Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread. While they were still speaking about this, he



stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written



that the Messiah would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning with Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

Although we are in the B cycle of readings, with the Gospel of Mark mainly being used throughout this year, there are times when other Gospels such as Luke or John may be used to help bring home a central message, such as the importance of the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead at Easter time. Accordingly the most important detail in Luke's account today of the apostles meeting the risen Jesus may be the fact that Jesus slowly opened their minds to understand what they had previously been unwilling or unable to grasp. A part of this lack of understanding is explained by the speech of St. Peter in today's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles that Christ at first had to suffer. Peter, in another of his great speeches after the Resurrection, demands that the people accept their responsibility for crucifying Jesus and then go on to repent and change their lives by accepting Jesus as their Lord and Master. Now for us along the track two thousand years later, we are asked at Easter to accept God's invitation also and to become what we are meant to be in and again through an encounter with the risen Christ, especially in the 'breaking of the bread' and our hospitality to each other.

Throughout Australia, approximately 2,000 adults have entered the Catholic Church during the Easter Ceremonies. It is always difficult to make the first step to a possible change of life. However, if you come to Church with your Catholic partner or are just one of those several people who like coming to the Catholic Church by yourself without necessarily being a Catholic, then there is always that possible next step. The step may not entail you actually becoming a Catholic at this time, but it helps you to understand the essentials of the Catholic faith. Accordingly, we will be starting with another small group at the presbytery on Tuesday May 1st at 7:30pm. For an hour only we cover such topics as: 'care of the planet, social justice, the moral life, marriage, sin and forgiveness, the structure of the Mass, the sacraments of the Church, the Church: God's People, the birth of the Church, the God of Revelation, the Bible, in search of God etc etc. Why don't you come and join us even if it is only for a few sessions. "Come and see" as Jesus always said. If you want any more information you are welcome to ring me on 0400 524 363 or email me on greg.trythall@cam.org.au.

Dear Parents

I am sorry to inform you that our current Principal Mr. James Sheedy will be starting up a new position as Principal of one of the two Catholic primary schools in the Caroline Springs Parish.

Jim will continue here for most of our second term, but will take up the position at St. George Preca School at the start of the third term in July. The school is only in its tenth year of operation. It will be a new challenge for Jim, as the school is twice the size of our present St. Mary's School and takes in a wide north-western area of Carline Springs, including a new estate at Taylors Hill. It needs a good principal, a good educationalist and someone who will set up the school for many years to come. Within a Parish, the position of Primary Catholic Principal is one of the more important appointments. The position is like a spider web in that it impacts on so many different areas such as parish, school staff, children, parents and the wider community. However, some Principals, due to various factors such as experience, giftedness, knowledge, personality, faith and so forth, are more successful than others over a long period of time. Fortunately, Mr. Sheedy has shown all of those qualities and has been an incredible help to our local primary school over the last ten years. Personally, as we share similar ideals, values and interests, it has been a pleasure and a privilege to have worked with him for the good of both St. Mary's Parish and School over the last eight of these ten years.

Although I am saddened and many of you will be saddened, there is a time to move on if one is to continue with the same enthusiasm. Many of you as parents change jobs every few years and will understand the need to move on after giving so much time and energy. I would have liked him to stay, but I know the time has come. I also know that the Catholic system needs people who want to take on a new challenge and while both I and many of you will miss Jim, I am sure there is someone out there to take on our lovely primary school with a full head of steam.

The position of Principal for St. Mary's will be advertised early next term within our Catholic circles and I will inform the parent body in the first week of next term in regards to a panel being formed to judge the suitable candidates. The panel is formed under certain guidelines from Catholic Education Melbourne and in the end I need to sign off on any successful candidate.
