The Third Corporal Work of Mercy — Part A

Clothe the Naked. In the prologue of his Gospel, St John makes two powerful statements. The first is the very first verse: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." In this one sentence St John teaches three great truths: (1) "In the beginning was the Word" means that the Word was from all eternity; the Word is eternal, having no beginning and no end. He always was. (2) "The Word was with God" tell us that the Word is God the Father's eternal Son, the Second Divine Person of the Blessed Trinity. As we say in the Nicene Creed, the Word is "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, one in being with the Father." (3) "The Word was God" means that although the Word is a distinct Person, he is completely one with and co-equal to God the Father. Thirteen verses later, St John makes his second powerful statement: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" 1:14. The Evangelist is saying that God became man. He took his flesh and blood from the Virgin Mary and now has a true human body like our own. In this way, Jesus Christ, the God-Man, gave to our human nature, and particularly to our human body, a great dignity. So momentous a happening was the Incarnation that Pope John Paul II called it the "greatest event in human history". Our body, then, in some way reflects the sacredness of the human body of Christ. It has a dignity that must always be respected. Clothing the naked is rooted, then, in the respect that we must show for the human body. There are four reasons why we must respect the body as good.

Created by God. First of all, God created the human body. In the Book of Genesis, we read the description of God's creation of mankind. "Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.' God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him . . . God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good." We know that the body suffered serious negative effects as a result of Original Sin. For example, when God created Adam and Eve, they could not suffer sickness or death. Now after the fall we are subject to both. Furthermore, before the fall, Adam and Eve felt no disordered passions. They were naked yet felt no shame or concupiscence in each other's presence. Now as a result of Original Sin, we experience disordered desires very strongly at times. Yet despite the fact that the body is now subject to sickness, suffering, disordered passions, and even death itself, it still remains good because God created it, and so we need to respect it.

Baptism sanctifies the body. A second reason we recognise the body as good is because by Baptism we became members of the Mystical Body of Christ. All who are baptised are joined to Christ like the members of a body are joined to its head. This prompted St Paul to write: "The body is not meant for immorality, but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. . . . Do you not **know** that your bodies are members of Christ?" 1 Corinthians 6:13. As long as we remain rooted in Christ by remaining in the state of grace, our bodies share in his holiness.

Temples of the Holy Spirit. Another reason the body is good is again because of Baptism. Through this sacrament, the body becomes a temple of the Holy Spirit. St Paul describes this in powerful words: "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God? You are not your own; you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body." Since the Holy Spirit dwells in our bodies as in a living temple, he makes our bodies holy and pleasing to the Most Holy Trinity. For this reason, we have reverence and respect for the dignity of the body.

Destined for Heaven. A fourth reason the body is good and should be respected is because it is destined for eternal life in Heaven. As Christ raised himself from the tomb of death by his own Resurrection, we believe he will raise us up also on the last day. Our bodies will come back to life again, but they will be transformed into a glorious state, sharing the very glory and dignity of Christ's risen body. St Paul says: "What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power." Since the body shares with the soul in the work of salvation, it will share in the glory of the soul in Heaven. Christ will raise our mortal bodies from death and make them like his own in glory! It is out of respect for the body that we shelter it, as it were, with clothing. Clothing is a human necessity. And so to "clothe the naked" we shelter the body, and this is a work of mercy, a call of Christ. What are some ways to practice this work of mercy? Next week we will look at three possibilities. First, we must provide the clothing people need to survive the elements of the weather. Second, we should help people to dress in an appropriate way.
