. Such trust can be deeply unsettling and uncomfortable.

Dorothy rarely felt comfortable. She felt keenly the pressure of the drunkenness, the madness, the anger of those who came to the Worker, along with the never-ending struggle of living with the noise, filth and smells. She wasn't a natural public speaker, she could find people's neediness, and criticism, overwhelming, and she needed her solitude. It never became easy for her, and yet she continued.

There are no bromides to be found here, no cheap grace, no sentimentality, soothing or sensible solutions. And yet, paradoxically, all of these Catholic Worker elements also have such capacity to lead to joy. Making ourselves deeply uncomfortable requires an honest self -examination in how we are choosing to live our lives, but there can be a debilitating discomfort in feeling we have done far too little or made too many mistakes. Or that we are part of the problem, and not the solution, or maybe both. And what value lies in lingering feelings of deep regret and shame? Also sometimes it is difficult to recognise the difference between such powerful emotions as grief and feeling uncomfortable. Or of knowing the difference between which discomforts are meaningless and which aren't.

We do need to feel compassion for ourselves, rest when we can and find our spiritual sustenance, but still we can't stop there. It was often said of Dorothy that she afflicted the comfortable and comforted the afflicted. I think she asks us to to this within ourselves, holding oneself to discomfort while generously giving comfort to others.

It takes courage to make yourself deeply uncomfortable, and it is a form of intentional suffering. Truth can be extremely uncomfortable, both in speaking it and hearing it. Then there's that discomforting shock when you realise that something you were unequivocally sure of is just plain wrong. Probably the most difficult aspect of this is sometimes there is no solution, or no sensible solution, to what discomforts you.

There is no point in feeling comfortable with Dorothy, and yet we need comfort of some sort, and that, paradoxically, may lie within the discomfort.

I have found both in being Dorothy's granddaughter. I am comforted by my Dorothy stories and by the memory of our love for each other. For years I found comfort in the relics I held on to - her last driver's licence, the Hopi woven man in a maze she used to have in her room, and the woven Bolivian bag she used during her last arrest in California in 1973, picketing with the farm workers at the age of 75. I thought these relics would ground me in some way, slake a thirst for some mysterious element of hers. I have been letting these relics go one by one over the years, passing them along to others, as I don't feel the need for that comfort any more.

As Dorothy's granddaughter, I've to feel made intensely been uncomfortable, beginning when I was barely out of my teens and an old friend of the Catholic Worker asked me, "Are you going to follow your grandmother's footsteps?" And before I could stop myself, I said, "Hell, no." he was shocked, and replied, "You should be ashamed of yourself, you, Dorothy's yourself, you, Dorothy's granddaughter." I still stand by my statement, and I insist on forging my own path, but, of course, I did feel ashamed. And uncomfortable. I've been uncomfortable all my life being her granddaughter and will always be so. I have, though, made my peace with this, and I carry on as best as I can. Just as Dorothy did.

Freedom is the precious right of every human being. The freedom to speak the truth, to challenge evil, to dispute, criticize or challenge the ruling powers is a constitutional freedom that is now restricted and curtailed and speaking out could mean death. There have been more than 200 writers and broadcast journalists killed in the Philippines since 1986.

The freedom of speech and expression is almost squashed by draconian libel laws. To speak freely and challenge officials with the truth of corrupt deals or wrongdoings by powerful politicians could mean jail or assassination.

Freedom to live, survive, have a family & prosper in security free from fear, hunger, threats & crime are perhaps the most precious freedoms desired by humans but lacking for millions. An estimated 16 million Filipinos live below the poverty line while a tiny elite rich have lives of luxury and plenty. The right and freedom to know the truth and act on it is vital to change the situation. So what needs to come about is greater equality and social justice. The lack of these fundamental values puts thousands of children in conflict with law. They survive on the streets, in gangs & fall into temptations. For most of them, their lives are over but good judges, named below, are among many that are giving new life to hundreds of children in conflict with the law (CICL) by compassionate application of the Juvenile Justice & Welfare Law otherwise known as Republic Act 9344.

Corruption, unemployment & poverty is at the root of children's hardship. According to an excellent analysis by the economist Solita "Winnie" Monsod, "among the ASEAN-5, the Philippines has: "the lowest GDP per capita: a Filipino has the least income among the ASEAN-5, the most unequal distribution of income & the highest poverty headcount ratio." According to Prof Monsod, freedom for children to grow and develop through education is not a privilege, it is a right & it is the sworn duty of the government leaders to provide the highest quality education for the people. Quality education is what eradicates poverty. Real education is more than grades, it is teaching and inspiring people to think & act for themselves & know the truth & choose the good always. Otherwise, poverty persists. Prof. Monsod teaches us that the nation has "the highest learning poverty rate of 90.9%, meaning among 10-year olds, 9 out of 10 cannot understand what they are reading.

Most Filipino children are naturally intelligent, highly motivated to learn, & are gifted with many talents yet are denied a quality education. It is no wonder that so many youth end up on the streets as dropouts & too many people become "captured, mesmerised followers" of social media celebrities not knowing they are emotional & mental prisoners of bad influencers. They believe without thinking whatever they are told.

Again, Prof Monsod tells us that the nation suffers "the lowest Human Capital Index score of 0.52. A child born today will have 52 percent of the expected productivity she would have had if she had complete education and full health." Besides, the good professor says that "in some international large-scale assessments, the Philippines has the lowest performance among all countries assessed.

Many millions are not fully educated. They are captives of mindconditioning & prisoners of the political system that needs docile, dependent, non-thinking, gift -taking-voters. They are always in poverty to keep the rich elite always in power & money. With such dire poverty, the politicians have no interest to alleviate it but it enables them to stay in power & increase their own wealth and that is vote-buying power.

The poor in this system are the victims of the cycle of poverty. They have the most children because so many keep dying of hunger & disease. The nation has "the highest infant mortality, the highest child mortality, the second-to- the lowest life expectancy," Professor "Winnie" Monsod tells us.

Freedom alone is not what makes us fully human but what use we make of our freedoms to help others preserve theirs. Are we ready, capable and willing to take risks, oppose evil and injustice & dedicate ourselves to preserve our freedoms & those of others? Freedom to think and reason, to know and learn and acquire knowledge of right & wrong, and make the moral free choice to act justly with compassion is to be fully human. The freedom to act & hope that good will overcome evil helps us belong to the millions of dedicated good people serving the poor. They chose serving professions that help win freedom for others from poverty & oppressed victims. Among them are the judges that have a heart for implementing the rule of law with compassion & care that saves the poor, the abused children and the abandoned youth that fall into conflict with the law.

In Cebu, Preda Foundation's New Dawn Home for Children in Conflict with the Law (CICL) supported by Aktionsgruppe based in Germany gives freedom to the youth. The Preda staff are welcoming more youth that are given their conditional freedom from life in harsh prison conditions to the life of peace and tranquility, thanks to the just judges. They are Judge Marlon Jay Moneva, Judge Jose Nathaniel Andal, Judge Ester Veloso, Judge Leah Geraldez, Judge Maria Dee Seares and Judge Stephen Ian Belacho. The "Magnificent Six", as they are called, apply the Juvenile Justice & Welfare Law with compassion and concern to restore a life of freedom.

They are more interested in restoring life than condemning youth to life behind bars for a serious crime committed in their impetuous ill-guided youth. The Magnificent Six have an enlightened interpretation of restorative justice and have found a role as healers, carers & supporters of compassionate freedom as the law dictates, helping these victims of systematic poverty.

They understand that the youth in conflict with law that come before them have experienced hunger from birth & dire poverty, their constant companion to adolescence. They are young people that have survived a violent & corrupt-ridden society that, due to unsatisfied needs, fell foul of its cruel seduction and temptations. They are the youth that have nothing in this world: no education, some no homes, others no hope of anything better in the underworld of drugs, violence and exploitation. They are the throwaway youth of a lost generation. Because of these compassionate and wise judges, the youth have hope, a contrite heart and repentance, a plea for forgiveness and ask only an opportunity to change, to learn, to be healed through friendship Where before they lived in darkness and & understanding. misery, now they have champions to guide and to lead them to freedom & to find the light and their true selves and a good life. <u>www.preda.org</u>

Fr Shay Cullen, a Columban priest, is the founder who has been in the Philippines for 46 years fighting for human rights. The main focus of his work is rescuing young boys and girls who have been trafficked, forced to work in bars, abused and/or sexually abused - such a massive problem in the Philippines.

Fr Shay has a Home for girls and two Homes for boys - one for young boys and the other for older young men. KAID is wanting to send toiletry bags for boys and girls, for those currently in care or for those who come in after being rescued after a rescue raid or brought by authorities when they have nothing.
