Spiders that Sail

Scientists in Britain have discovered that an ordinary little spider, one we have all seen hundreds of times, is actually a very adept sailor. Some species of spider form diving bells out of silk to enable them to breathe under water. All the spiders examined by scientists were able to stand on water thanks to their water-repellent legs. They showed off sailing skills, catching the wind and cruising forward by making 'sails' from parts of their bodies. Some pointed two forelegs up in a V-shape, while others thrust their abdomen skyward – the equivalent of a handstand on the water.

This humble little spider has been sailing over ponds and rivers and creeks for thousands of years. And we just found out about it! And we think we know it all!

Nature reveals her wonders every day. New technologies allow us to go to ocean depths not accessible before and a whole new world has opened up before us, previously undiscovered species, new creatures, new forms of life. And they have been there for centuries and centuries. Space travel is revealing new planets, new moons, new galaxies. So are more and more sophisticated telescopes. The microscope can reveal the intricacies of plant and animal life not visible to the naked eye.

The wonders of creation are continually revealed in her incredible ingenuity and in her beauty, in the thousands of ways she has adapted to changing circumstances, in the unending variety and splendour that we are continuing to discover. For some, that is enough, just to be amazed by the wonder and design of all that is around us, for the way things have evolved. For others that is not enough.

Thousands of years ago, poor suffering Job had some advice:

But ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds in the sky, and they will tell you; or speak to the Earth, and it will teach you, or let the fish in the sea inform you. Which of all these does not know that the hand of the LORD has done this? In His hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind. Job 12:7-10 Faith is the key that enables us to see the wonders of the Creation as well as the love of its Creator. For some, that is delusional, fantasy as it were. But faith is far from that. Faith is both a challenge and a responsibility. It invites us to take time to feel the presence of the Creator all around us, in the beauty, the power, the wonder and awe of the greatest and smallest of things. Faith challenges us to wonder and question – how did all this happen and why?

Faith also challenges us to take on responsibility for creation. The Creation story is a picture of what life could be. The Creation story reveals that creation is "good". Our Christian faith asks us to have a genuine love for the world. The Garden of Eden is not so much a place but rather a state of mind, an ideal, a vision to work towards where we can recognise God's presence and purpose, where we grow to live in harmony with God, with each other and with God's creation.

Faith challenges us not to be seduced by superiority, that we are above all and everything is made for our use, the creed of consumerism. Faith reminds us that we too are here as part of creation, not just as consumers of it. We are here to care for this planet, not to dominate or exploit it. We are here to find our proper place in it, to grow with it spiritually as well as physically.

Sr Joan Chittister sums it up rather succinctly:

We know now that if human beings disappeared tomorrow, the existence of birds, insects, water creatures, and land animals wouldn't be affected at all. If animals disappeared tomorrow, on the other hand, human beings could not possibly live without them—even the smallest of bees are needed to pollinate plants. As the top of the food chain, we would be the first to go....The Creator of all, the scriptures tell us, saw all of creation as "good". It is our role to protect it, to guard it, to develop it, to sustain it—not to destroy it for our own purposes.

What will you do today to care for creation? Will you take a moment to stop and enjoy the wonders of it?

The life of Catholic worship and piety XXIII

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Gestures of Worship: Our Ritual Language (3)

Striking the Breast

The gesture of striking the breast expresses sorrow, unworthiness, extreme humility. For Christians, this ritual gesture expresses our contrition, our sense of sinfulness and unworthiness before God.

Father Guardini also sees in this gesture an interior meaning that calls us to repentance. He writes in *Sacred Signs*: "To strike the breast is to beat against the gates of our inner world in order to shatter them. The blow also is to wake us up. It is to shake the soul awake into the consciousness that God is calling. She reflects, repents and is contrite."

Kneeling

Kneeling is an almost universal ritual gesture of homage, honour, reverence and worship. There are many, many biblical references to kneeling in both the Old and New Testaments, and these passages reveal that the gesture of kneeling is a very ancient, multivalent sign that expresses worship, respect, willing obedience, prayer, reverence, petition, supplication and homage. Kneeling has from time immemorial been a customary ritual posture in both public and private worship.

As Bishop Thomas Olmsted has observed: "What we do with our knees gives evidence of what we believe in our hearts. When we kneel down beside the bed of a dying person, when we stand up for the dignity of the unborn child, when we genuflect before Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, we say louder than any rhetoric what matters most in our lives. Knees express what we believe, and make clear what we will live and die for.

"Not surprisingly, then, knees play an important role in the Church's Sacred Liturgy, especially during the season of Lent. What we do with our knees during worship is anything but trivial. It rivals in importance what we do with our voices and our ears, what we do with our hands and our hearts."

Although kneeling, especially during the Consecration and just before receiving Communion, has been customary practice in most parishes in Australia, this gesture has also been the source of some confusion and misunderstanding. Before the Second Vatican Council people generally knelt throughout the entire Low Mass.

In his chapter, "The Body and the Liturgy", from *The Spirit of the Liturgy*, then Cardinal Ratzinger describes in some detail the various forms of kneeling, their biblical origins and meanings.

He also observed: "Kneeling does not come from any culture — it comes from the Bible and its knowledge of God. The central importance of kneeling in the Bible can be seen in a very concrete way. The word *proskynein* alone occurs 59 times in the New Testament, 24 of which are in the Apocalypse, the book of the heavenly Liturgy, which is presented to the Church as the standard for her own Liturgy. "It may well be that kneeling is alien to modern culture — insofar as it is a culture, for this culture has turned away from the faith and no longer knows the One before whom kneeling is the right, indeed the intrinsically necessary gesture. The man who learns to believe learns also to kneel, and a faith or a liturgy no longer familiar with kneeling would be sick at the core.

"Where it has been lost, kneeling must be rediscovered, so that, in our prayer, we remain in fellowship with the apostles and martyrs, in fellowship with the whole cosmos, indeed in union with Jesus Christ Himself."

Relearning Ritual Language

Though ritual gestures are intrinsically acts by which all people physically express worship (an external and visible sign of an internal and spiritual reality), the ritual gestures that appear in the Roman Missal directives, with a few exceptions, apply to clergy.

Even in the current revised liturgical books there are very few indications of ritual gestures for the people although this may seem ironic in light of the strong emphasis placed on "active participation" of the people at Mass in the liturgical reform both before and after the Council.

Yet the Council's Constitution on the Liturgy, Sacrosanctum Concilium, explicitly stressed the importance of this aspect of the liturgical reform. We read in its first chapter that active participation expressly includes "actions, gestures, and bodily attitudes". It says:

"30. To promote active participation, the people should be encouraged to take part by means of acclamations, responses, psalmody, antiphons, and songs, as well as by actions, gestures, and bodily attitudes. And at the proper times all should observe a reverent silence.

"31. The revision of the liturgical books must carefully attend to the provision of rubrics also for the people's parts."

There has been an encouraging increase in people's practice of making a gesture of reverence before receiving Communion since Archbishop Hart emphasised the importance of such a gesture. However, even today, several years later, it is by no means universally observed. So there is more teaching and learning to be done.

The ritual gestures we make during worship are, as Father Guardini observes (*Sacred Signs*), "a form of speech by which the plain realities of the body say to God what its soul means and intends".

By our ritual gestures — this "body language" — we unite the physical and mental/spiritual aspects of our worship of the Lord, and express our unity with Him with our entire being.

Recalling this may help remind each of us to make the effort to restore this ineffable and powerful "form of speech" in our own acts of worship. With our bodies and our minds united, we express our love for Christ and witness to others His love for all.
