REFLECTION

How do you handle it when someone has done something wrong?

The Gospel reading today outlines a process by which we can hold people to account for their actions. Then, as preached by Jesus so often, there has to be forgiveness. As we know, however, forgiveness is not easy. And forgiveness never means 'that's alright' - there are some actions and attitudes that are never right, that must be called out, and from which society is to be protected: this is part of the teaching of Jesus.

Forgiveness is often not the ready human reaction. More often we want revenge, to get even with the person who has offended. But then, imitating Jesus, living in his way, is not easy. Choosing to forgive is a Jesus characteristic: forgiveness is a central message of Jesus to his followers. Forgiveness can free us from being bound into the wrong that has occurred. The challenge to forgive is one that Jesus repeatedly proclaimed directly and through parables.

Those who accept this Jesus invitation to forgive will find that this choice often runs counter to a strong societal value.

"People of peace must not think about recriminations and retribution. Courageous people do not fear forgiving" (Nelson Mandela). Forgiveness is not the action of the weak but rather the virtue of the brave. The process of forgiveness takes time and patience and is never an easy journey. The fact that forgiveness is not easy demands that adequate time be given to work through the attending issues. Forgiveness can be a slow process. If one rushes the process and tries to oversimplify it, the result can be halfhearted. Are there situations where we will not be able to forgive?

Thankfully God forgives us ... and again ... and again!

Child Protection Week is a national campaign held each year to raise awareness of child-abuse prevention in our communities. In 2023, the overarching message that 'Every child in every community needs a fair go' will be complemented with the theme 'Where we start matters':

o Where we start our lives in terms of where we live, the resources available to us and the opportunities presented to us makes a significant difference to our life outcomes.

o Where we start as a Catholic community in offering children and their families support and assistance makes a significant difference to life outcomes.

Where we start as decision-makers in addressing large, complex problems such as child abuse and neglect also has a significant impact on personal, social and economic outcomes.

Child Protection Week is a good time for us to think about how we, as adults, can address some of these issues that affect children and to consider how we can change things to make a difference.

In the Catholic Church, Child Protection Week is highlighted through Safeguarding Sunday, 10 September. Safeguarding Sunday seeks to acknowledge the immense damage caused by the sexual abuse of children and adults at risk, including by priests, religious and lay people within Catholic contexts. It makes a commitment to practices and protocols that create and maintain safe environments for all people. It invites people to pray for those harmed by abuse directly and indirectly.
