Proclaim a joyful sound and let it be heard; proclaim to the ends of the earth: The Lord has freed his people, alleluia.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Acts 8:5-8. 14-17

They laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Philip went to a Samaritan town and proclaimed the Christ to them. The people united in welcoming the message Philip preached, either because they had heard of the miracles he worked or because they saw them for themselves. There were, for example, unclean spirits that came shrieking out of many who were possessed, and several paralytics and cripples were cured. As a result there was great rejoicing in that town.

When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them, and they went down there, and prayed for the Samaritans to receive the Holy Spirit, for as yet he had not come down on any of them: they had only been baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Why, Christ himself, innocent though he was, had died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life.

On that day you will understand that I am in my Father and you in me and I in you. Anybody who receives my commandments and keeps them will be one who loves me; and anybody who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I shall love him and show myself to him.'

If you love me, keep my commandments, says the Lord, and I will ask the Father and he will send you another Paraclete, to abide with you for ever, alleluia.





Parish Social Justice Group

Our Parish Social Justice Group was formed in 2002, under the leadership of Sister Maureen Keating, SGS. In the 20 years that followed we worked hard to represent the parish in numerous outreach and support programs, in accordance with our Mission Statement.

From 2008 until 2020, with the help of teams from within and outside the parish, we ran Tucker in the Tin Shed, which served a hot, two course meal to people experiencing hardship in the Hills area. We offered friendship and entertainment and we met many memorable personalities.

We held Sausage Sizzles, Book Fairs, Car Boot Sales and Cake Stalls to raise money for East Timor, Wellsprings for Women, Opening the Door Foundation and the Salesian Missions. We recently supported meals held in Emerald to raise money for Seekers of Asylum and Ukraine.

We supported a young Filipino Nursing student to complete her studies. She is now working in the Paediatric ICU department of a hospital in Saudi Arabia, and supporting her parents and siblings back home.

We collected and distributed clothing and blankets. We published newsletters, held film screenings and two "Hope Sunday" events to raise awareness of Social Justice issues and needs

In all of these efforts we enjoyed the unquestioning support of all parishioners and we formed strong friendships amongst ourselves.

We have recently held our final meeting. We are all 20 years older than we were when we began, and health issues and life events have impacted us all.

We take this opportunity to thank parishioners for their loyal support and to express the hope that our example will be taken up by others, and that our parish will continue to reach out to those who need help, as Jesus taught us to do.

We have a wealth of experience in how to stage and manage events, which we can pass on, so no one needs to start a group like ours from scratch. We urge parishioners to consider starting a new group. The work, no matter how small, is needed and rewarding.
