## REFLECTION

## 'The end is coming!'

There are so many endings in our lives - as we move through our ages, our circumstances, our responsibilities, and the uncertainties of life around us. How do we hold on to faith in God when life collapses around us and even that faith seems to have gone? The Gospel reading today gives us a brief insight into the pain and struggle of the small community of early Christians for whom Luke originally wrote his Gospel, which 2000 years later has guided our Sundays for the past twelve months.

That early community had such faith and hope in Jesus ... but life did not seem to be blessed all the time either: sound familiar? God wasn't intervening to save them from conflict within their families and persecution from governments and occupying armies.

Luke recognised that such discord and trouble seem to be part of being alive, much as we would prefer it otherwise. Faith in Jesus doesn't take us out of the world. It is here – in real life – that we live our lives. It is here – in real life – that we are people of faith, part of struggling humanity.

Jesus lived at a time when the Jerusalem temple stood in all its glory. By the time Luke's Gospel is written, the magnificent Temple had been utterly destroyed by the Romans in the year 70. Many Jews saw this as the 'end of the world' and took this destruction as a sign that God was coming soon in great anger!

Luke cautions against such false ideas. The end has not yet come, and Luke's early community – and we – must learn to live in an extended time of waiting for 'the end': always living according to what we believe and know to be good and right, aware that 'God-is-with-us'.

Faith doesn't resolve the hardships of our lives. It didn't for Jesus, either – think of the crucifixion. Faith can, however, help us to keep going, knowing that there is always more to life.

# 6<sup>th</sup> WORLD DAY OF THE POOR November 13, 2022

No Christian is exempt from aiding the poor, Pope Francis said in his message for the 2022 World Day of the Poor.

The Pope said that the worst thing that can happen to a Christian community is to be "dazzled by the idol of wealth, which ends up chaining us to an ephemeral and bankrupt vision of life".

"Where the poor are concerned, it is not talk that matters; what matters is rolling up our sleeves and putting our faith into practice through a direct involvement, one that cannot be delegated," he said.

"No one must say that they cannot be close to the poor because their own lifestyle demands more attention to other areas. This is an excuse commonly heard in academic, business or professional, and even ecclesial circles. None of us can think we are exempt from concern for the poor and for social justice," he added.

The Pope underlined that it is not a question of approaching the poor with "a welfare mentality" but of ensuring that no one lacks what is necessary.

He warned Catholics against laxity and inconsistent behaviour with regard to the poor.

He said: "At times ... a kind of laxity can creep in and lead to inconsistent behaviour, including indifference about the poor. It also happens that some Christians, out of excessive attachment to money, remain mired in a poor use of their goods and wealth. These situations reveal a weak faith and feeble, myopic hope."
