Jas 3:16 – 4:3

Justice is the harvest of peacemakers from seeds sown in a spirit of peace.

Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it.

After leaving the mountain Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

Homily for the Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B - 19th September, 2021

In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus again predict his passion, death, and Resurrection to his disciples. The setting here is important. Jesus and his disciples are preparing to journey through Galilee, a Jewish territory in which Jesus has already encountered problems with the Pharisees. Perhaps this is why Mark indicates that Jesus was trying to journey in secret. In predicting his passion, Jesus is acknowledging the danger they will face and is trying to preparing his disciples for it. Yet Mark tells us that the disciples did not understand what Jesus was saying and were afraid to ask what he meant. Such hesitation on the part of the disciples is not characteristic behavior. Peter had no fear about rebuking Jesus in last week's Gospel. Perhaps this is an indication that the disciples were aware that a new situation was emerging.

Mark paints a vivid picture in today's Gospel. Having arrived at Capernaum, Jesus and his disciples enter a house. In this private place, Jesus asks his disciples about the argument they had while they were journeying. Again, the disciples are uncharacteristically silent and afraid to answer. They have been found out. Jesus then summons the Twelve, whom Mark identified earlier in his Gospel as those chosen by Jesus to preach and to drive out demons. To this select group of disciples, Jesus teaches that those who would be first in God's kingdom must be servants of all.

Jesus then calls forward a child and teaches the Twelve that to receive a child in Jesus' name is to receive both Jesus and the One who sent him. We might easily fail to understand the significance of this action. In first-century Palestine, children were without status or power, possessing no legal rights. In this action, Jesus is teaching his disciples and us that when we serve the least ones among us, we serve Jesus himself. Who are the people without power or status in our society that Jesus is calling us to serve? Do we do so willingly? Jesus teaches that God's judgment of us will be based on this criterion alone.

#47 UPDATE: GENERAL LITURGICAL GUIDELINES

COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne Information Updated:



10 September, 2021, 11:00am

As of 11.59pm Thursday 9 September 2021, the following measures will be applied across Regional Victoria (excluding the greater Shepparton area) and Metropolitan Melbourne. These will be in place until otherwise advised.

Face masks must be worn inside and outdoors: everywhere except your own home.

- **A Curfew will be in place from 9pm to 5am, whereby a person is not permitted to leave their home except for limited reasons.**

- **There will be 5 Reasons to leave home:**

- shopping for necessary goods and services (one person per household, once per day, a support person can accompany if required; within 5km);
- caregiving or compassionate reasons;
- authorised work or permitted education, or work interstate (if you can work from home, you must work from home);
- exercise (up to two hour two hours, with one other person or members of your household; within 5km);
- receive a vaccination.

- Private and public gatherings will not be permitted: Single person bubbles will be allowed.

- **PRAYER and RELIGIOUS CEREMONIES:** No in-person gatherings permitted. Livestreaming and Broadcast is permitted with a total of 5 people present including technicians.

- **FUNERALS:** (indoor and outdoor): Permitted with no more than 10 people (and those necessary to conduct the funeral). Children under 12 months old are not counted towards this cap.

- **WEDDINGS:** (indoor and outdoor): Not permitted unless end of life or for deportation reasons. Involves only 5 persons (including the two persons being married, celebrant, two witnesses).

- **AGED CARE:** No visitors are permitted into aged care or other residential facility settings, except for end-of-life reasons.

Migrant and Refugee Sunday - St Vincent de Paul Society Social Justice and Advocacy Asylum Seekers & Refugees Portfolio

On this year's Migrant and Refugee Sunday Pope Francis has chosen the theme: *Towards an ever wider "we"*. He refers to our world as "crumbling and cracking due to myopic and aggressive forms of nationalism" and that "... the highest price is being paid by those who most easily become viewed as *others*: foreigners, migrants, the marginalized, those living on the existential peripheries".

The Vincentian Refugee Network (VRN) has joined with *Catholics for Refugees* and a number of other Catholic agencies to support "150 days of Action for People Seeking Refuge", a campaign initiated by the Josephite Justice Network in Sydney. The campaign was launched in May and leads up to Migrant & Refugee Sunday on September 26. Its focus has been to call on the Government "to remove temporary protection visas and provide a permanent and safe resettlement pathway for all refugees and those who arrive here seeking protection." This campaign is especially relevant for refugees and asylum seekers, such as those from Afghanistan, who cannot settle and plan their lives, as their visa status presumes they will be 'sent back' when their country is no longer deemed dangerous for them. The 150 day campaign was to culminate in a 'Day of Lamentation and Call to Action' on Migrant and Refugee Sunday. While many plans for in-person vigils and gatherings have been cancelled, we are all invited to join together in a virtual 'Call to Lamentation and Commitment' on 26 September at 7 pm (via zoom). Focus on Afghanistan

We are all aware of the precarious situation in Afghanistan, especially for ethnic and religious minorities and women. In Australia, there are more than 5000 Afghans living on temporary protection or bridging visas, many with families still in Afghanistan and without any hope of reunion or certainty for their own future. The Vincentian Refugee Network, with other members of CAPSA (Catholic Alliance for People Seeking Asylum) is calling for an increased humanitarian intake from Afghanistan and guarantee of permanent residency to visa holders. Together with CAPSA the VRN is also assisting in the work of *Christians United for Afghanistan* and the Afghan Australian Advocacy Network to call on politicians to urgently review current policy, to increase the intake of people fleeing persecution in Afghanistan, and to provide permanent protection and enable family reunion for Afghan refugees currently in Australia on temporary visas.
