LONG TIME ST JOHN'S PARISHIONERS RETIRE

Paul and Joan Parsons have retired from active service to the parish of St John's and the Heidelberg community after forty years of involvement. Many would not know the unassuming and quiet couple who first came to Heidelberg from New Zealand with their five children in 1969. Their two youngest began school at St John's and it was from there that the parish connection began.

In her early days in the parish, Joan together with Molly Boundy, was involved with the preparation of the weekly parish newsletter produced on a typewriter and gestetner machine. (google gestetner to understand the process).

Joan's literacy skills came very much to the fore in the preparation of the Echo magazine and later the Deanery newsletter. Joan's contribution to the magazine and newsletter always made interesting thought provoking and challenging reading. Joan together with Sr Joy Hanrahan, our parish pastoral worker at the time, were St John's representatives on the Deanery. Joan was never afraid to present her views which may not have always coincided with those of more conservative persuasions. Despite sometimes presenting what might have been regarded by some as radical views, she has been stoic in her faith. Joan's community work has revolved around Heidelcare where she was one of the original co-ordinators of this ecumenically based support organisation when it commenced twenty-five years ago. Heidelcare was the brainchild of the then St John's parish priest, Fr Bob Coghlan and is an interdenominational group and is still very active today. Joan was very much at home in that environment.

Paul commenced his involvement with parish life when requested by the then parish priest, Barry Whelan, to join Patrick Gill, Ray Shepherdson, Paul de Stefanis, Pat Jones, Gerry Lonergan and Peter Farley on the parish finance committee.

Those who remember these names will understand Paul was joining a highly thought of group of parishioners, such was the parish priest's regard of Paul. He only recently retired from that committee.

Paul managed the general running of the parish hall, including the letting and carrying out of many maintenance matters with his friend, Jim Kann for many years. Paul was in the presbytery nearly every Monday morning to attend to finance matters assisted by Alec Mason, Carl McCarthy in the past, and in more recent times by John Griffiths. Paul joined Joan on the committee of Heidelcare were he generously served the community until recently.

The contributions to parish and community life cannot adequately be conveyed in words as it was in actions that those who know, will remember them.

Joan and Paul have been wonderfully loyal and valued contributors to parish life at St John's.

A yearly budget is set to ensure that the parish can meet its financial commitments.

We thank this group for their continued good counsel.

Thank also to members of all the other groups in our parish who make St Johns the loving, caring, giving parish it is.

St John's Tennis Club

In his report, the retiring President, Des O'Brien referred to the enormous contribution made by the retiring Secretary, Christine George during her 10 years with the Club. The Club had risen from being one of the smaller clubs in the Junior Association to now one of the larger ones with 80 juniors playing competition tennis on Saturday mornings. The Club is still seeking a replacement for Chris. In addition, the club has nearly 80 adults in competitions. Social tennis continues to attract many to the courts on Fridays and Sundays. Membership is strong and interest in tennis continues to grow at St John's.

Financial statements prepared by Treasurer Paul Rizza revealed the Club in a healthy financial position, with a bank balance at 30 June 2013 of \$38,000 and \$50,000 owing to the Parish on a loan for the refurbishment of the courts, down from the original loan of \$80,000. Since 30 June as a result of subscription income, the debt to the Parish has been reduced to \$40,000 and the bank balance is now \$53,000.

The President noted the support the Club receives from the Parish with the Club being unable to borrow, the Parish acts as banker. The Club continues to honour its obligations to the Parish making loan repayments as per the terms of the agreement.

Much discussion centered on the potential liability for injuries suffered playing on the courts. The tennis club is covered under the Parish's insurance policy. Every effort is made to minimize risk to those using the courts.

The Club has and continues to receive the support of the Parish Priests. A well attended Annual General Meeting indicated great support from its members.

Gr 5/6


