Dear Parishioners, Visitors to our parish, and Friends

The Catholic Church in Australia has started on a journey of renewal. It is going to look at itself and the way it grows and checks whether it is being faithful to the good news of Jesus Christ and at the same time being relevant to our contemporary Australian culture in the 21st century.

There is nothing new or original in this venture. It is exactly what the Church is meant to do to remain always faithful to its calling. This is, in a way, a continuation of the great mystery of the Incarnation: God who became human like us.



The Letter to the Hebrews teaches us that 'in the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe.' (1:1-2)

Throughout the Old Testament God communicated to his people through the prophets and through many different ways. In the fullness of time he sent his Son to live among us; Jesus is the fullness of God's communication with us. After Pentecost, through the Holy Spirit, God entrusted this mission to us, his Church, today's People of God and Body of Christ. It is our duty to continue talking to the world around us and translating the good news in ways that can be understood and consumed by all.

The Universal Church carries out this duty through the Ecumenical Councils, the Synods of bishops and the ministry of the pope. The Second Vatican Council has been the last council to speak officially in the name of the Church; since then there have been a number of synods on different topics and many papal documents, addressing different issues.

The Church in Australia, through its bishops, is now asking us to do the same in our own country through the Plenary Council to be held in 2020. The last such council took place in Australia 80 years ago.

The story of the Incarnation started with the Holy Spirit overshadowing the virgin Mary, giving birth to the Son of God. The Australian Plenary Council also starts with the Holy Spirit. The Church is asking us to pray, discern and listen to God's voice today. God still speaks to us in a language we can understand, but we need to listen. (The word 'listen' is an anagram of the word 'silent;' to listen one has to be silent!)

We are being asked to pray and reflect upon the question: 'What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?' It is our duty now, each of us individually and as a group, to pray, be silent and listen. Next week I will share how we can let our voices be heard in this process.

I gave my body to those who struck me.

The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle.

The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed.

SECOND READINGJames 2:14-18

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead.

This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds — now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! My only glory is the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, which crucifies the world to me and me to the world. Alleluia!

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'

WHAT KIND OF MESSIAH?

Jesus explicitly raises the issue of his identity. While Peter's answer ('You are the Christ') is correct, Jesus neither confirms nor applauds him. Instead, enjoining silence on the matter, he speaks of his coming passion and death in Jerusalem. The knowledge that he is Messiah is not to be separated from the kind of Messiah he is to be: not one who will be served and honoured, like the rulers of this world, but one who will 'serve and give his life as a ransom for many' (10:45).

From this point on, the disciples will struggle—unsuccessfully as it turns out—to hold two truths together: that Jesus is indeed the long-awaited Messiah and that he will fulfil his messianic role by entering into the pain and suffering of the world, even unto death—something quite unforeseen in conventional Jewish messianic expectation.

Peter's remonstrance voices the perceived incompatibility between the two truths. Why should God allow the Messiah, indeed God's own Son, to suffer in this way?

But to attempt to deflect Jesus from this path would be to play Satan's game, frustrating God's gift of life to the world through the cross. Disciples of Jesus must go the same way, take up their cross and follow after him.

The fact that Peter who has just got something so splendidly right stumbles so badly at the prospect of suffering is, surely, an encouragement—a recognition in the Gospel that we all do badly at suffering. Each new cross that comes our way places us anew before the dilemma of this scene.
