29TH / 30TH DECEMBER—Feast of the Holy Family, YEAR C A CHILD IS BORN FOR US!

Dear parishioners, visitors and friends,

We have just celebrated Christmas, the memorial of the great event when God too human flesh upon himself and lived among us as a human person—just like each and every one of us! This is a great mystery which is very difficult to explain, how God could find it within himself to forego his position as creator and to take on the form of a part of his creation! God did this for one simple reason: to be able to show his face to us. The opening lines of the letter to the Hebrews tells us that God had been trying to communicate with us for a very long time, using different ways, through the prophets. Sending his only son as one of us was his last attempt. Now God has spoken to us in a full and final way; our job is to listen and absorb what God has spoken.

Some of the readings prepared for the feast of Christmas, spoke about light and darkness. On our own we walk in darkness, through the birth of his Son, God has shone a new light upon us, his creation. No one can create darkness; it is the total absence of light. When the light comes, there is no longer any darkness. Light and darkness are not compatible with each other.

In the same way, we can often find ourselves in darkness if we do not let the light of God shine in and through our life. Sin, evil and spiritual darkness are places where God does not exist. God came to be the light of the world and of our whole life. When we get to know and see God, then we can no longer live in darkness.

We can find ourselves in darkness because of choices we make or because of things that happen around us, over which we often have no control. Sickness, death and misunderstanding can cause darkness in our life. At times we find that we have lost trust in people we had looked up to or institutions that we formed part of. Darkness can easily engulf us.

Darkness is the absence of light—the absence of God!

The birth of the God-child in Bethlehem is a source of new light and of hope. We need to continually celebrate the fact of God-with-us. God is born as a human person not just one day two thousand years ago; nor is he born again for us on Christmas day. We celebrate Christmas to remind us of the reality of God who live in our midst, God who lives our life.

We need to hang on to the new light, new life and new hope that the Son of God made human brings in our life. People and human institutions around us can and have indeed failed us, over and over again. Even if these people and institutions claim to be working in God's name, it does not mean that God has failed us. God is love and God will never fail us. This is the sure hope that the birth of Jesus at Christmas brings in our life. This is the light and hope we need to hang on to!

FIRST READING

Ecclesiasticus 3: 2-6, 12-14.

The Lord honours the father in his children, and upholds the rights of a mother over her sons. Whoever respects his father is atoning for his sins, he who honours his mother is like someone amassing a fortune. Whoever respects his father will be happy with children of his own, he shall be heard on the day when he prays. Long life comes to him who honours his father, he who sets his mother at ease is showing obedience to the Lord. My son, support your father in his old age, do not grieve him during his life. Even if his mind should fail, show him sympathy, do not despise him in your health and strength; for kindness to a father shall not be forgotten but will serve as reparation for your sins.

SECOND READING

Colossians 3:12-21.

You are God's chosen race, his saints; he loves you and you should be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with one another; forgive each other as soon as a quarrel begins. The Lord has forgiven you; now you must do the same. Over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love. And may the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because it is for this that you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful.

Let the message of Christ, in all its richness, find a home with you. Teach each other, and advise each other, in all wisdom. With gratitude in your hearts sing psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God; and never say or do anything except in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Wives, give way to your husbands, as you should in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives and treat them with gentleness. Children, be obedient to your parents always, because that is what will please the Lord. Parents, never drive your children to resentment or you will make them feel frustrated

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! May the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, and the fullness of his message live within you. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Luke 2:41-52.

Every year the parents of Jesus used to go to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up for the feast as usual. When they were on their way home after the feast, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem without his parents knowing it. They assumed he was with the caravan, and it was only after a day's journey that they went to look for him among their relations and acquaintances. When they failed to find him they went back to Jerusalem looking for him everywhere.

Three days later, they found him in the Temple, sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions; and all those who heard him were astounded at his intelligence and his replies. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' 'Why were you looking for me?' he replied. 'Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?' But they did not understand what he meant.

He then went down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority. His mother stored up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men.

My Father's Business

Luke's story of the loss and finding of Jesus in the Temple brings out very strongly the element of misunderstanding between him and his parents. When his Mother complains, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been looking for you,' Jesus' response seems to reflect adolescent impatience: 'Why were you searching for me? Did you not know I must be about my Father's business?'

On Mary's lips, 'father' refers to her husband, Joseph. But Jesus is speaking of his Father in heaven. Into their tranquil family life has burst a sharp reminder of his true status as unique Son of God and of the destiny ('My Father's business') to which they are going to have to surrender him.

It would be trite simply to say that here we see that the Holy Family was not immune to the trials of children going through adolescence—though, of course, some comfort can be drawn from that. The gospel is bringing out the uniqueness of Jesus as well as his identification with the ordinary human condition. 'His Father's business' is to draw the entire human family into a 'family' relationship with God.

The family life of Jesus underwrites the dignity of all family life. But growing into Christian adulthood is no easier than growing into human adulthood and no less immune to the trials that all growth entails. Each of us is called to discover and 'be about' our Father's business in our own unique way—often involving pain and misunderstanding for those who love us most.
