

# MONTH OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS

## **REFLECTION by Nick Brodie**

As so often in the Gospel, Jesus takes the way we are tempted to think and flips it on its head: 'Anyone who is not against us is for us.'

Pope Francis suggests that Jesus invites us 'not to hinder those who do good, because they contribute to the fulfilment of God's plan.' This includes the Church, the Pope points out, noting that 'we need to be vigilant about closure in the Church' and falling prey to the devil's temptation 'to divide and exclude people.' The Pope reminds us that unless we are 'humble and open communities' there is a risk that the Church or groups within it can easily 'give the impression of being the "top of the class" and keep others at a distance.' He warns against cliques that form around certain priests, closed-circle pastoral groups, and so on, which 'runs the risk of turning Christian communities into places of separation and not of communion.' 'The Holy Spirit does not want closure,' the Pope affirms. 'He wants openness, welcoming communities where there is a place for everyone.' After all, Jesus exhorted us to rein in our own attitudes rather than worrying about the attributes of others. As the Pope notes, 'the risk is to be inflexible towards others and indulgent towards ourselves.' Therefore, he suggests that 'instead of judging everything and everyone, let us be attentive to ourselves!'



## The Guardian Angels

Feast day: Oct 02

"For he hath given his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways." - Psalm 90:11

The truth that each and every human soul has a Guardian Angel who protects us from both spiritual and physical evil has been shown throughout the Old Testament, and is made very clear in the

It is written that the Lord Jesus was strengthened by an angel in the Garden of Gethsemane, and that an angel delivered St. Peter from prison in the Acts of the Apostles. But Jesus makes the existence and function of guardian angels explicit when he says, "See that you despise not one of these little ones; for I say to you, that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 18:10).

In saying this Jesus points out that all people, even little children, have a guardian angel, and that the angels are always in Heaven, always looking at the face of God throughout their mission on earth, which is to guide and protect us throughout our pilgrimage to the house of our Father. As St. Paul says, "Are they not all ministering spirits, sent to minister for them, who shall receive the inheritance of salvation?" (Hebrews 1:14). However, they guide us to Heaven only if we desire it. St. Thomas Aquinas wrote that angels cannot act directly upon our will or intellect, although they can do so on our senses and imaginations - thus encouraging us to make the right decisions. In Heaven our guardian angels, though no longer needing to guide us to salvation, will continually enlighten us.

Prayer to the guardian angels is encouraged, and the habit of remembering their presence and support leads to frienship with them. The prayer to the guardian angels has been present in the Church since at least the beginning of the 12th century:

Angel of God,

my Guardian dear,

to whom His love

commits me here,

ever this day

be at my side,

to light and guard,

to rule and guide.

Amen.

## The rosary is a victory of God whenever and wherever it is prayed

THE Holy Rosary has been drawing people to Jesus' side for more than 800 years.

Its significance to the life of the Church is difficult to overstate.

October 7, marks the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary.

The beads had ancestors in other forms like psalters but the rosary, as we know it today, arrived in the hands of the faithful in the 13th Century thanks to the Dominican Order.

The Order of Preachers formalised the long-standing Christian tradition of using prayer beads alongside the Hail Mary.

This basis flourished into the Mysteries of the Rosary, which cover the life and death of Jesus.

The joyful, luminous, sorrowful, and glorious mysteries tell the story of Jesus from the Annunciation through to the Crowning of Mary in Heaven.

The rosary epitomises the rightful exaltation of Mary.

Perhaps then, it should be no surprise that it holds such a special place amongst Catholics.

This feast day itself, Our Lady of the Rosary, shows how people have relied on Mary across history.

The day commemorates the Battle of Lepanto, in which the decisive Christian victory is attributed to the Blessed Mother.

Catholics across Europe collectively prayed the rosary so that Christian forces could repel the oncoming Ottoman hoards.

Out-manned and out-gunned, the combined forces of the Holy League (Spain, Papal States, Italian States and Malta), all but destroyed the Ottoman navy, and ensured the safety of the Western Rite.

The feast was traditionally known as Our Lady of Victory, a rather apt title considering the Battle of Lepanto was one of the most influential naval battles in history.

Yet, commemorating this feast as Our Lady of the Rosary, is no less victorious than Our Lady of Victory.

For the rosary is a victory.

The victory at Lepanto, in which Christendom collectively rallied alongside the Mother of God, hints to the power of the rosary.

Or in 20th century Italy, in which St Padre Pio described those humble beads as 'his weapon' against Satan.

Or perhaps even in our own lives, the rosary may play just as important a role as it did for Pope St Pius V or St Padre Pio.

The rosary is a victory of God whenever and wherever it is prayed.

The prayer takes us through the life, death and resurrection of Christ, all the while accompanied by she who knew Him best, his Holy Mother.

This feast day, let us be reminded of the rosary's unique power in drawing us closer to God.
