THE YEAR OF SAINT LUKE — BEING THE GOOD NEWS BY PROMOTING GOD'S HOSPITALITY

This week's readings: Acts 2:1-11; Rom 8:8-17; Gospel John 14:16-16, 23-26

GOSPEL REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER: The feast of Pentecost celebrates the power of the Holy Spirit coming upon the disciples and energising them to set about their mission of continuing the ministry of Jesus. The gospel reading is one of the post-resurrection appearances by Jesus when he breathed the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. The actual events of that first Pentecost are recorded in the book of Acts and are recalled in this week's first reading. The use of this post-resurrection gospel account is a reminder that Jesus had already imbued the disciples with the Spirit but, as so often throughout his ministry, they were a bit slow to catch on to the significance of what he had done. It seems that they needed a more tangible experience to jolt them into action and Acts records the very physical experience of the Spirit entering their midst as a roaring wind before settling upon them as tongues of flame. Jesus had breathed the Spirit upon them but it took the roaring wind to make a real impression on the disciples. There are frequent references in the gospels to Jesus being 'filled with the Spirit'. It is this Spirit with which he was filled that he breathed upon his disciples; it is that same Spirit that we receive sacramentally in Confirmation.

For the weeks following the death of Jesus the disciples had lived in fear and confusion, not fully understanding what had happened and not really knowing what to do. When they realised that the Spirit Jesus had breathed upon them was really present and urging them to action they finally had the courage to begin the mission that Jesus had entrusted to them: to spread the Good News of Jesus and continue to realise his message in the world. **Historical Context – Pentecost:** The word Pentecost comes from the Greek for fiftieth day. Pentecost Sunday ends the season of Easter and comes as a Sabbath day after seven weeks of seven days. In Jewish tradition the 50th day after the Passover was celebrated as a blessing of the harvest and rather than the unleavened bread of Passover it was celebrated by leavening the bread. It was for this reason that the disciples were gathered together when they experienced the Holy Spirit empowering them. In Christian tradition, Pentecost is celebrated as the arrival of the Spirit, promised by Jesus, that animated the disciples to spread the gospel of Jesus and gather believers to form what would eventually become the Church.

Have you thought? The Spirit: We can sometimes regard Pentecost as the day the Holy Spirit came into the world. However, the Spirit had long been active in the world before this event. In fact, even the second verse of Genesis Chapter 1 tells us that the Spirit hovered over the waters. The Old Testament is filled with references in which 'The Spirit of God came upon (him) with power' and the Spirit was evident at Jesus' baptism and throughout the gospels. Jesus is frequently described as being 'filled with the Spirit'. So, from the very beginning of creation the Spirit has moved in the world and continues to energise it today.

Living the Gospel – Come, Holy Spirit: 'Come, Holy Spirit', or its Latin, *Veni Sancte Spiritus*, has become the basis of countless prayers and hymns over many hundreds of years. To this day, it remains a powerful invocation that can be used in prayer or meditation. Three simple words convey a wealth of meaning. The invitation for the Spirit to 'Come' indicates recognition of the need for the Spirit's intervention and openness to accept the guidance that the Spirit brings. It is a powerful, simple prayer that can be used at the outset of any significant undertaking or whenever you find yourself in need of inspiration.

Raise your voices ... Entrance antiphon: The Spirit of the Lord has filled the whole world and that which contains all things understands what is said, alleluia.

Response to the Psalm: Lord send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.

Gospel acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia! Go and teach all peoples my gospel. I am with you always, until the end of the world. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

Eucharistic Acclamation: When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.

Communion antiphon: They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke of the marvels of God, alleluia.

PENTECOST SUNDAY HAS ARRIVED WHICH MARKS THE END OF THE PASCHAL SEASON. We continue this weekend to ask ourselves the question, as we have done for the Lenten and Paschal season and as a result of the Plenary Council 2020 preparatory work we did late last year. "What is God asking of us in St Luke's Parish Community at this time?" Each week, we are encouraged to listen to God speaking to us through the changing situations in which the world finds itself. Our supplement this weekend is an answer to this question. Answers that have emerged as a result of our journey together this year and what has emerged from the grass roots of our Parish Family of Families. In today's Gospel, it is "the first day of the week", the Sunday after Good Friday, the day of the Resurrection. Jesus' disciples are cowering in fear behind locked doors. Suddenly, there is Jesus among them. He gives them the usual Jewish greeting 'Shalom' - "Peace be with you" or "peace is with you". The disciples, who just now were terrified, are filled with joy. There are two qualities that always accompany the presence of Jesus in our lives - peace and joy.

Now comes the mission: "As the Father sent me, so am I sending you." The baton is being passed. They have a job to do and it is exactly what Jesus himself came to do - to establish the Kingdom on earth.

Then he breathes on them. Breath symbolises life. In the creation story, God breathed over the waters, he breathed on the clay of the ground and formed the first human being. Today he breathes on his disciples and gives them a new life, making them a new creation, giving the life of his Spirit, saying "Receive the Holy Spirit." *Continued next page ...*

Today's Second Reading speaks of the effect of the Spirit on the Christian community. The Church reflects unity and diversity. We are not called to uniformity. WHAT ELSE CAN WE DO? & WHAT CAN WE DO BETTER?

(NO ORDER OF IMPORTANCE: 27 May 2019)

PENTECOST SUNDAY 2019

Youth

- Youth ministries; Program for Youth; Charismatic or Bible study for youth targeting those who do not attend catholic school; activities and get-togethers for the Parish Youth especially those who do not go to St Luke's School or a Catholic School; and bring more young people in were suggested.

(5 Responses)

Inclusion

- Great Parish!! Suggestions were made to include all within our community by taking out a second last pew, so people with walkers, wheelchairs, prams, could sit without feeling like they were in the way; organise a group to help bring elderly people to the Mass on weekdays & Sundays; making people feel more included

(4 Responses)

Prayer Life/Spirituality

- Find ways to pray together better and recite the Rosary as was requested by Mary or Mother;

(2 Responses)

Involvement

- **(4 Respondee)s** were being led to take a more active part in Parish Life, better serve the Lord & try to attend weekday Mass more often

Social Justice

- **(2 Respondee)s** suggested we reach out and help the needy and give alms;

Ecumenical

- To be more accepting of other believers, engage more with other Christian Churches thus becoming a stronger more inclusive community and getting together and sharing perhaps visiting @ communion or organising a joint event with the Anglican Church

(4 Responses)

Communication

- It was suggested our Parish Priest announce events in the Bulletin, rather than expect Parishioners to read them and announce when a member of our Parish has passed away & funeral details so we can pray for them

(2 Responses)

Liturgy

- **Music**

- Whilst a parishioner commented that our Parish Priest's singing in Mass is inspirational, suggestions were made:

for more modern songs (some more bops!), more diversity – instruments, singers etc., have a CD player or computer with some new Church music for when we have no organist and Support our choir/singers and have a recruitment drive for additional singers & musicians

(6 Responses)

- that the main parts of the Mass especially the Gloria & Creed be included on the overhead to assist when non-Catholics & grandchildren come, assist older people who don't know words and help our ethnic adults. It was felt this would aid greater participation

(5 Responses)

- **Other Suggestions**

- Communion under both kinds every Sunday
- We will have a louder better response if after announcing:- Communion Antiphon there is a 2 second pause [so we can pick up pages to read together]
- Encourage more young people to read & be Ministers of the Eucharist;
- We can do better to train the Altar Servers to be more reverent and know what they have to do
- Bring back the incense at Easter Masses
- Maybe Mass of Healing once or twice a year
- Shorter Good Friday service to cater for older Parishioners
- Would like if the Sermons were not 'read out' from script. Have some more direct engagement with the congregation. Thank you

Parish Community

- More parish get-togethers, social gatherings, e.g. church picnic or similar community social event, perhaps every quarter, to bring people together was suggested.

(6 Responses)

- A large number were keen to have a form of fellowship over a coffee, and perhaps snack, after mass, some suggesting once a month, to enable parishioners to get to know one another better

(9 Responses)

Parish/School Community

- Finding creative ways to develop stronger links between the parish and school community and to involve our school community in parish life was a common theme. Some suggestions were to have each class have a turn at leading the Mass, ask the school for volunteers for church duties and parishioners to help with school duties thus helping people to feel part of one community, organise an event/stall to run at the school to raise money for the church or charity thus getting the school more involved.

(7 Responses)

- Finding creative ways to encourage more families, particularly school families to join the parish family celebrating the Eucharist was emphasized in responses; one respondent suggesting making it obligatory for school families to come to Church, whilst another encouraged joint celebration of special events such as Father's Day, Holy Saints, All Souls and each class having a turn at leading the Mass

(8 Responses)

Outreach

- We need to work together with our Community, particularly the older generation & disabled to see how we can help them in everyday life and to reach out to former parishioners and those in the local community especially cultural groups.

One parishioner offered to assist the elderly with labour.

(5 Responses)

- Find ways to spread the Word of God to those outside our parish community as it was believed there was too much preaching to the converted; more publicly proclaim the Word of God and spread joy, peace and love to our neighbor and have more people believe in God

(7 Responses)

Sacramental

- A parishioners wondered if numbers celebrating this Sacrament were down and if so, why, suggesting a survey to ascertain reasons and wondering if this Sacrament needs to be promoted more. Another suggested reconciliation in a group format would be better as parishioners may attend more often and another suggested reconsider celebrating communal Second Rite for First Reconciliation – small groups with parent involvement in prayers as it has worked well in the past.

- One suggestion - that we receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

(4 Responses)

Parish Planning

• Vision

- Assist us to be more accepting to the changes that the Church needs to make to survive and share our vision of what the Parish life would look like moving forward. Have a half yearly gathering of parishioners to discuss and decide on topics of the 'here and now'. We are split into many small groups and we need to integrate more and also network within our community, e.g. the elderly in the parish; prayer group, Christian meditation group

(5 Responses)

• Plant

- Work on projects together to beautify the Church (inside); A new beautiful garden with many trees behind and along the side of the Church;

(2 Responses)

- **Financial**

- Make better use of the Hall to generate more revenue – turn it into a real business and Create more fund-raisers to support our Parish

(2 Responses)

Faith Development

- Consider/research involving ourselves in some adult education; E.g. learn more about the gospel; a short evening/daytime course on the current year's Gospel, half a day of reflection on a part of Luke's gospel or Acts of the Apostles; perhaps a retreat or day of reflection each year – research what we are looking for in this area; adult education in Theology & Scripture, e.g.: During Lent, A Theology study group?
- Discover ways to assist people to become a better Christian bring people to a better understanding of Jesus and to overcome sin.

(8 Responses)

Be Christ To One Another

- Learn to be kinder and better control my temper and more tolerant of others, less judgmental, accepting them as they are, embracing each other's uniqueness and be understanding and show more empathy towards their struggles, Love God; Love our neighbor; Love one another as you would like to be loved and show love and compassion to others. Lord help us to set an example that will lead others to find Jesus; be a better Christian help more people; be kind to our Children; look after them; make sure the children at St Luke's treat each other fairly, kindly & with respect at all times – particularly at school

(14 Responses)

Further issues for consideration:

For many Families the school (St Luke's) is the 'Church' as they do not regularly attend Mass. How do we see/promote this as a valid/vital connection? These Children are the future face of the Church. How do we 'rethink' Catholic Identity? These Children are 'living' an invaluable experience and are immersed in Catholic Culture. How do we merge the 'Church (Mass) & School to create a realistic vision. (I don't think we will get families as regular Mass goers). How do we use the excellent work of school & new understandings/changing world to re-create what it means to be a practicing catholic? How do we promote children attending Catholic Primary not State Primary? How do we change entry into Catholic Secondary on Catholic School NOT Parish?
