



LETTER FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

The day I took position as parish priest at Saint Dominic's parish was also the day when our 46 young people received the Sacrament of Confirmation. It was great to see the parish as its whole in celebration. There were old and young generations, the school and the church communities, staff and students... That marked the beginning of my pastoral journey with hope that the Spirit will produce a manifold fruit in our lives; that the fruit might take the shape of what we have traditionally named the gifts of the Holy Spirit – wisdom, understanding, counsel, courage, knowledge, fear of the Lord and piety.



Then one week later, I also had another chance to concelebrate with the Dominican sisters celebrating 150 years of their presence in Australia. Once again, young and old generations with religious and lay people coming together to acknowledge their contribution of gifts, talents, time and energy for the betterment of our country and Solomon Islands. In some ways, we all are recipients of their gifts. I wondered myself: how am I now the seed that God is planting in the world? Where am I called to speak the Word of God in my daily life? How should I plant a word in the world and how fruitful will it become? It's not easy to answer those questions. And there are still a lot of questions being raised in my mind since then.

Those two major events have launched me to an environment that I consider the parish as fertile soil into which the seed of Word of God has been planted and each of us, in turn, are now sowers.

Christmas is coming. "The Word was made flesh and lived among us." This is the meaning of Christmas. God has come into the world, born of virgin, in the person of Jesus Christ. The Word of God exists for the sake of communication between him and the Father, and for the sake of appearing in history as God's communication to us.

Jesus teaches us by his actions and his words. Along with his actions, He speaks a word of welcome to outsiders; a word of healing to the sick; a word of forgiveness to sinners; a word of acceptance to the least; a word of hope to the despairing...

Christmas is coming. The Word was made flesh and lived among us. I warmly wish you all a very happy and holy Christmas.

Over time the students will work with me, other parish workers and Fr Thomas OP to cover some of these areas of parish life.


At this time of year I would like to thank the community of St Dominic's Parish for there constant support and wish all a Very Happy Christmas and New Year.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY CAMBERWELL EAST CONFERENCE


Purpose: The Camberwell East Conference has been a part of the St Dominic's Parish community for many years. The Conference comprises members of St Dominic's Parish who give of their time freely to help those in our community, as well as other areas of Melbourne, who are in need of assistance in requiring food vouchers, assistance with utility expenses, school costs including purchasing School books and computers, School uniforms, paying for School camps etc where the parent/s are unable to afford to purchase those items.



Highlights: On one occasion this year we were requested to visit a woman in our Conference area who was in need of assistance with food vouchers. We had visited her previously but this time she was attempting to flee a domestic violence situation. With guidance from the Camberwell Police, we were able to put her up (as well as her adult son) in safe accommodation for two weeks, and eventually assist her to move interstate to live with her family. We were extremely grateful for the assistance of one parishioner, Tony Ryan of John Ryan Removalists who transported her furniture interstate so that she did not leave all her furniture and effects behind. She is so grateful for what we did for her and she is now safe with her family. Conference members visit individuals and families in Port Melbourne and South Melbourne, as well as in our area. Next year we will be looking after a specific area of South Melbourne where it is hoped over time we will get to know those in need more closely and will be able hopefully provide them with referrals to other organizations, if the need arises. Conference members assist at the Vinnies Shop in Auburn once a month. We also collect unsold bread and rolls etc from Brumby's Bakery, Middle Camberwell, once a fortnight on a Monday afternoon and that bread etc is made up for sandwiches by ladies of the Parish, as well as students from Siena College on the Tuesdays. The sandwiches are then taken by a Conference member into the Collingwood Town Hall for the Soup Van that night. Members also assist with the operation of the Soup Van from Fitzroy each Sunday evening. Fruit is purchased by the Conference from Bushy Park Fruit Wholesalers in Wantirna South which goes out on the Sunday evenings. We are so grateful for the support of the St Dominic's community when there are appeals for financial donations as well as the Winter and Christmas Appeals. With the non-perishable food donations from the Parish we are able to take those items to the SVdP Food Bank in Collingwood/ Abbotsford where the food is distributed to the poor in that area.

ST DOMINIC'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

It has been a busy and productive year at St Dominic's Primary School during 2017. It was the first full year that we implemented action plans from our review in 2016 and this provided us with targeted direction and purpose.

For the first time we used our new Dominican House names! All students are a member of a House for a variety of activities throughout the year, the most prominent being the cross country and sports days. The current Year 6 leaders presented to Fr Paul Rankin and I at the end of last year to recommend names for the Houses and I am delighted to report they reflect the values that epitomize the Dominican charism.

The House names are Siena (Red) House, Aquinas (Blue) House, De Porres (Green) House and Caesarini (Gold) House. Each of these House names serves as a reminder of significant figures who have lived and left a strong legacy of Dominican values.



Our 2017 school calendar was busy with dozens of events that helped foster and promote our Gospel values and community spirit. Our Sacramental program plays a pivotal role in the religious education program. Our teaching staff are well supported by Jacinta

Bibby, our Pastoral Associate, as they guide our students through their preparation for Holy Eucharist, Reconciliation and Confirmation. Both Fr Paul and Fr Peter have been wonderful leaders to our students during these special times and on behalf of our school community I thank them for their guidance. Of course we were sad to farewell Fr Paul, but excited to welcome Fr Peter to our community.

The Sacramental program not only contributes to the faith development of our school children but also to community spirit. These significant family celebrations are a reminder of the importance of family and community and they help children to learn more about the significance of the religious signs and symbols of our faith.

Our school is well supported by our Parents and Friends Association (PFA). The new name for our PFA reflects the inclusive nature of our school community and again they have done an amazing job in raising funds for the school and developing social connections for all families.

Our committed and talented staff do an amazing job every day to care for and provide purposeful learning opportunities for our students. We have developed a strong Social and Emotional Learning program over the last few years and this year we had a greater focus on developing STEM education (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) by being part of a collective with three other local Parish primary schools. These initiatives form just a small part of the comprehensive learning program we offer at St Dominic's.

I would like to thank Fr Peter, Fr Paul, the School Advisory Board, our PFA, the Parish Pastoral Council and all families of the school and Parish for their generous support throughout 2017. My final thank you is to the wonderful and talented students of St Dominic's who every day make us proud with their amazing achievements and delightful personalities. We are blessed to be working in partnership with families to help them learn and develop during these formative years.

WELCOMING THE STRANGER COMMITTEE

The two asylum seeking Afghani women who the parish has been helping with accommodation and social support for the last 18 months were granted a Safe Haven Enterprise Visas (valid for 5 years) earlier this year. In the previous two years the parish helped a Syrian family until they were given refugee status in Australia.



We have been in partnership with St Bridget's in Greythorn for the past 17 months helping that parish support an asylum-seeker Tamil family. They are still waiting on the Immigration Department's decision on their application for refugee status.

In February a special collection of food and other items for asylum seekers was held. The response from parishioners was outstanding. All items were given to the **Brigidine Asylum Seeker Resource Project (BASP)** where they were gratefully received.
