THE YEAR OF SAINT LUKE - OUR TIME PROMOTING GOD'S HOSPITALITY

This week's readings: Baruch 5:1-9; Phil 1:3-6, 8-11; Gospel Luke 3:1-6

GOSPEL REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER: The second and third weeks of Advent this year focus particularly on the role of John the Baptist as the one who prepared the way for Jesus and announced his coming. It continues the theme of preparation that was begun last week, but still, rather than preparing for the birth of Jesus, we are exploring the wider theme of preparation. The gospel writer includes a quote from Isaiah in which the prophet says, 'Prepare a way for the Lord.' (Often translated as 'Prepare the way of the Lord'.) The application of this passage to John the Baptist is a logical one. This gospel emphasises that John was preaching 'a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins'. Throughout the gospel of Luke, the recognition of sinfulness and the desire to repent and seek forgiveness is the prelude to receiving God's favour.

This gospel makes it clear that one way in which we can prepare a way for the Lord is to recognise our faults and failings and to seek forgiveness. It is only through such repentance that we can make ourselves receptive to the love of God. The only preparation of the way that is necessary for the Lord is a personal preparation to be receptive. We are absolutely assured of God's love. The problem is that we often feel that we are undeserving of that love or are unable to receive it. When we are called to 'Prepare a way for the Lord' it is a call to prepare a way in our own hearts – to break down the barriers that we have put up; to clear the obstacles that we have placed in the path. God's love will find a way! We simply make the way easier for ourselves to recognise God's love if we 'Prepare a way'.

Historical Context – **At this time** This particular gospel goes to great lengths to place the events of Jesus' life in a particular historical context. It is the gospel of Luke that identifies the birth of Jesus as taking place in the reign of Caesar Augustus and the governorship of Quirinius. Again, in today's passage, the writer is keen to establish the historical time and place. It is made clear that the ministry of Jesus occurred in a particular time and place. But the gospel makes clear that the message Jesus proclaimed reaches beyond its original context across time and place to our lives today.

Have you thought? Baptism We may think that Baptism is an invention of the Christian community but today's gospel makes it clear that baptism was used within the Jewish community and was put to a particular purpose by John the Baptist. Baptism was part of the Jewish tradition well before the time of Jesus. Ritual cleansing by full immersion was an important element of worship and converts to Judaism were required to walk through a deep bath known as a mikveh. John's use of baptism as a washing away of sin was a different interpretation of the well established practice.

Living the Gospel – Make way! Today's gospel is a reminder to us that Advent is a season of preparation. In this case, the preparation is all about making way for the love of God in our lives. The love of God surrounds us all the time. It's like a rapidly flowing stream and sometimes we have placed boulders in the stream that send the water flowing around us. The call to make a way for the Lord is a call to clear the rocks out of the stream; to remove the obstacles that are directing the love of God around us and allow it instead to flow directly through us.

Raise your voices ...

Entrance antiphon: O people of Sion, behold, the Lord will come to save the nations, and the Lord will make the glory of his voice heard in the joy of your heart.

Response to the Psalm: The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy.

Gospel acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths: all people shall see the salvation of God. Alleluia!

Communion antiphon: Jerusalem, arise and stand upon the heights, and behold the joy which comes to you from God.





Ten ways to

Invite People Home this Christmas

"Come home for Christmas!" There are people who have lost touch with the Church who long to come back, especially at Christmas time, but are hesitant to take the first step. In this leaflet we explore the practicalities of inviting people 'home' to their local parish this Christmas.

1. Pray for them

During Advent, light a candle each night and pray for one special person who has lost touch with their parish community. As part of your prayer ask God to show you the best way to reach out to this person.

2. Ask forgiveness

Advent is a season of renewal in preparation for Christmas. This Advent, let's examine the ways in which we have made it difficult for people to belong to the Church, whether by our lack of love, judgmental attitudes or by simply ignoring them. Ask God's forgiveness and say 'sorry' to an individual who is distanced from the Church.

3. Write a letter

Thoughtfully and prayerfully write a letter or Christmas card to a loved one, expressing what's in your heart and what it would mean to you if he/she joined you at Christmas Mass this year.

4. Host drinks after Mass

Arrange for drinks to be held (at home or at a local venue) after the Christmas Vigil Mass this year. Then invite your friends, including those who are far from the Church, to join you—for drinks and Mass!

5. Involve children

Children have a natural ability to soften hearts. Involve them in your efforts to welcome, invite and reach out to people this Christmas.

6. Hold a nativity play

A children's nativity play held in your home or street is a friendly way to proclaim Christ to the neighbours. Send out invitations, prepare the children, welcome people as they arrive, and finish with Christmas carols. To top it off, warmly invite your 'audience' to visit their local church on Christmas Day.

7. Send an invitation

Design a Christmas card on behalf of your local parish and include Christmas Mass times. Then letter-box-drop all the Catholics in your area. By joining with other Christian churches in your locality, a strategy like this can work well as an ecumenical venture.

8. Advertize widely

As well as letter-box-drops, check that Mass and Reconciliation times and other parish activities during Advent and Christmas are well publicized. Is there a clear sign outside the church? Are they listed in the bulletin? Submit an attractive advertizement to local media outlets.

9. Affirm and empower gifts

One way to involve 'distanced Catholics' in the life of the parish is to acknowledge their talents and put them to work. Whether it be serving meals to the poor, collecting for Christmas hampers, assisting with the children's liturgy or organizing the parish Christmas party, let people know that they are needed and valued.

10. Proclaim Jesus at home

When visitors enter your home, do they 'catch' the spirit of Advent and Christmas? Display symbols of faith, light the Advent wreath each evening, decorate a Jesse Tree, display a nativity scene, fill your home with beautiful Christmas carols and a spirit of love.
