This week's readings: Wis 7:7-11; Heb 4:12-13; Gospel Mark 10:17-30

GOSPEL REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER: Jesus reminds us in this gospel that to join him in bringing about the reign of God requires absolute commitment and a willingness to give up that which is most precious to us. The rich man who approached Jesus was genuine in his desire to fulfil all the requirements of the Law to attain eternal life. Jesus quoted to him all the commandments that deal with right relationships with others. The man is able to tick these off and assure Jesus that he has been doing this since childhood – a pretty big claim in the first place! Then Jesus 'looked steadily at him and loved him' – he looked on him with the eyes of love; the eyes that see to the heart of a person, and in that look knew what was most important to the man. Jesus could tell by his dress no doubt that the man was wealthy and so it is this aspect of the man's life that Jesus chooses to challenge him about. This gospel shouldn't necessarily be read as a condemnation of wealth – rather, it is the man's inability to surrender his wealth that Jesus challenges. Jesus sees to the heart of the man and asks if he is willing to give up that which is most important in his life. The man is unable to do what Jesus asks of him and goes away sad. Why sad? He's sad because he knows that he has been tested and failed. He knows that what he genuinely desired was within his reach but he needed to let go of his position, his status, his wealth, to be able to grasp what he desired in both hands.

From the perspective of ... The Disciples: 'What about us?' Peter cried. The disciples were staggered that Jesus could turn away the rich man so easily and declare how difficult it is to enter into the kingdom of God. They suddenly see themselves in the shoes of the rich man: what more do they have to do? They've left their homes and families to traipse after Jesus, believing that this sacrifice would be enough to assure them a place in the kingdom, and suddenly they are faced with doubts. Has it all been worth it? Jesus reminds them that if they have followed him for all the right reasons then their reward is assured.

Have you thought? The Gospel of Prosperity: There are those within the ranks of Christianity who preach what is sometimes referred to as a 'gospel of prosperity'. They claim that wealth is a sign of favour, or approval, from God. They feel that if a Christian person is wealthy then they must be living a 'good' life that God is rewarding through material possession. They use this as justification for further accumulation of wealth. We can see from today's gospel that Jesus would have something to say about such an interpretation! Jesus reminds us that our reward is not in this world in the form of wealth and material possessions, but in eternal life.

Gospel Focus – Sacrifice: Sacrifice is a term that gets used quite a lot in religion and yet it's a term with which modern society is very uncomfortable. We're not really 'into' sacrifice. We're much more into feeling good about ourselves and comfortable in our existence. Jesus called on the rich man to make a sacrifice – to let go of what he really loved and valued. What Jesus really called the man to do was to place his trust in Jesus and not in material wealth – that was the sacrifice he was called to make. Ultimately, the man couldn't do that! He couldn't let go of certainty and security and entrust his life and soul to Jesus.

Henri J. M. Nouwen: The real danger facing us is to distrust our desire for communion. It is a God-given desire without which our lives lose their vitality and our hearts grow cold. We need friends. Friends guide us, care for us, confront us in love, console us in times of pain. Community is first of all a quality of the heart. It grows from the spiritual knowledge that we are alive not for ourselves but for one another.





A new Communion – Community is the fruit of our capacity to make the interests of others more important than our own. Bread for the Journey by Henri Nouwen

When we ask people to become 'stewards' to strengthen or expand the work of the kingdom, we are also inviting then into a new spiritual communion. This is very important. In Paul's letter to the Romans we read: "we are well aware that the whole creation, until this time, has been groaning in labour pains. And not only that: we too, who have the first-fruits of the Spirit, even we are groaning inside ourselves, waiting with eagerness for our bodies to be set free" (Rom. 8:22-23). This groaning comes from deep within us, and indeed from within all creation. It is the sound of our yearning for communion with God and with one another, a communion that transcends the limitations of time and space.

At the same time, this groaning also expresses God's passionate yearning for communion with us and all that God created. God desires "that the whole creation itself might be freed from its slavery to corruption and brought into the same glorious freedom as the children of God" (Rom. 8:21). This is the freedom of true spiritual communion. Asking *Parishioners to become good Stewards* is a way to call people into this communion with us. It is saying, "We want you to get to know us". Gathered together by our common yearning, we begin to know this communion as we move together toward our vision.

How does spiritual communion manifest itself concretely? When fundraising as ministry call us together in communion with God and with one another, it must hold out the real possibility of friendship and community. People have such a need for friendship and for community that fundraising has to be community-building. I wonder how many churches and charitable organisations realise that community is one of the greatest gifts they have to offer. If we ask for money, it means that we offer a new fellowship, a new brotherhood, a new sisterhood, a new way of belonging. We have something to offer - friendship, prayer, peace, love, fidelity, affection, ministry with those in need - and these things are so valuable that people are willing to make their resources available to sustain them. Fundraising must always aim to create new, lasting relationships. I know people whose lives centre around the friendship they find in churches, monasteries, service organisations, and international Christian communities. These people visit or volunteer, and it is in these settings that they find nurture and support. If these people have money, they will give it; but that is not the point. When compared with new freedom and new friends in a new communion, the money is the least interesting thing.

Spiritual communion also reveals itself in new fruitfulness. Here the radical nature of fundraising as ministry becomes clear. In the world, those who raise funds must show potential donors a strategic plan that convinces donors their money will help to increase the productivity and success of the organisation. In the new communion, productivity and success may also grow as a result of fundraising. But they are only by-products of a deeper creative energy, the energy of love planted and nurtured in the lives of people in and through our relationship with Jesus. With the right environment and patient care, these seeds can yield a great harvest, "thirty and sixty and a hundredfold" (Mark 4:20). Every time we approach people for money, we must be sure that we are inviting them into this vision of fruitfulness and into a vision that is fruitful. We want them to join us so that together we begin to see what God means when God says, "Be fruitful" (Gen. 1:28).

Finally, I would like to return to the relationship between money and we who seek it through fundraising. Just as the work of building the community of love asks us to be converted in our attitude toward money, so also this same activity invites each of us to greater faithfulness to our personal call, our unique vocation. Our own call must be deepened and strengthened as a result of our fundraising. Sometimes this brings us right to the heart of our struggle with our vocation. During my own fundraising work, people have said to me: "I will give you money if you will take up the challenge to be a better pastor, if you will stop being so busy and be more faithful to your vocation. You run around and talk your head off, but you don't write enough. I know that this is difficult for you — to shut the door and sit behind your desk and not speak to anyone, but I hope that my contribution will support you in your writing". This is part of the fruitfulness of the community of love. By calling us to deeper commitment to our particular ministry, fundraising helps to make visible the kingdom that is already among us.
