

St Monica : An epitome of Christian Mothers

Dear Parishioners,

What a tough time to stomach specially from the time the lockdown stage 4 came in place on the 3rd of this month. Thank God we are at the closure of the moth of August, 2020. At this juncture, I would like to draw your attention to the liturgical calender of the current month. Yesterday (27th) we had the memorial of St Monica, the mother of St Augustine, bishop and doctor of the Church whose memorial is celebrated (28th) today. Great lessons can be learned and inspirations could be drawn from the life of St Monica.

Most of the female saints of the first few centuries of the Church are virgins, martyrs, or both. Most of the medieval and modern female saints are nuns, especially foundresses of religious orders. Married female saints are relatively rare. With some few contemporary exceptions, they are the mothers of kings, of emperors, or of other canonized saints. Saint Monica is the mother of Saint Augustine (Born in 354 AD). Augustine as a young lad fell into the serious and enduring moral and theological errors (Manichaeism) which took him away from the Church and God. As a mother Monica's life was dedicated to getting her son back to his home, the Church. She wept, she prayed, she fasted. Nothing seemed to work for fifteen years while her son strayed far from the Catholic path, seemingly without remorse.

While she was in Milan, Monica befriended the great Saint Ambrose, who played such a key role in Augustine's conversion. The seed of her prayers bore fruit when Augustine abandoned his sinful life, was baptized, and decided to return to North Africa as a Christian leader. Thus her life's mission was accomplished What a great and virtuous mother St Augustine was blessed with.

Lots of our mothers can draw inspiration from St Monica. Today we see in the Church mostly the ageing people. What happened to our young people? Yes, Yes they have fallen into moral and error that they can live without God. This where St Monica's heroic life become great boon for all the mother's who find their children staying away from the Church and God. Let us not stop our prayers for our children, specially those who abandoned Catholic Church and its faith. Certainly all of our prayers will be answered by Our Loving God.



STAGE 4 RESTRICTIONS – METROPOLITAN MELBOURNE:

'Metropolitan Melbourne' is made up of 31 local government areas. Stage 4 restrictions have been put in place for these areas, which includes this Parish in its entirety.

- •All Victorians over the age of 12 must wear a face covering whenever they leave their home, unless a medical exemption applies. As of 11.59pm Sunday 2 August, 2020 and for a period of 6 weeks unless otherwise directed.
- •All places of worship including churches, adoration chapels and other church buildings used for public prayer and religious services. are to be closed. **Fr. Cruz cannot receive visitors for confession, unfortunately.**
- •**WEDDINGS:** No weddings are permitted unless an application is made to the DHHS for an exemption on compassionate grounds. If compassionate reasons permit a marriage ceremony to proceed, then only 5 people are allowed, comprising of the couple, the two witnesses and the celebrant.
- •**FUNERALS:** will be limited to 10 mourners, plus the minimum number required to conduct the funeral.
- •**BAPTISMS:** are to be postponed, unless here is a grave pastoral need. (Can. 857; 860).
- •**LIVESTREAMING:** a limit of 5 in total may be present, including the celebrant.
- •VISITATIONS: home visitations are not permitted unless for grave reasons. Only Clergy (Priests and Deacons) may visit. All hygiene precautions must be adhered including the wearing of face coverings. Holy Communion is not to be given to anyone in their homes or care facilities, including the sick and homebound, except as Viaticum for the dying, which may be administered only by Priests and Deacons, and complying with all hygiene precautions and the protocols of the relevant hospitals or aged-care facilities (washing hands, etc.) as appropriate.
- •**CURFEW:** A Curfew is in place from 8pm until 5am each day. You may leave home for the purposes of essential work only.
- If you can work from home, you must do so. All requirements around hygiene and distancing must be met, along with the collection of contact details. Accordingly, the <u>Parish Office is</u> closed. Phone: 0387518112.
