#### Homily for the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B - 24th January, 2021

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Repent! Here we are in Ordinary Time and it sounds like Lent! The beginning of the ministry of Jesus Christ begins with Jesus calling His followers to repent. Repent in this context means to change the direction of one's life. And we see with clarity where Jesus is pointing us: Believe in the Gospel!

The first reading today is the story of Jonah preaching repentance in the city of Nineveh. The preaching of Jonah was completely successful and the whole city repented including the rulers. Although Jonah did not want the city to repent but rather wanted it destroyed, we see that the people respond to Jonah's preaching and God "repented" of the evil which He had planned.

We need to hold this in our hearts: the people repented and God also repented. Both were willing to change the direction of their intentions. We don't normally think of God repenting but surely the repentance of God is part of the Gospel that Jesus is proclaiming. God's only intention is our salvation and our good. Whenever God is presented as angry in the Scriptures, it is because God loves us and the hope is that God's anger will bring us to repentance and then God Himself will repent. This probably is not the way that we think of God but we need to listen to God's Scriptures and discover again God's love for us.

The second reading is from the First Letter to the Corinthians. We are told in this small section that the world is passing away and that our actions must change. We must put all of our energy into seeking God and the ways of God.

Then we come to the Gospel of Saint Mark again. Jesus preaching the Gospel! So often we only think of the Gospel as the preaching about Jesus Christ. Even in the Old Testament we find the word "gospel" in the Greek translation and is usually translated as "good news." What is the good news that Jesus preaches? It is this: believe that God loves us and sends His Son for our salvation! As always, if we won't accept this Good News, nevertheless it is true. Our challenge is always to accept the Gospel given to us in Christ Jesus and to be so moved by it that we ourselves draw others to know the love and mercy of God.

On December 5<sup>th</sup> Our Archbishop A. Peter Comensoli has written a pastoral letter to the Clergy of the Archdiocese of Melbourne, expressing his concerns over the Bill (Change or Suppression (Conversion) Practices Prohibition Bill 2020) quietly tabled last week by the State Government of Victoria. The Archbisop has asked us to make the parishioners aware of the Bill and its Implications, and encourage the parishioners to phone our local Member of Parliament to express our view.

Because, the bill has not been widely publicised, many parents and families, clergy and people of faith are currently unaware of the contents of this proposed legislation, which might have a chilling effect on the ability of Victorian people of faith to express a view, share their faith, or talk about biblical teaching without fear of state interference. In fact, the ultimate outcome of this bill may not actually be to protect anyone who is vulnerable, but to silence people of faith from expressing their view.

### **#25 UPDATE: GENERAL LITURGICAL GUIDELINES**



# COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne Information Updated: Monday 18 January, Midday

The following Guidelines are approved by Most Rev Peter A Comensoli, Archbishop of Melbourne, to assist Clergy and Faithful with questions pertaining to specific areas of liturgy and ministry in the Archdiocese of Melbourne duri this time of the COVID-19 pandemic.
Places of Worship and Religious Gatherings All places of worship including churches, adoration chapels and other church buildings used for public prayer and religious services may open for permitted religious ceremonies.
$\square$ Religious gatherings can be held indoors or outdoors. Venues must apply the I person per two square metre rule to ensure people have enough room to maintain I.5 metres distance between them. There are no group limits;
$\Box$ The two square metre rule can be used only if electronic record keeping is used, otherwise, the four square metre rule must apply. The square metre rule doesn't include babies under 12 months of age;
$\square$ Record Keeping is required for all attendees beyond a 15-minute visit – and must include: First Name + Contact Number + date and time at which the person attended the place of worship. Records must be kept for 28 days;
☐ People must carry a face covering at all times;
$\Box$ It is not mandatory to wear a fitted face covering during worship and prayer, but if the required distance of 1.5m between persons cannot be maintained, fitted face coverings should be worn (indoors or outdoors) unless there is a lawful exemption not to do so, or for children under 12 years of age.
☐ Hygiene precautions must continue to be maintained throughout;
$\square$ Doors must remain closed to prevent public access if there is no-one available to ensure that particular number limits are maintained;
$\square$ A place of worship can have indoor or outdoor religious gatherings at the same time. Ceremonial participants other than faith leaders are included in the two square metre rule only if electronic record keeping is used. Otherwise, the four square metre rule applies;
☐ Places of worship can continue to be open for essential public support services. Essential public support services include food banks, help for people experiencing homelessness or other essential activities. A distance of at least 1.5 metres must be kept between people.
OUTDOOR RELIGIOUS GATHERINGS
$\Box$ Places of worship may hold religious ceremonies outdoors; The two square metre rule must be applied to ensure everyone has enough room to maintain 1.5 metres distance from each other;
$\Box$ It is recommended that fitted face coverings be worn outdoors if a distance of 1.5m between persons cannot be maintained;
Outdoor religious gatherings must be held in an outdoor space that is near to the place of worship hosting the service. This means: - a service could be held on the grounds of a place of worship or in the car park; - a public outdoor space, like a park, close to the place of worship. You may need a permit from your local council. You can find your local council using Know Your Council; - schools that want to host an outdoor religious ceremony should do so near their place of worship. For many schools this could be the school's oval or sports grounds (if, for example the school assembly hall is used for religious activities and is therefore a place of worship). Schools can find further information on advice for schools and through Catholic Education Melbourne;
