PARISH RENEWAL PROGRAM 2022

Welcome to the final week of our Parish Renewal Program - the Parish Commitment Weekend.

Last week we considered our **engagement** in parish life and heard from parishioners Fran Thorn (Sacred Heart) and Les Milroy (Emmaus) about the importance of the parish in their lives. This week we turn our attention to **parish finances**. How do we provide the financial resources for the priorities identified in our Program brochure and discussed at our 5 Parishioner Forums? Thanksgiving Income is the major source of parish income and has declined nearly 50% on pre COVID-19 levels. This must be turned around and we have identified the need to return Pledged Thanksgiving Income from the current \$6,500 to pre COVID-19 level of \$9,000 per week.

WE ASK FOR YOUR FINANCIAL COMMITMENT TO SUPPORT THE PARISH

What does my financial support pay for?

Supporting pastoral care – including the employment of a Pastoral Support Person

The maintenance of our churches and parish facilities

The operating costs of the parish – staff wages, insurance, utilities etc.

How much should I pledge?

It is now 5 years since we conducted a Renewal Program, so we are asking all families to review and renew their commitments. As a guide - how do you use your discretionary income after paying the essentials. Is support of your parish a priority for you? We ask that your financial support to Thanksgiving is a meaningful one in your own individual circumstances. Remember that a simple daily cup of takeaway coffee can cost \$30 per week or \$130 per month

We ask those with the greatest capacity to contribute the most – reserving special thanks for those on restricted incomes whose continued support is very much appreciated

REFLECTION

STAYING AWARE OF WHO GOD IS

Do you remember two weekends ago that the tenth leper acknowledged this, and turned to speak with Jesus about it? And last week Jesus urged his followers to persevere in their prayer? In today's Gospel, the 'publican' acknowledges who God is in his life. The other man seems to use his

In today's Gospel, the 'publican' acknowledges who God is in his life. The other man seems to use his prayer time to speak about himself, trying to 'prove' himself in the sight of God.

Prayer takes many forms, of course: familiar words with which we've worn out the beads over the years, thoughts and reflections and silence, songs, formal prayers that the whole Church uses, Sacraments with their symbols and meanings. We ask God for things in prayer, praise God, thank God, express puzzlement to God, speak out frustration, and ask for forgiveness.

In all its different shapes and forms, prayer is always to be our acknowledgement of God, and our acknowledgement that God is part of our lives.

The particular shape to the man's prayer in the Gospel is 'repentance'. Remember the other three classic shapes to prayer – thanks, praise, intercession: it's important to include all four in the cycle of our prayer. Reflecting on this week's parable, one of the writers comments:

We are weak and fallible and selfish in some proportion. We intend and forget. We promise and do not deliver. We propose and do not pursue. At times we barely manage to camouflage our pettiness and our touchiness about our little empires. We see creations of delicacy gobbled up by the ravages of passion. The more we know about our motives, the more shabby some of them are revealed to be. If we have to get all of that right before God accepts us we are without hope. However we are people of great hope! We may not be able to forgive ourselves, others may not forgive us, history may not forgive us. But God does, and not conditionally. It is not only if we have first shined and combed ourselves and put on our best suits and made ourselves respectable enough to appear in his presence that he does so. He does it anyway.
