THE YEAR OF SAINT LUKE - BEING THE GOOD NEWS BY PROMOTING GOD'S HOSPITALITY

This week's readings: Gen 18:1-10; Col 1:24-28; Gospel Luke 10:38-42

GOSPEL REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER: Like so much of the Gospel of Luke, this week's passage is, at its heart, all about hospitality. This theme has featured in the gospel readings for the last couple of weeks. It is a theme that the writer returns to over and over again throughout the gospel to reinforce not only the importance of welcoming the message of Jesus, but also the extravagantly generous hospitality and welcome that God extends to all people. Taken at a literal level, this week's gospel passage can be a problematic one. Jesus is dining at the house of Martha and she busies herself trying to be a good host and serving her guest, while her sister, Mary, simply sits and enjoys the company of Jesus. Martha complains about her sister's apparent laziness and finds herself chastised by Jesus. On the surface, Martha is doing the right thing: providing hospitality for her guest. Yet Mary is the one whose actions are affirmed. Like in the parable of the Good Samaritan last week, the gospel writer reminds us that being preoccupied with one's duty – even in service of God – is not what God desires. Martha has forgotten that the guest is also a gift! Having welcomed and shown appropriate hospitality to her guest, Martha should have then accepted the gift of the guest, that is, the company and presence of the welcome guest. Instead she continues to busy herself with serving while her sister shows true welcome: accepting the gift of the guest's company. When we welcome a guest into our house, we can be too worried about impressing the guest with lavish hospitality and our best serving ware, rather than relaxing and enjoying the company of the guest. Like Martha, we can overlook the fact that God is present when we welcome a guest.

Scriptural context: It is no accident that this story about Martha and Mary immediately follows the parable of the Good Samaritan. We must remember that Jesus is portrayed as telling that parable as clarification of the law to love God and love neighbour. The Samaritan provides an example of what it means to love one's neighbour whilst in this story, Mary provides an example of what it means to love God. Together, the two stories tell us that compassionate service to one's neighbour is crucial but that God does not require service, simply love.

Different View – Feminist critique: Feminist theologian Elizabeth Schussler Fiorenza suggests that this story is less about an event in the life of Jesus than it is about events in the life of the early Church. In the first 30 to 40 years after the death of Jesus, women played an equal role in leadership and ministry to the community. However, by the time of Luke's gospel, men were becoming more dominant in the community. By portraying Jesus as admonishing Martha's active service and praising Mary's passive listening role, the passage can be *(mis)*-interpreted as endorsing the relegation of women to less active roles.

Have you thought? – Action vs Reflection: This gospel is sometimes portrayed as a dichotomy between action and reflection. Many within the Christian tradition adopt the Martha approach of responding to Christ through service and action while others see Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus as a model for contemplation and reflection. The two different models have developed quite distinctly in the history of the Church and it must be said that the Martha approach of service and action has been in the ascendance for some time. However, action that is not grounded in prayerful reflection runs the risk of becoming well-intentioned busy-ness.

Raise your voices ...

Entrance Antiphon: See, I have God for my help. The Lord sustains my soul. I will sacrifice to you with willing heart, and praise your name, O Lord, for it is good.

Response to the Psalm: The just will live in the presence of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Happy are they who have kept the word with a generous heart, and yield a harvest through perseverance. Alleluia!

Eucharistic Acclamation: Save us, Saviour of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free.

Communion Antiphon: Behold, I stand at the door and knock, says the Lord. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door to me, I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me.





Membership of the PPC

The Parish Pastoral Council is a council of the whole church at parish level - priests, religious, church workers and laity working together to give leadership to the parish. The parish pastoral council is established with the parish priest at its heart, and it can be misleading to speak of the council as though it were separate to him (e.g. 'the priest and the council').

Some of those employed by the parish in its pastoral life are members of the council – e.g. a pastoral associate, a school principal.

Lay members make up the bulk of the council, and they are selected through a various processes of discernment that may vary widely from nomination and election to simple and direct appointment by the Parish Priest. It is a fact that the practices engaged by various Dioceses and individual Parishes in the call and convening of Parish Pastoral Council members are quite diverse. Two basic principles apply to selection:

Firstly, the basic principle is that the Council is "A representative Group", bringing together the hopes and dreams of the whole Parish Community, but it is not a "Group of Representatives", each of whom brings only the hopes and dreams of the particular section of the community that they represent. Secondly, there are several balances to be achieved – gender balances, age balances, and particularly a balance between credibility and competency. Somewhere along the scale between the credibility of democratic election by all the people, and the competency achieved by appointment of duly gifted people is the desired balance for Council membership. It will vary greatly with place and circumstance.

Within those two broad general guidelines, the method for selection will usually depend greatly on the traditions of the Parish, its present needs, and a number of other pragmatic issues that may change from time to time.

A practice that is becoming prevalent is the practice of discernment. For an example of how a discernment process might be mounted in the interests of convening a Parish Council see the Article "Choosing a Parish Council by Discernment", written by a Parish Priest in the American Journal Church. **Fall 2004, pages 34-36.**

While the council is not made up of representatives from particular parish groups, experience has shown the wisdom of the council having a firm link to the Parish Finance & Property Committee, Parish Management Team and the Parish School. Likewise the council needs firm links to significant ethnic communities within the life of the parish. For example, the Pastoral Council is quite distinct from the Parish Finance Committee which is a canonically required committee to assist the Parish Priest with the financial administration of the Parish. Charged with the financial well-being of the Parish, it will usually act as the financial resources adviser to the Pastoral Council, whose care is the pastoral well-being of the Parish. It will usually work with the Pastoral Council in determining the availability of budgeted resources for pastoral action and programs initiated by the Parish Pastoral Council. Many Parishes find it very useful to arrange for a member of each body to attend each other's meetings to gain an appreciation of how they might work together most effectively for the building up of the Parish Community. Secondly, many Parishes have a practice of including the School Principals in the "ex officio" membership group on the Council.

However these linkages are effected, the Parish Pastoral Council, early in its formation, needs to identify the nature and purpose of its connectedness with each group in the Parish, and form a working relationship with each accordingly.

What are the functions of Parish Pastoral Councils?

Parish Pastoral Councils seek to:

- search out and respond to the hopes, ideas, needs and concerns of parishioners
- grow in knowledge and awareness of what is already happening in the parish
- · encourage and support the good work of existing groups within the parish
- evaluate carefully information gathered in order to contribute towards the making of decisions that reflect the values of the Gospel and the teachings of the Church
- set long-term and short-term pastoral goals for the parish
- · provide opportunities for parishioners to grow in their relationship with God and with each other
- develop, implement and improve parish initiatives that assist parishioners in their continuing efforts to live as effective Christians in society
- All are called to engage in this mission in the concrete circumstances of their personal and communal/parish lives. Moreover, each person's contribution is unique, valuable and indispensable.
- This mission of God's people, the Church, is a continuation of the work of Jesus. Four of the basic elements of this mission carried out in today's world can be described as:
- Proclaiming the Good News of God's love to the world around us;
- Inviting people into, or back into, the community of disciples, the local Church;
- Sanctifying by encouraging our faith community to grow in holiness;
- Transforming the world around us by our lives of discipleship until justice, love and peace prevail.

A Mission-Focused Parish Community

There are many signs that a local parish community is striving to live as faithful followers of Jesus.
 Four characteristics that will always be evident – to varying degrees – in a mission-focused parish community are:

Attractiveness

 The community is experienced as a valued source of spiritual nourishment, of belonging and of healing. It is a community that facilitates personal and communal transformation and its members are happy to belong to it and participate in its life.

Hospitality

• Every member of the parish community takes responsibility to welcome newcomers and feels welcome themselves. A deep sense of respect for the dignity and worth of every person underpins all activities.

Inclusiveness

 There is a genuine spirit of inclusion in the parish community for everyone irrespective of age, personal circumstances, ability, ethnicity, lifestyle choices, degree of involvement etc. No one is judgmental, and no member of the community feels judged. The door is open to everyone and all are welcome at the Lord's table.

Outward Focus

- The community, as faithful followers of Jesus, recognize their responsibility to bring the values of the Gospel to the world around them, permeating it with God's love, justice and peace. Working with all other like-minded people they will challenge injustice locally and globally and make their own the universal Church's option for the poor and the marginalized.
- These characteristics form the General Framework within which the PPC constructs, implements and
 evaluates a Parish Pastoral Plan, for the short and long-term, relevant to the needs and aspirations of
 a particular parish community.
- The PPC works with the Parish Priest to give these characteristics of a mission-oriented community a clear focus at a local level. They work together to develop a pathway along which the community can move in solidarity to fulfil its mission by exploring all the possibilities for living that mission in their individual lives and as a parish community.
