On the first Sunday of July each year, the Catholic Church in Australia observes Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday.

The theme for this years Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday is '*Keep the Fire Burning – Strong in Faith*' This beautiful artwork, titled *Pentecost*, that has been created by three artists from the Balgo Community: Magda Lee, Gracie Mosquito and Imelda Gugamen.

Today, on the 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time, we join the Australian Bishops and the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council in celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday. As Australians, we are fortunate to share our home with the world's oldest continuing culture. On this day, we honour and acknowledge God's presence in the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, who have upheld their rich and diverse Cultural Traditions for thousands of years. We give thanks for the deep and enduring legacy of these ancient peoples and their contributions to our Continent. Let us also take a moment to recognise and appreciate the land on which our Parish is situated and the people who have nurtured it over time. Together, let us continue to cultivate a spirit of unity and respect for all cultures and traditions within our community.

As Pope Francis reminds us, we are called to be a Church that goes forth, embracing all cultures and peoples. Let us open our hearts to the wisdom and spirituality of our First Nations Peoples, recognising the presence of Christ in stories and traditions.

THE PAIN OF REJECTION

Her name is not Belinda. She is a former student who was determined to marry the young man of her choice. The family, mostly mother, was totally against her decision. "He is not one of us, and he his religion is different." In fact, what they were not prepared to say was that he was not white, and he lived in another State. Belinda did marry her man, interstate, and, sadly not one of her family members attended. It is quite possible that some of us may have experienced rejection of some kind, hopefully not as severe.

Already in the Old Testament the prophet Ezechiel, was warned by God that as soon as he began to prophesy against Israel, he would be certain to meet with aggression and rejection, but he must persevere. Mark, our Gospel writer was addressing this very topic. His community was composed of mainly converts, both from Judaism and from paganism. Some of these individuals would have been experiencing rejection of sorts as they left the family religion to join an incipient and suspect group of people calling themselves Christians. It seems to be what Jesus himself experienced on his return to the familiar synagogue in Nazareth, and it would have comforted Mark's friends in their struggles.

Most people in Nazareth would have known Jesus as a carpenter, a stone worker, a friend, and as an occasional reader and preacher. But when he arrived, among them he came with the fame of a wonder-worker, the one who had brought back to life the daughter of Jairus. "We know him as a carpenter," they said, " he is one of us. Where did he get these powers?" They could not accept so much change in him. Their struggle was similar to that of many people, past and present. Perhaps it has to do with understanding who Jesus really is.
