### PRAYING THE PSALMS IN OUR SUNDAY LITURGY

Dear Parishioners, Visitors to our parish and Friends,

Each Sunday, as part of our celebration of the Mass, we are given three readings and a psalm or canticle to reflect upon. The first reading is taken from the Old Testament—the Hebrew Bible (in the Sundays after Easter we read from the book of the Acts of the Apostles), the second reading is taken from the books of the New Testament, while the gospel reading is taken from one of the four gospels.

In each of these three readings we listen to God speaking to us; the reader who proclaims the reading allows God word to be carried on his voice. Without the voice of the reader, the word of God cannot be proclaimed and heard. At the end of each reading we are invited to respond and accept the message just proclaimed. When the reader declares: the word / gospel of the Lord, with one voice we respond: thanks be to God / praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Apart from this dialogue between God and us, there is also the responsorial psalm and the gospel acclamation where we are invited to voice our own prayerful response. Often the reader proclaiming the psalm reads the verses of the psalm while the congregation repeats a response. In a monastic tradition the psalm is read 'in choir.' The monastics

This way of reciting the psalm means that we are more involved as we have to read the whole verse and not just the response. From next Sunday, we will be reciting the psalms in this monastic style at our Sunday Masses. The psalm will be presented like this:

### Right Side Reads:

The Lord is worthy of all praise: when I call I am saved from my foes. Long life to the Lord, my rock! Praised be to the God that saves me. He has given great victories to his king and shown love for his anointed.

**All Together:** I love you Lord, my strength.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord you God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

### TWIN COMMANDMENT OF LOVE

Scribes are usually hostile figures in the gospels but the scribe who questions Jesus seems to be a genuine enquirer. His question—which commandment of the Torah is the 'first?'—was an item of discussion in the Jewish world of Jesus' time.

Jesus first gives a conventional response, quoting the commandment recited by Jews each day in the Shema prayer (Deut 6:5).

He then goes further, laying alongside the 'first' commandment a 'second' taken from Lev 19:18: 'to love one's neighbour as oneself.' The combination seems to have been something distinctive of Jesus—though Jewish parallels are not lacking from a later period.

Loving one's neighbour 'as oneself' may not seem all that demanding. One only has to put the neighbour's interests on an equal level with one's own, implying by the same token a healthy valuing of oneself.

But on closer inspection it is really asking an act of the imagination in high degree. It requires asking myself: 'What do I really want from another person? understanding, tolerance, respect, loyalty, compassion?'—then to ensure that all my actions in regard to that person enact, rather than contradict, such qualities.

There is an attractive moment of mutual affirmation at the end. The Jewish legal expert acknowledges that Jesus' teaching conforms to the claim of Israel's prophets that the rituals of sacrifice, such as those practiced in the Temple, are worthless unless accompanied by justice and love. This renders the scribe 'not far from the kingdom of God' in the sense that the onset of the kingdom is rendering such rituals obsolete through the twin commandment of love.

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
