In Mark 6:1-6 we witness Jesus returning to his hometown of Nazareth. Despite his growing reputation and the wisdom he shares, he is met with skepticism and rejection by those who have known him all his life. They are unable to see beyond their preconceived notions of who he is-a carpenter, Mary's son-and thus miss the divine presence and love he brings. This passage is a poignant reminder of the challenges that come with love and acceptance. Jesus's experience in Nazareth shows us that even the purest expressions of love can be met with misunderstanding and rejection. However Jesus' response to this rejection is not one of anger or retaliation. Instead, he remains steadfast in his mission of love and healing. His love is unwavering, even when faced with rejection. Love calls us to see beyond surface level judgments and recognise the true worth and potential within each person. It challenges us to look deeper and appreciate the unique gifts that everyone brings. Faith and love are intertwined; lack of faith can limit our ability to fully experience and share love. Mark's Gospel inspires us to embody the love that Jesus demonstrates. A Love without conditions, without expecting anything in return. Let love be a reflection of the divine love that Jesus shows us, strive to see beyond first impressions to recognise the inherent worth and potential in everyone we encounter and maintain our commitment to love, even when faced with rejection or challenges.

In reflecting on Mark's Gospel during NAIDOC Week let us deepen our love for one another, embracing diversity, and working towards a society where everyone is seen, heard and valued. This is the essence of both Jesus' teachings and the spirit of NAIDOC week – a journey towards greater understanding and unity through love. As we embrace this love, we open ourselves to the wisdom, beauty, and richness of Indigenous cultures.

Loving God, we come before you with hearts full of gratitude for the rich heritage and profound contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. As we celebrate NAIDOC Week, we ask for your blessings on these communities. Grant us the wisdom to listen with open hearts and the humility to learn from their stories and traditions. Help us to recognise the deep spiritual connection they have with this land. Unite us in your love. Amen.

First Reading: Ezekiel 2:2-5


The spirit came into me and made me stand up, and I heard the Lord speaking to me. He said, 'Son of man, I am sending you up to the Israelites, to the rebels who have turned against me. Till now they and their ancestors have been in revolt against me. The sons are defiant and obstinate; I am sending you to them, to say, "The Lord says this." Whether they listen or not, this set of rebels shall know there is a prophet among them.'

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

In view of the extraordinary nature of these revelations, to stop me from getting too proud I was given a thorn in the flesh, an angel of Satan to beat me and stop me from getting too proud! About this thing, I have pleaded with the Lord three times for it to leave me, but he has said, 'My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weakness.' So I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am guite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ's sake. For it is when I am weak that I am strong.

Gospel: Mark 6:1-6

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?' And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.

SAMUAWGADHALGAL, TORRES STRAIT

" 'Urapun Muy', from the Kalaw Kawaw Ya dialect of the Top Western Islands of the Torres Strait, means 'One Fire'. The title of this work pays homage to Torres Strait Islanders and Aboriginal people everywhere, as we all have that one fire: our passion for our culture. In this work, I have depicted the hands of our ancestors that have carefully dropped a burning ember on to a fire. This ember burns hot with intensity, stoking the flames, as it combines with the new fire. The linear detail shows the energy and power as cultural knowledge is transferred from our ancestors to us today. Culture is the fire that gives us knowledge, wisdom and purpose. It is our responsibility to maintain, practice, and pass on our fire to our future generations. Afterall Culture keeps us Blak, Loud and proud."
