For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit Himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what He means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, Alleluia! Blessed are you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth; You have revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom. **Alleluia!**

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew 13:24-33. Jesus put a parable before the crowds, The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everybody was asleep his enemy came, sowed darnel all among the wheat, and made off. When the new wheat sprouted and ripened, the

darnel appeared as well. The owner's servants went to him and said, "Sir, was it not good seed that you sowed in your field? If so, where does the darnel come from?" "Some enemy has done this," he answered. And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" but he said, "No, because, when you weed out the darnel, you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow 'til the harvest; and at harvest time, I shall say to the reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn."

He put another parable before them, 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown, it is the biggest shrub of all and becomes a tree so that the birds of the air come and shelter in its branches.'

He told another parable, 'The kingdom of heaven is like the yeast the woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour till it was leavened all through.'

In all this, Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed, He would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy:

I will speak to you I parables and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Then, leaving the crowds, He went to the house; and His disciples came to Him and said, Explain the parable about the darnel in the field to us.' He said in reply, 'The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom: the darnel, the subjects of the evil one: the enemy who sowed them, the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Well then, just as the darnel is gathered up and burnt in the fire, so it will be at the end of time. The Son of Man will send His angels and they will gather out of His kingdom all things that provoke offences and all who do evil, and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth. Then the virtuous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Dear Parishioners,

Greetings to you all in Jesus' name. At the very outset I would like to communicate to you that I have received the sad news of the demise of one of my elder brothers to Covid-19. He was 41 years old and his name is Jebamalai Raja. In my language, Tamil, Jebamalai means 'Rosary.' It came to me as shocking news yesterday and it is very difficult to accept as Jebamalai was a young person, and he has left behind three young children (daughters) studying in grades 7, 5 and 3. Thank you to all those who messaged me and called me over the phone to express your condolences to me and my grieving family back home in India.

Jebamalai was just two years older than me. He has had the problem of asthma from the time of his childhood, and with that problem he was weak and vulnerable to Covid-19. I believe that our good Lord will be merciful and compassionate to him in granting him eternal rest. I request all of you to continue to pray for his soul and our grieving family as well. Jebamalai was buried yesterday evening (Wednesday) Indian-time.

I especially thank Helen Surman for letting those of you who have the internet know about the death of my brother. My sincere thanks to Andrew Jans who is, out of goodwill and love, organising a zoom Rosary for the soul of my brother at 10 a.m. this coming Saturday, the 18th July.

Thank you all for your prayers for my deceased brother and your messages of condolence. I pray that you will remain home and be safe during the current lockdown.

Anthony Cruz A STRANGE FEATURE OF OUR TIME seems to be our capacity to operate with conflicting mindsets. On the one hand we demand scientific proof for truths before we will adopt them; we want empirical evidence to back up belief. On the other we are willing to entertain theories that appear fanciful and to accept marketing claims that have no basis in fact. Is there a wise way of discerning the truth so that we can live by it?

The parables that Jesus tells are neither scientific nor fanciful. They are stories that bear deep truths for those who engage with them imaginatively and who are prepared to make the choices they call for. Jesus invites us on a journey of discovery when he begins "the kingdom of heaven is like . . .". No parable offers a logical or comprehensive description of the kingdom, but neither are we led astray into a world of fantasy. Jesus teases and challenges us to see the world in a different way – his way.
