MISSION IMMERSION TRIP MANILA AND BATAAN, PHILIPPINES 4TH TO 19TH JANUARY, 2019

Dear Parishioners, Visitors to our parish, Friends

Some months ago we spoke about the possibility of spending some time in the Philippines. This was not planned to be a sightseeing holiday, but a time to reach out and touch people less fortunate then us.

A number of parishioners showed interest in this mission experience; some had to pull out because of work or family commitments. Seven parishioners have been accepted to form part of this mission immersion experience. They will be joined by a parishioner from St James the Apostle, in Hoppers Crossing North, and accompanied by Fr Jude and myself.

As the experience gets closer, we have now started to prepare ourselves for this event. An itinerary is being prepared which can be seen on the parish web site. As part of our experience we will be spending time among squatters who live on 13th street, on the river bank. We will also spend some time working with the sisters of Mother Teresa in their Home of Joy for the Sick Children in Tayuman, Manila, an orphanage catering for disabled and underprivileged children.

A large part of the time will be spent in Santa Catalina Parish in the village of Pagalanggang, province of Bataan, north of Manila. This is a poor area and the work of the parish is to give the people 'a hand up.' One very practical way this is being done is by teaching youth and children an instrument. It is hoped that this can give them something to work with as they get older.

Three of the parishioners in the group are teachers at St John's Primary school; this will help us involve the students at St John's in this mission immersion. We hope that somehow we will manage to create some links between our students and the youth and children in Santa Catalina Parish.

In coming issues I will share with you about how we all can get behind this Mission Immersion experience.

The Lord has been pleased to crush his servant with suffering. If he offers his life in atonement, he shall see his heirs, he shall have a long life and through him what the Lord wishes will be done. His soul's anguish over he shall see the light and be content. By his sufferings shall my servant justify many, taking their faults on himself.

SECOND READING

Hebrews 4:14-16.

Since in Jesus, the Son of God, we have the supreme high priest who has gone through to the highest heaven, we must never let go of the faith that we have professed. For it is not as if we had a high priest who was incapable of feeling our weaknesses with us; but we have one who has been tempted in every way that we are, though he is without sin. Let us be confident, then, in approaching the throne of grace, that we shall have mercy from him and find grace when we are in need of help.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! The Son of Man came to serve and to give his life as a ransom for all. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Mark 10:35-45.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to

them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

TRUE AMBITION

The request of James and John shows that they still cling to the hope that Jesus will be the Messiah of conventional Jewish understanding: a righteous, triumphant ruler, set to restore to Israel the glories of the kingdom of David.

Jesus does not dismiss their request out of hand. Instead, employing biblical language, he makes clear what lies ahead of him en route to that glory. 'Baptism' does not refer to the Christian sacrament but reflects a biblical idiom where immersion in water out of control is an image for passage through severe trials. Likewise, 'cup' expresses the fate that lies ahead of a person (cf. Mark 14:36).

Arrangements for the final kingdom lie in the hands of the Father. It is not for Jesus to dispose of such matters but rather to complete his mission, trustfully consigning his future to the Father from whom he received that role. Those who wish to be his associates must accompany him in this trusting surrender, sharing his 'baptism' and his 'cup.'

The resentment of the remaining disciples at the request of James and John prompts Jesus to explain how leadership should run in the community of the kingdom. Earthly rulers use their authority for their own advantage and demand to be served in all things. In the community of the kingdom the reverse must prevail. The hallmark must be service of others, on the model of the Son of Man (Jesus), who came, not to *be* served but to serve—and to do in the supreme degree of giving up his life to set others free.
