THE YEAR OF SAINT LUKE - BEING THE GOOD NEWS BY PROMOTING GOD'S HOSPITALITY

This week's readings: Sirach 3:17-20, 28-29; Heb 12:18-19, 22-24; Gospel Luke 14:1, 7-14

GOSPEL REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER: In the gospel of Luke, Jesus is accused of eating with sinners and tax collectors (Lk 15) and we have an image of Jesus as always eating with the marginalised. However, today's gospel account is a more common occurrence: Jesus eating with a leading Pharisee and people of social importance. Although Jesus is depicted as frequently dining in the houses of these well-to-do people, he was probably never invited a second time! As in today's account, Jesus made a habit of accepting the hospitality of such people and then giving them a lecture about how they should behave and reminding them who was not gathered around the table with them. Certainly the sort of actions that don't see too many followup invitations! The message he dishes out to the Pharisees on this occasion is about not thinking you're more important than you really are. He tells them that it is far better to assume a lower status and to be lifted to greater prominence than it is to assume too much and have to be asked to step down to your proper status. In first century Jewish society, eating was as much a political act as it was a social one. Who you ate with was a reflection of your social and political position. To be invited to the head of the table would reflect very positively on a guest whilst being asked to assume a lower seat would be humiliating. Jesus' final teaching in this account would have been outrageous to his audience. The thought of inviting to a meal people who were in no position to reciprocate was absolutely ridiculous. But Jesus encourages his audience to give to those who cannot repay – to be graciously generous just as God gives without expecting anything in return. **Historical Context – Hospitality:** In the first century, hospitality carried with it certain rules and expectations. If you were the recipient of hospitality, there was an obligation on you to return hospitality if it were within your means. Hospitality meant more than feeding people. It meant extending welcome to people even if you didn't know them. There was an obligation to extend welcome and hospitality to anyone who asked for it. Travellers knew that they could enter a village and ask for a meal and a bed and they would be provided. Jesus reinterpreted this obligation of hospitality and extended it to anyone in need. Scriptural context - Humility and Honour: Jesus' comments about taking the place of honour at a table are introduced as being a parable. Because it is identified as a parable, we know that there is a richer meaning below the surface. In talking about places at a feast, Jesus is referring to the kingdom of God. We know that Jesus has already identified that the lowly in this world will be in a place of honour in the kingdom. His message is that those who humble themselves in this world and give hospitality to the lowly will be lifted up exalted – in the kingdom. Living the Gospel – What's the cost? Jesus' message about humility is as relevant today as it was in the first century. It is part of human nature to want to fit in and to want to belong. Sometimes we are tempted to seek this acceptance at any cost. When our sense of belonging is achieved through the harming, humiliation or exploitation of others then the price is too high. When our desire for the latest fashion comes at the expense of others being able to simply live, then the price is too high. When we lift ourselves up by putting others down, then the price is too high.

Raise your voices ... **Entrance Antiphon:** Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long. O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of mercy to all who call to you.

Response to the Psalm: God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Take my yoke upon you; learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart. Alleluia!

Eucharistic Acclamation: Save us, Saviour of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free.

Communion Antiphon: Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God. Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

CATHY JENKINS DIRECTOR from the Archbishop's Office for Evangelisation has sent us a letter outlining what is the next stage of preparation for the 2020 Plenary Council: the Listening and Discernment phase. Please read it on our Parish notice board in our Church foyer. As we move into this discernment stage of the Plenary, "What happens when two visions of the kinadom of God come together? They can be both right—on about truth but with different perspectives. We have to take that into account in our reflection and discernment. The Church doesn't move by 'group think' or popular opinion; it moves by a process of faith." Fr Kevin Lenehan, The Plenary Council 2020 is a gathering of the Church in Australia to make decisions for the future. Six National Themes for Discernment have been drawn from the 220,000 people that were engaged in the Listening and Dialogue sessions. How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church in Australia that is: *missionary and evangelising? •inclusive, participatory and synodal? •prayerful and eucharistic? •humble, healing and merciful? •a joyful, hope-filled servant community? •open to conversion, renewal and reform? Each of the themes has a 'snapshot' report which provides a sample of the voices and answers that inspired the theme. 

REFLECTIONS

WHAT MAKES A DAD

God took the strength of a mountain, the majesty of a tree, the warmth of a summer sun, the calm of a quiet sea, the generous soul of nature, the comforting arm of night, the wisdom of the ages, the power of the eagle's flight, the joy of a morning in spring, the faith of a mustard seed, the patience of eternity, the depth of a family need, then God combined these qualities, when there was nothing more to add, he knew his masterpiece was complete, and so, he called it.....Dad.

'MY DAD' BY ANTHONY BROWNE

He's all right, my dad. My dad isn't afraid of ANYTHING, even the Big Bad Wolf. He can jump right over the moon, and walk on a tightrope (without falling off). He can wrestle with giants, or win the fathers' race on sports day, easily. He's alright, my dad. My dad can eat like a horse, and he can swim like a fish. He's as strong as a gorilla, and as happy as a hippopotamus. He's alright, my dad. My dad's as big as a house, and as soft as my teddy.

He's as wise as an owl, and daft as a brush. He's alright my dad.

My dad's a great dancer, and a brilliant singer.

He's fantastic at football, and he makes me laugh. A lot.

I love my dad. And you know what? HE LOVES ME! (And he always will).

Happy Father's Day to all the Dads, Special Men and those who play a fatherly role in all our lives. We especially remember our beautiful Dads who are no longer with us in this life, but whose memories remain with us every single day. Thank you for enriching our lives, imparting upon us, life long lessons and for making us the people we are today. You will never be forgotten, as you live on, in us, each and every day.

Seven Practical Discernment Techniques

(Spiritual Exercises, [178-187])

- 1. Ignatius suggests that we start the decision-making process by putting before our mind what it is we want to decide about. For example, we might be trying to decide whether or nor to enter a specific religious community.
- 2. He then asks us to pray for the grace to "try to be like a balance at equilibrium, without leaning to either side" (*Spiritual Exercises*, [179]). In other words, we should try to the extent possible not to prefer one option to the other but only desire to do God's will. To help us maintain focus and perspective, he asks us to keep the ultimate end and goal of our existence clearly before us.
- 3. Then we pray for God to enlighten and move us to seek only what is most conducive to God's service and praise.
- 4. One suggestion Ignatius makes is to imagine a person we never met who seeks our help in how to respond to God's call in the same decision we are considering. We then observe what advice we give this person and follow it ourselves. This is helpful since most of us are better at giving others advice than at figuring out what we should do.
- 5. Another suggestion is that we imagine ourselves at the end of our lives either on our deathbed or after our death standing before Christ our Judge. How would we feel about our decision then? What would we say to Christ about the decision we have just made? We should choose now the course of action that would give us happiness and joy in looking back on it from our deathbed and in presenting it to Christ on the day of our judgment.
- 6. When we do not experience inner clarity about the correct decision to be made, Ignatius suggests that we use our reason to weigh the matter carefully to attempt to come to a decision in line with our living out God's will in our lives. To do this we should, bearing in mind our ultimate goal, list and weigh the advantages and disadvantages for us of the decision at hand, for example, the reasons for and against entering religious life or a specific religious community. We are then to consider which alternatives seem more reasonable and decide according to the more weighty motives not from our selfish inclinations. Looking over our list of "pros" and "cons" for the decision at hand, we should notice if any of the reasons listed stand out from the others and why and see which way this might point us. This technique can help us move from inner confusion to greater clarity at least as to the issues that need to be attended to and help separate out which are more significant.
- 7. Having come to a decision, we turn again to God and beg for signs of God's confirmation that the decision is leading us toward God's service and praise. The usual sign of this confirmation from God is an experience of peacefulness about the decision. The confirmed decision has a feeling of "rightness" about it, and we feel a sense of God's presence, blessing, and love. This is a very important step, since the feeling of rightness, peace, and joy about a decision is a positive indicator that we have made the right decision whereas feelings of anxiety, heaviness, sadness, and darkness often indicate the opposite.
