

Dear Parishioners of St Anthony's


We are pleased to be able to celebrate public Masses at St Anthony's subject to the temporary conditions laid down by the Victorian Government and the Archbishop of Melbourne. We can accommodate ten people at Mass in addition to those required for the celebration of Mass.

We had 650 parishioners attending mass before the lockdown. Celebrating 14 masses per week will enable 140 parishioners the opportunity to participate in mass at St Anthony's church. To ensure everyone has the opportunity to come to Mass, parishioners will be contacted by a parishioner of St Anthony's Care Team in the next few days to update your contact details (Our Parish Census needs to be updated) and to ascertain how many in the household would like to attend mass and also get your preferred day and time. From Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> May 2020, we are pleased to be able to celebrate public Masses at St Bernard's subject to the temporary conditions laid down by the Victorian Government and the Archbishop of Melbourne. We can accommodate ten people at Mass in addition to those required for the celebration of Mass.

To ensure everyone has the chance to come to Mass, parishioners will be limited to attendance at one Mass a week for the time being. Masses will be celebrated weekly at the following times:

Sunday 10am Tuesday 6pm Wednesday 10am Thursday 6pm Friday 10am Saturday 6pm (Vigil)

To register for a Mass, call our dedicated hotline 0432 055 992. Leave a message indicating your name, contact number and preferred Mass time and day. We will then call you back to confirm your registration. We will require 24 hours to process your registration. **Only those people whose registration we have confirmed will be admitted entrance to the church for Mass.**

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Throughout this situation of the Coronavirus pandemic our prayers and solidarity have been with you all, and will continue to guide the challenging decisions we have been called to make.

Despite the many weeks of worry and social restrictions, we are delighted that as of 11.59pm yesterday, Tuesday 12 May 2020, churches in Victoria may now be open in certain circumstances.

This opportunity for small gatherings and for some quiet moments of prayer in the sacramental presence of Our Lord is a gentle first step in the right direction, and rightly a moment of rejoicing for God's people. We are pleased to work constructively with our communities to make appropriate adjustments. Strict restrictions still govern our actions due to the risks of COVID-19 and we are all being asked to show patience and fortitude.

Each Diocese is communicating with their parishes about how various ministries, including sacramental care, will be conducted in this first stage of the easing of social restrictions. We wish to be fully compliant with the directives that apply across Victoria, so that we ensure the protection of elderly and vulnerable people, and work together for the common good of our communities.

The conditions under which a church can be open include a collection of contact details (for the purposes of contact-tracing if it becomes necessary), strict monitoring of numbers, ongoing hygiene requirements, publicising the scheduled times for private worship, and public worship limited to ten people at a time.

Arrangements for liturgies and access to churches while ensuring these conditions are met will vary, depending on the facilities and resources that are available in each particular community. We recognise that deciding on these arrangements and putting them in place is not straightforward, and we ask for patience and understanding during this time. New stage of restrictions is subject to changing guidance that we receive from the State Government authorities, and we are advised this will be reviewed at the end of May.

After a difficult time for all of us, including many new pressures on families and great challenges for healthcare and emergency workers, we share in the disappointment that social restrictions are likely to continue for some time.

Nevertheless, we act with one accord in doing what is most prudent and loving for the sake of those most susceptible to the virus. We rejoice that Christ is with us and will walk with us as we begin the long journey out of the current stage of restrictions.

Jesus Christ, healer of all, stay by our side in this time of uncertainty and sorrow.


Be with the doctors, nurses, researchers and all medical professionals who seek to heal and help those affected and who put themselves at risk in the process. May they know your protection and peace.

# Along the track The Call of the Spirit

Our parish priest sometimes finishes Mass with the question: And what will the Spirit call you to do today? What will the Spirit ask of you? How will the Spirit inspire you today?

These are encouraging questions at the same time as being challenging. The Spirit has been with us since the dawn of creation, when "the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters." The Spirit breathed life into our world, the Spirit inspired the prophets fearlessly and passionately to proclaim a message that was sometimes unwelcome but always inspiring. That same Spirit inspired Mary's 'yes' to become Mother of Jesus and urged Joseph to accept the challenge of being husband to Mary and father to Jesus. It is the same Spirit who came to Jesus at his baptism by John, the Spirit was at work in His miracles, it enabled the apostles, so afraid that they had locked themselves away, to come out and face the crowds, to speak with such passion that people of different languages and cultures were able to understand them, that Spirit filled the minds and hearts of so many who heard them and inspired their faith. Down through the ages, that same Spirit has inspired countless men and women to give their lives for extraordinary causes.

We can sometimes see the Spirit as not being a tangible part of our lives but rather as Someone belonging to the saints, inspiring great deeds, enabling some to speak in tongues, others to undertake courageous journeys to foreign and unwelcoming lands, to give up their lives for a great cause or effect miracles on behalf of God. That is part of our tradition. Pope Francis warns us, however, not to be intimidated or discouraged:

We should not grow discouraged before examples of holiness that appear unattainable. There are some testimonies that may prove helpful and inspiring, but that we are not meant to copy, for that could even lead us astray from the one specific path that the Lord has in mind for us. The important thing is that each believer discern his or her own path, that they bring out the very best of themselves, the most personal gifts that God has placed in their hearts (cf. 1 Cor 12:7), rather than hopelessly trying to imitate something not meant for them. We are all called to be witnesses, but there are many actual ways of bearing witness. #11

It is the one and the same Spirit we all received at Baptism, at Confirmation. It is that same Spirit who seeks us out in our daily lives, inspiring, encouraging, lifting us up in the down times, showing us the way in the good times and when we are not sure what to do next. In the words of St Paul:

And the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness. For example, we don't know what God wants us to pray for. But the Holy Spirit prays for us with groanings that cannot be expressed in words. Rom 8:26

It is the same Spirit who is quietly present when we are surprised by what we discovered we could do, when we found the right word to say when it was needed most. It is the same Spirit who inspires us to love – after all, God is love. That is what God is and when we love we are part of the action and life of God. It is the same Spirit who encourages us to do our absolute best to find and hone and employ the gifts each of us has been given. It is the same Spirit who encourages us to do our best to reach out to touch and uplift many of those people we meet and greet, the people we love and care for. It is the same Spirit that fills us at times with laughter, imagination and humour.

Today, in these difficult and challenging times, that Spirit still calls us to have confidence and courage. It is the Spirit who inspires us to love, to be patient and caring in our families, our schools and hospitals, in our workplaces, where we live and shop... in all that we do. When we reach out to others, when we encourage and challenge, when we comfort and bring joy, we do so because the Spirit is at work.

We need the Spirit's prompting, lest we be paralysed by fear and excessive caution, lest we grow used to keeping within safe bounds. Let us remember that closed spaces grow musty and unhealthy. Pope Francis.

### **Holy Water**

Why do we have holy water fonts at the entrances to our churches and why do we make the sign of the cross with the holy water when we enter and leave the church?

Traditionally, we have placed fonts of holy water near the entrances of our churches. This usage corresponds to Old Testament Jewish practices of purification: The Book of Leviticus prescribed various ritual purifications using water to remove the "uncleanness" associated, for instance, with coming into contact with a dead body, menstruation, childbirth, or leprosy (cf. Leviticus 12-15). A person also purified himself with water before entering the Temple precincts, offering prayer and sacrifice, and eating.

For this reason, in the Courtyard of the Priests (the area before the actual Temple building) was the Laver, an immense bronze basin filled with water. Here the priests purified their hands and feet before offering sacrifices at the nearby altar, bathed before entering the Temple itself, and also drew water for other purifications prescribed in Jewish rituals.

We too have fonts filled with holy water for blessings for three reasons: as a sign of repentance of sin; for protection from evil; and as a reminder of our Baptism. The repentance of sin symbolised in the washing with water is reflected in Psalm 50: "Have mercy on me, O God, in your goodness; in the greatness of your compassion wipe out my offense. Thoroughly wash me from my guilt and of my sin cleanse me. Cleanse me of sin with hyssop that I may be purified; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow" (3-4, 9). (Hyssop is a small bush used for sprinkling water). Remember too how St John the Baptist called all to conversion using a ritual washing of water to signify repentance for sin and purification.

These actions have been incorporated into our own Mass. In the Penitential Rite, one of the options is the Asperges, which includes the Rite of Blessing and Sprinkling with Holy Water. As the priest passes through the congregation, sprinkling them with the holy water, they customarily chant the Asperges Me, which is based on Psalm 50. In all, each person again makes an act of repentance of sin.

Second, holy water protects us against evil. In the prayer for blessing of water we read: "Lord, God Almighty, creator of all life, of body and soul, we ask you to bless this water: as we use it in faith forgive our sins and save us from all illness and the power of evil. Lord, in your mercy give us living water, always springing up as a fountain of salvation; free us, body and soul, from every danger, and admit us to your presence in purity of heart."

Finally, holy water reminds us of our Baptism, when by the invocation of the Holy Trinity and the pouring of holy water, we were set free from Original Sin and all sin, infused with sanctifying grace, incorporated into the Church, and given the title son or daughter of God. In making the sign of the cross with the holy water, we are mindful that we are called to renew those baptismal promises of rejecting Satan, all his works, and all his empty promises. Once again, we repent of sin, so that we can offer our prayers and worship to God with pure and contrite hearts. Just as water and blood flowed from the Sacred Heart of our Lord as He hung upon the cross — signifying the great sacraments of Baptism and Holy Eucharist, the taking of holy water and making the sign of the cross remind us of our Baptism in preparation for the reception of Communion.

Never should we doubt the power of this great sacramental. St Teresa of Avila wrote of the power of holy water: "I was once in an oratory, and [the devil] appeared to me in an abominable form at my left side. Because he spoke to me, I looked particularly at his mouth - which was most frightening. It seemed that a great flame, all bright without shadow, came forth from his body. He told me in a terrifying way that I had really freed myself from his hands but that he would catch me with them again. I was struck with great fear and blessed myself as best I could; he disappeared, but returned right away. This happened to me twice. I didn't know what to do. There was some holy water there, and I threw it in that direction; he never returned again ... I often experience that there is nothing the devils flee from more — without returning — than holy water." Thus we see the importance not only of pausing to bless ourselves with holy water as we enter and leave Church but also of having holy water available in our homes.
